

DETENTION PONDS IN AND NEAR YOUR BACKYARD

Many residents of Oak Creek live in subdivisions that have detention ponds. These ponds were installed for a number of reasons. Building a subdivision dramatically increases the amount of impervious area. We all can see that a roof or paved driveway sheds more water than a grassy meadow. Therefore, the construction of new homes, roads, and driveways in a subdivision decreases the amount of water that percolates into the ground, and increases the amount that runs off. Many of these detention ponds were installed to minimize this impact on downstream property.

Prior to 2002, reduction of peak run off flows was usually accomplished using detention ponds that do not have a permanent standing pool of water at the bottom. Water enters the pond and is detained for a time, but almost all the water is intended to drain out of the pond once the storm has ended. The bottom of these ponds receive a lot of water on a frequent basis, and over time, these pond bottoms often develop cattails and other wet soil loving vegetation. This can be a source of frustration for homeowners and homeowner associations who try to mow and maintain these ponds as they would a typical lawn. However, a typical lawn is designed to shed water as quickly as possible, whereas the typical pond bottom is designed to receive the water from the houses and lawns of the surrounding subdivision.

One option that can minimize maintenance such as mowing, and also may help the bottom of the pond dry faster is to plant certain attractive, water tolerant plants in the pond bottom. These plants will help to use the moisture in the bottom of the pond, do not need regular mowing, and are often considered more attractive than cattails. Many of these plants flower, and have the added benefit of attracting butterflies, hummingbirds and song birds. These are often referred to as "rain gardens".

If a homeowner's association or homeowner would like to implement a rain garden type planting, grants and assistance are often available for this purpose. A grassroots collaborative organization called Root-Pike WIN provides grants and works with homeowner groups and others in southeast Wisconsin to improve their storm water detention ponds and the quality of the water draining out of them. They have money available for

rain garden projects, if a homeowner's association wants to pursue this option. It should be noted that prior to making any changes to the storm water management system, the homeowners should check with the Engineering Department, to make sure the proposed plantings are compatible with the design of the system.

Root-Pike WIN is accepting proposals for grants for rain garden, water quality, and fisheries projects. The rain garden, water quality, and fisheries projects will be supported by contributions from Sustainable Racine, and Salmon Unlimited respectively. REGULATIONS FOR DOG OWNERS

The following are a few reminders to residents on the City's dog regulations:

- It is unlawful for owners to allow their dog(s) to run at large in the City of Oak Creek. The fine is \$133.
- If a dog is found and turned over to the Police



Department and the owner cannot be located, the dog is turned over to the Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MADACC). The MADACC facility is located at 3839 W.

Burnham Avenue in West Milwaukee. For information on their hours of operation, please call (414) 649-8640.

- Per City Ordinance, there is a limit of two (2) dogs per household, with the exception of a litter of pups which may be kept for not more than five (5) months from birth.
- As mandated by City Ordinance, every dog more than five (5) months of age shall be licensed. For licensing information, please contact the **Treasurer's Office at** (414) 768-6501.

PET LICENSE INFORMATION

WI State Statutes, Section 174 makes it mandatory for pets to be licensed. The City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs and cats over five months of age. License applications are available at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office. Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. You may mail in the certificate along with your application and fee, and it will be returned with your license. The license year commences January 1 and ends December 31.

Beginning April 1, a late fee will be assessed except for:

A new resident who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or;

A resident who purchases a dog or cat that reaches five months of age on or after April 1, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

Male or Female Dog/Cats \$20.00 Neutered/Spayed Dog/Cats \$10.00 Late Fee Double the license fee

ANIMAL BITES

- All animal bites must be reported to the Police Department
- •A police officer will make the initial contact with the victim and pet owner.
- •All animals that bite either a person or another animal must be examined by a veterinarian within 24 hours of the bite incident
- All animals must be quarantined for a period of at least ten (10) days for observation in an isolation facility at the expense of the owner of such animal or sacrificed for testing according to state law.

