HEALTH DEPARTMENT

A NEW VACCINE FOR YOUR TEEN!

Pertussis is a highly contagious respiratory tract infection, commonly known as "whooping cough". Symptoms for adolescents range from mild cough illness to classic pertussis (coughing spasms, vomiting after cough, a long series of coughs followed by a whooping noise, difficulty catching breath). In 2003, in the U.S., adolescents, ages 11-18 years made up 26% of the total 11,647 reported pertussis cases. To protect adolescents, whose immunity from childhood vaccines is wearing off, a new vaccine, "Tdap", was licensed this year to provide protection against tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice (ACIP) recommends use of "Tdap" vaccine in 11-18 years olds in place of the Td booster (tetanus-diphtheria). As of this printing, the Oak Creek Health Department has not yet received a supply of Tdap. Check our website or call 768-6525 for availability and information. POWER SNOW THROWER/BLOWER SAFETY TIPS

A recent Consumer Product Safety Commission reported 15,823 injuries related to use of snow blowers. To ensure safety when using power snow blower equipment we recommend these safety guidelines:

- Do not put your hand in the snow blower to remove impacted snow or debris. Always stop the engine and wait more than five seconds. Use a solid object to clear wet snow and debris from the chute.

 Beware of the recoil of the motor and blades after the machine has been turned off.
- Never leave the snow blower unattended when it is running.
- Shut off the engine if you must walk away from the machine.
- Do not operate the snow blower in an enclosed area.
- Do not add any fuel when the engine is running or when it is hot. Add fuel before starting the engine.
- If you are operating an electric snow thrower, be aware of where the power cord is at all times.
- Individuals should avoid loose fitting clothing while operating machinery.

WINTER SPORTS - SLEDDING SAFETY

Adults should always supervise children while they are sledding.

Make sure the hill is safe: that means a hill without obstacles in the sledding path, which doesn't end near a street, parking lot, pond, or other danger.

• Take time to avoid collisions. Children under age 12 should

wear a fitted helmet while sledding.

• Never go down a hill headfirst; sit facing forward and steer.

- Use a sled that can steer it's safer than flat sheets, toboggans or snow discs.
- If you want to go sledding in the evening, make sure the area is well lit.
- Wear warm and layered clothing to protect from injuries and the cold.

SAFE SNOW SHOVELING TIPS

Warm up your muscles in your arms and legs. Walk for a few minutes and stretch your arms and legs before shoveling.

- Warm muscles are less likely to be injured and work more efficiently.
- Take it slow! Pace yourself and take breaks.
- Don't pick up too much snow at once. Use a small shovel, or fill it only 1/4- to 1/2 if you use a large shovel.
- Push the snow as you shovel. It is easier on your back.
- Protect your back. Bend from the knees, not your back. Lift with your legs bent, stand with your feet about hip width for balance and keep the shovel close to your body. Try not to twist. If you need to move the snow to one side move your feet to face the direction the snow will be going.
- Most importantly listen to your body! Stop if you feel very tired. Stop if you feel tightness in your chest.

REIMBURSEMENT FOR CITY DAMAGE TO MAILBOXES

In 2001, the City of Oak Creek adopted a policy to reimburse property owners for mailbox damage caused by city vehicles such as snowplows. This policy limits the city's liability to \$150 upon presentation of receipts for replacement. If the mailbox was not installed according to city and post office standards, there will be no reimbursement. If the box was installed over the edge of the pavement or so low to the road that the snowplow blade couldn't pass under it, the property owner is responsible for repair/replacement. Contact the Street Department at 768-6552 to request repair if a plow has damaged your mailbox. Claims for replacement may be submitted to the City Clerk's office for review by the Small Claims Committee.

HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- · National origin/Ancestry
- Disability
- Sexual orientation
- Lawful source of income
- Sex
- Color
- Religion
- Marital status
- Age
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

METROPOLITAN MILWAUKEE FAIR HOUSING COUNCIL

In this day and age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle and difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability.

The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

- You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign.
- You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, and

the landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along.

- · A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- You are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- •You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are.
- · A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- · Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent
- Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court.

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination.
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination.
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law.

In addition, the Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination. CITY TREASURER'S OFFICE

2005 REAL ESTATE AND PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX BILLS

Please read carefully for IMPORTANT INFORMATION AND CHANGES for payment of property tax bills.

For PERMANENT ADDRESS CHANGES, please contact our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506. No changes will be made by the Treasurer's Office after the tax roll is complete. Each year tax bills are mailed to the permanent mailing address on record, unless you call the Treasurer's Office at (414) 768-6501, with a SPECIAL MAILING ADDRESS REQUEST before the tax bills are mailed, even if you have requested a special mailing in the past.