Home quarantine may be allowed by the Health Officer for those animals which have a current rabies vaccination unless the incident meets one of the following four criteria:

- The dog/cat is not licensed. (The owner may obtain a license at the City Hall Treasurer's Office after the biting incident and then be eligible for home quarantine.)
- •The bite is on the neck or face.
- •There are multiple bites to a person from the same animal.
- The bite required stitches.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY "RUN-WAY" DOG EXERCISE AREA

The new Milwaukee County dog exercise area is located off Rawson Avenue between Howell and



Nicholson Avenue. The entrance to this area is adjacent to Gastrau's Golf Center at 1300 E Rawson Avenue. To obtain a permit, all dogs must be licensed, with proof of current rabies immunization in accordance with WI State Statue 147.07 and Milwaukee County Ordinance before entering. TWO BRANCH PICK-UPS REMAINING THIS YEAR:

The last 2 branch pick ups will be August 1st and October 1st. Again, residents are reminded that branches should be placed at the curb or roadside prior to the 1st to guarantee pick up.

Branches are to be placed in an orderly manner with the cut ends facing the road.

RAKING OF LEAVES IN TO THE STREET IS PROHIBITED

The City of Oak Creek has adopted Ordinance No.



1984 which prohibits property owners from *placing* leaves, grass, yard waste or rubbish in the street, alley or sidewalk areas. For your convenience, the ordinance reads as follows:

"No owner or occupant shall allow the street, alley or

sidewalk pavements abutting on his premises to be littered with rubbish, dirt, grass, leaves or yard waste as defined in Section 8.40. If such owner or occupant shall refuse or fail to remove any such rubbish, dirt, grass, leaves or yards waste as defined in Section 8.40 when notified to do so by the Common Council or designee, the City may cause the same to be done and the cost thereof shall be reported to the City Clerk who shall spread the cost on the tax roll as a special tax against the premises, pursuant to Sec. 66.60(16), Wis. States. or such cost may be covered in an action against the owner or occupant."

The City of Oak Creek does not pick up leaves

curbside. Residents may bring their leaves to the drop-off site located at 720 West Puetz Road Monday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Questions--call 768-6552

FALL CLEAN-UP BEGINS NOVEMBER 15, 2005

2005 REAL ESTATE AND PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX BILLS

Please read carefully for IMPORTANT INFORMA-TION for payment of property tax bills. You will also receive a page of ADDITIONAL VALUABLE INFOR-MATION with your tax bill. Please be sure to read this to avoid delays in the processing of your payment which could result in delinquent tax.

For **PERMANENT ADDRESS CHANGES**, please contact our Assessors' Office at (414) 768-6506. Tax bills are mailed to the permanent mailing address on record, unless a special request is made with our office before tax bills are mailed each year. If you have a SPECIAL MAILING ADDRESS REQUEST for the purpose of receiving a tax bill, please call the Treasurers Office at (414) 768-6501, even if you requested a special mailing in the past.

CHECKS(s) should be payable to Treasurer, or City of Oak Creek. If payment is made by check, receipts are not valid until the check clears our bank. Any check returned from the bank for non sufficient funds, account closed or sale date is subject to a \$25.00 recovery fee and payment must be made with cash or certified funds. Original payment will be void and taxes could become delinquent.

The date of payment from ESCROW ACCOUNTS is determined by the signed agreement you have with your bank. Please check your agreement or call your bank to verify that your ESCROW CHECK will be mailed on time.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

BY MAIL, ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31st, please use the green envelope enclosed with your tax bill.

AFTER JANUARY 31st, to: Treasurer, City of Oak Creek, 8640 S Howell Avenue, Oak Creek, WI 53154.

When mailing a personal check, an escrow check that is first mailed to you for endorsement, or when an escrow check is mailed from a bank directly to the City of Oak Creek, A PAYMENT IS TIMELY IF ALL of the following criteria are met:

- *it is mailed to the City of Oak Creek in a properly addressed envelope,
- *postmarked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment, with postage prepaid, and

* is received by the proper official not more than 5 days after the prescribed date for making the payment.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. **NO CASH** PLEASE!

To receive a RECEIPT for payment made via US mail or depository, please include your original tax bill, a copy of your tax bill or a self-addressed envelope with your payment.

IN PERSON AT ANY OF THE FOLLOWING FOUR TRI CITY BANK LOCATIONS THROUGH JANUARY 31ST ONLY. You will receive a RECEIPT from the bank. IMMEDIATE REFUND FOR OVERPAYMENT is given when payment is made at the bank.

- * BEFORE stepping into the payment line please have all checks completed and bring your tax bill(s) with you or have your parcel number(s) available.
- * For **OVERPAYMENTS** at City Hall, the amount of CASH REFUNDS will be determined at a later date. No cash refunds will be given on personal checks. Please look for up to date information on the city website at www.oakcreekwi.org. Go to the treasurers' page found under City Departments.
- * **REFUNDS BY CHECK** will be mailed three to four weeks from payment date, and will be made payable to the Payer, even if your mortgage company makes a payment from your escrow account after you have made payment in full.