CHECK(S) should be payable to Treasurer, or City of Oak Creek. Checks not properly completed or endorsed may be returned unprocessed and your taxes could become delinquent. Receipts are not valid until the check clears our bank. Any check returned from the bank for non sufficient funds, account closed, stop payment or stale date is subject to a \$25.00 recovery fee and the applicable payment will be void. We must receive a full replacement payment and recovery fee, with cash or certified funds, by the original due date to avoid delinquent charges.

The date of payment from ESCROW ACCOUNTS is determined by the signed agreement you have with your bank. Please check your agreement or call your bank to verify that your ESCROW CHECK will be mailed on time.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

BY MAIL,

• ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31st, please use the green P. O. Box envelope enclosed with your tax bill. <u>Any envelopes addressed to the P. O. Box postmarked after</u>

January 31st will be returned to sender unprocessed and your taxes could become delinquent.

• AFTER JANUARY 31st, mail must be addressed to: Treasurer, City of Oak Creek, 8640 S. Howell Ave., Oak Creek, WI 53154.

When mailing a personal check, an escrow check that is first mailed to you for endorsement, or when an escrow check is mailed from a bank or other payment service directly to the City of Oak Creek, a PAYMENT IS TIMELY IF ALL of the following criteria are met:

- it is mailed to the City of Oak Creek in a properly addressed envelope,
- *postmarked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment,
- with postage prepaid, and
- is received by the proper official not more than 5 days after the prescribed date for making the payment.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. NO CASH PLEASE!

RECEIPTS

To receive a receipt for payment made via US mail or depository, please include your original tax bill, a copy of your tax bill or a self-addressed envelope with your payment. We will return your tax bill with your receipt.

IN PERSON AT THE FOLLOWING FIVE TRI CITY BANK LOCATIONS THROUGH JANUARY 31ST ONLY. You will receive a RECEIPT from the bank. IMMEDIATE REFUND FOR OVERPAYMENT is given when payment is made at the bank.

S. 27th St. & College Ave.; and W. Ryan Rd. near S. 27th St. Monday thru Friday 9 am – 6 pm, Saturday 9 am – 12 noon; except, Dec. 24th & 31st, 9 am – noon; and closed on Dec. 25th & 26th, Jan. 1st & 2nd

Mega Mall Pick 'n Save store (corner of Puetz Rd. & Howell Ave.), Pick 'n Save store (S. 27th St. near College Ave.) and the NEW MegaMall Pick'n Save store (corner of Ryan Rd. & 27th St.)

Monday thru Sunday 10 am - 8 pm; except, Dec. 24^{th} , 10 am - 2 pm; and closed on Dec. 25^{th} & Jan. 1^{st}

IN PERSON AT CITY HALL, 8640 S. Howell Avenue. Normal business hours are Monday thru Friday, 8 am to 5 pm. (Please note the following exceptions)

- On Friday, Dec. 30th, the Treasurer's Office will be open from 9 am to 12 Noon for tax payments only (no other payments will be accepted). Please use the east entrance that day; all other entrances will be locked.
- We will be closed on Friday, Dec. 23rd, Monday, Dec. 26th, Saturday, Dec. 31st and Monday, Jan. 2nd. Please use one of the other payment options listed when we are closed.

BEFORE stepping into the payment line:

- please have all checks completed and;
- bring your tax bill(s) with you or have your parcel number(s) available.
- Otherwise, we will take care of the next person in line while you prepare your payment. If needed, a computer with an instruction sheet will be available for you to look up your parcel number(s).

OVERPAYMENTS

• For overpayments at City Hall, cash refunds will be given up to \$20. No cash refunds will be given on personal checks. Any overpayments over \$20, a refund check will be mailed three to four weeks from payment date. To receive a refund immediately for an overpayment over \$20, please make your payment at one of the five Tri City Banks.

CITY TREASURER'S OFFICE

All refunds by check will be made payable to the Payer, even if your mortgage company makes a payment from your escrow account after you have made payment in full.

Please, if at all possible, take advantage of the U.S. Mail, the drive-up 24-hour depository, or any of the five Tri City bank locations to avoid waiting in long lines at City Hall.

PAYMENT DEADLINES

PAID IN FULL - PAYMENT IS DUE JANUARY 31, 2006.

INSTALLMENT OPTION, all payments must be made as listed below. If you choose the installment payment option, please note the due dates on your calendar as we do <u>not</u> send reminder notices.