Please note the due date on your calendar as we do not send reminder notices.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Payment of DELINQUENT 2004 REAL ESTATE TAX must be made to MILWAUKEE COUNTY. Please contact the Milwaukee County Treasurers' Office at (414) 278-4030 for more details.

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO RECEIVE. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

Any payment not made on or before its due date will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance. Taxes are considered delinquent if payment is received in person, in the drop box, or *post-marked, after the due date. The *postmark governs the date of payment - NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period. All DELINQUENT TAX will accumulate INTEREST AND PENALTY charges from February 1st at 1½ percent per month on the unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. Delinquent notices for 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2006. Payment of delinquent 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2006, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on

January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

2004: If you did not receive the 2004 Lottery and Gaming Credit and are eligible for the credit, please complete a 2004 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application which is available on our website at www.oakcreekwi.org. From the home page click on City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. To receive the credit, you must return the completed application to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) no later than October 1, 2005.

2005: If you do not qualify for the 2004 Lottery and Gaming Credit, but you qualify for 2005, the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit application is available online and also at the Treasurers' Office. Please return the completed application to the City of Oak Creek Treasurers' Office at 8640 S Howell Avenue. If we receive the application by November 15, 2005 the credit will appear on your 2005 Real Estate Tax Bill. For those applications received by the Treasurer's Office between November 15, 2005 and January 31, 2006, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The amount of the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit will be determined in December 2005.

There is a \$.25 charge for additional copies of tax bills. Beginning with 2003, tax information is available on the Oak Creek website - www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). You may search by parcel number, name, or address. If you do not have internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). Additional up to date Treasurers' information may be found on the City website by clicking the applicable link found under City Departments and then Treasurers' Office.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 9-15, 2005

In an effort to battle home fires *before* they start, the Oak Creek Fire Department is taking a lead role in NFPA's Fire Prevention Week, October 9-15, 2005. By hosting local activities and events that will both entertain and educate the public, the Oak Creek Fire Department hopes to raise awareness of key fire safety issues, helping attendees prevent fires and fire injuries, especially at home.

"Many people don't realize that they are at greater danger from fire at home than anywhere else," says Firefighter Scott Kasten. "Fortunately, there are many things residents can do to turn that around and make their homes safer. Fire Prevention Week is the time when we reach out to the community one-on-one, teaching people of every age how to prevent fires. This year, we'll be focusing in particular on candle fires, a serious and growing part of the fire problem."

During Fire Prevention Week, the Oak Creek Fire Department will be visiting area schools to teach children about fire safety.

Fire Prevention Week has been sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) for 83 years and is proclaimed by the President of the United States each year. The longest running safety commemoration is the premier fire safety program



of the fire service. NFPA selected the 2005 Fire Prevention Week theme in order to high-

light a growing home fire concern. The theme, "Use Candles with Care: When you go out, blow out!", is a memorable and effective safety message.

Home candle fires have risen steadily over the last decade.

In addition to using candles safely, Oak Creek


residents are urged to ensure that smoke alarms are installed on every level of the home and kept working with monthly testing and annual battery replacement. All smoke alarms should be replaced with a new unit after 10 years.



Each member of the household needs to know the fire escape plan, and all should practice it twice a year.

Today we do not keep horses in the fire station, but many firehouses still have a Dalmatian. The resident Dalmatian is still responsible for guarding the firehouse and the fire trucks.

"SIGNS, SIGNS, EVERYWHERE A SIGN"

Residents are reminded that signs—rummage sale, garage sale, advertising, etc.—cannot be posted on

etc.—cannot be posted on street boulevards, intersection divides, public easements (between the sidewalk and street), on utility right-of-ways (including utility poles), or on the property of another without the property owner's permission. Violation of this City Ordinance could result in a \$288 fine.

Upon receipt of this information, the Police Department will prepare a traffic citation and serve it upon the owner of the vehicle in violation. The fine for such violation is \$226. Help keep our children safe this school year—stop when you approach a bus flashing its red warning lights!

Development of the new park site at South Hills Neighborhood Park at 9299 S. 22nd Street started the third week of July. Park facilities development should be completed by the end of September or early October.

Park facilities being developed in South Hills Neighborhood Park include an early childhood and school age playstructure, swings, sledding hill, ballfield, playfield, basketball court, sand volleyball court, tennis courts, picnic shelter, parking lot and asphalt recreation trail.

CAMELOT NEIGHBORHOOD PARK DEVELOPMENT

Development of the new park site at Camelot Neighborhood Park at 7385 S. Chapel Drive started the third week of July. Park facilities development should be completed by the end of September or early October.

Park facilities being developed in Camelot Neighborhood Park include an early childhood and school age playstructure, swings, ballfield, playfield, basketball court, parking lot and asphalt recreation trail.

SKATE PARK

The Common Council awarded the purchase and installation of skate park obstacles to American Ramp Company. The installa-



tion of the obstacles should take place in early September. The skate park will be located on the east side of the school building at East Middle School, 9330 S. Shepard Avenue. Watch for information on the opening day ceremony.

DISC GOLF COURSE DELAYED

The Common Council approved the development of an 18 hole disc golf course at Abendschein Community Park located at 1311 E. Drexel Avenue. Unfortunately develops of the course has been delayed due to the discovery of numerous patches of poison ivy. Staff will be spraying and cutting the poison ivy this fall. If this procedure doesn't work, we will redesign some course holes away from the poison ivy. The new target date for the opening of the disc golf course is May of 2006. The object of disk golf is to throw a flying disk, such as a frisbee, from a tee area down a fairway towards a target that is an elevated metal basket. Just like regular golf, the object is to get the disc from the tee into the basket in the fewest number of throws.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY BIKE TRAIL CONSTRUCTION-UPDATE

The North Shore Trail - Root River Extension that currently connects the North Shore Bike Trail at County Line Road, extends west using County Line Road and Milwaukee County parklands is presently being extended west from the East Randy Road subdivision connection to Howell Avenue. The bike trail segment extension should be completed by the end of August.

The North Shore box culvert project will allow bicycles to travel under Highway 100 when biking the North Shore - Oak Leaf Trail. The box culvert is presently being constructed, but don't look for the project to be completed and the trail open until early 2006.

GREENLAWN PARK BIKE TRAILHEAD PARKING LOT

The City is developing an eight parking stall parking lot at Greenlawn Park at 7628 South Howell Avenue to serve the Oak Leaf Bike Trail segment that starts at the Manitoba Avenue cul-de-sac. The project will be completed this fall.





Fair Housing

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- Sex
- Color

- Disability
- Religion
- Marital Status

- Age
- Sexual Orientation
- National origin/Ancestry
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)
- Lawful source of income

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

The Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organiza-

tions, social service agencies, community centers and other groups

Fine Print: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

WHO'S THE TEACHER?

The Recreation Department assigns the most qualified leaders available to all program activities. Your feedback regarding instructors/leaders is always welcome.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the needs of the program, such as leadership, equipment and supplies, etc.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Any family unable to pay all or part of the fees or charges may contact the office. Arrangements will be made for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Anytime a team or individual requests a transfer, and the Department can accommodate the transfer, a \$3 service charge will be payable to the Department.

There is no charge for transfers initiated by Department Instructors or for those accompanied by proof of the child passing/failing the previous class.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested by an individual.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

Overpayments must be picked up in the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Office within 2 weeks of notification to avoid forfeiture (under \$5) or a \$3 check processing fee (over \$5).

IS THERE CLASS TODAY?

If you have a question concerning the cancellation of a program (inclement weather, school closed, etc.) CALL THE 24-HOUR INFORMATION LINE AT:

It is sometimes necessary to cancel an activity due to school-related functions, weather, etc. Participants will be notified of cancellations as soon as possible.

Cancelled activities will be rescheduled if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

OPEN HOUSE:

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

HAVE A COMPLAINT?

If, after you begin a class it does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

DO YOU HAVE INSURANCE?

The Department does not provide hospital/medical insurance coverage for program participants. Nor does the School District provide hospital/medical coverage for Department sponsored activities on school property. Participants are encouraged to obtain their own insurance coverage for the duration of their activity from their own insurance agent.

AMIA RESIDENT?

A non-resident fee is set for most activities. The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is not within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. All individuals or groups registering in classes or activities must show proof of City residency such as a current State of Wisconsin driver's license, a current utility bill, etc. If proof of residency cannot be validated, the non-resident fee standards will be applied.