- \bullet FIRST INSTALLMENT 50% of net real estate tax plus all special charges due on or before January 31 st
- \bullet SECOND INSTALLMENT 25% of net real estate tax due on or before March 31 st
- ${}^{\bullet}$ THIRD INSTALLMENT 25% of net real estate tax due on or before May $31^{}^{}^{}$

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO RECEIVE. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

Any payment not made on or before its due date will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance. Taxes are considered delinquent if payment is received in person, in the drop box, or *post-marked, after the due date. The *postmark governs the date of payment – NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period. All DELINQUENT TAX will accumulate INTEREST AND PENALTY charges from February

1st at 1½ percent per month on the unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. Delinquent notices for 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2006. Payment of delinquent 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2006, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection.

Payment of PRIOR YEAR(S) DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX must be made to MILWAUKEE COUNTY. Please contact the Milwaukee County Treasurer's Office at (414) 278-4030 for more details.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

If you did not receive the Lottery and Gaming Credit in 2004 and are eligible for the credit in 2005, please complete a form which is available on the website at http://www.oakcreekwi.org. The link for the lottery credit form can be accessed from the Treasurer's Office page under City Departments. Lottery credit forms are also available at the City of Oak Creek Treasurer's Office. Please include a completed form with your tax payment and you may deduct the credit from your first payment (the amount of the credit is available on the Treasurer's page of the website). We must receive the completed form no later than January 31, 2006 for us to apply the lottery and gaming credit to your 2005 property tax bill.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION/CHANGES

There is a \$.25 charge for additional copies of tax bills. Beginning with 2003, tax information is available on the Oak Creek website - http://www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). You may search by parcel number, name, or address. If you do not have internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). Additional up to date Treasurer's information may be found on the City website by clicking the applicable link found under City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. You will also receive a pamphlet with your tax bill containing additional information. Please take the time to read the important information we provide to you and avoid any unnecessary delays in the processing of your payment, which could result in delinquent tax. EMERGENCY EVACUATION CHECKLIST

During an emergency, people may be asked to leave their homes, schools, and businesses. Are you prepared? Do you have what you need if you are asked to leave your home immediately? If so, have you coordinated and practiced your emergency plan with friends and family?

The Oak Creek Fire Department, Milwaukee County Emergency Management, and the Red Cross encourage families to develop an evacuation kit that includes a **three day supply** of the following materials (for each family member).

We have formulated this simple checklist to help you plan your evacuation. Hopefully, if needed, this checklist will help you prepare essential items in advance.

General items:

- Prescription medications (portable oxygen if medically needed)
- House & car keys
- Photocopies of identification and credit cards
- Checkbook and cash (including coins)
- Dentures, hearing aids, & eyeglasses
- Flashlight and radio (with extra batteries)
- Change of clothing (season appropriate)
- First aid kit & a copy of medical records
- Three gallons of water/ per person
- Three day supply non-perishable food & a manual can opener
- Blankets/ pillows/ sleeping bags
- Sanitation/hygiene items (hand sanitizer, moist towelettes, toilet paper)
- Area map
- Cell Phone & emergency contact telephone numbers

Special items for infants:

- Formula, bottles & food (if breast feeding, consider manual breast pump)
- Diapers & wipes
- Pacifiers & two small toys
- Consider a portable crib

Considerations for pets:

With the exception of service animals, pets will not be allowed in shelter sites. Pet owners should make arrangements with family, friends, kennels, veterinarians, or "pet friendly" hotels.

- Medicine
- Cage/ leash
- Pet food
- Copies of vaccination records

Supplies for your vehicle:

- Flashlight with extra batteries F.
- First aid kit
- White distress flag
- Tire repair kit, jumper cables, air pump, flares
- Bottled water, non-perishable snack bars
- Seasonal supplies (blanket, hat/ mittens, shovel, windshield scraper, sunscreen, umbrella)

Emergency Contact:

When considering your emergency contacts, pick people who live out-of-town. During a disaster, local phone service could be affected. Your best bet is to call someone who will not be affected by interrupted phone service. Then, if you are ever separated from your family, everyone in your family should know to call the emergency contact(s). Your emergency contact can then work on getting your family back together.

NEW GENEALOGY DATABASES AVAILABLE

Oak Creek Library patrons now have two new genealogy databases to help with their family history searches.

HeritageQuest Online offers users outstanding search capabilities including: United States census with original images; genealogy and local history book collection; Periodical Source Index (PERSIL) covering genealogy and local history periodicals written in English and French (Canada);
Revolutionary War era pension records and Freedman; Bank Records, an African American source. This database is available in the library and by remote access around the clock.

Ancestry Library Edition is a companion database with search capabilities including: United Kingdom and Ireland census; Social Security Death Index; military records from the Civil War through the Korean Conflict; and many other sources.

These valuable genealogy databases are provided through funding by the *Friends Of The Oak Creek Public Library*.

CAN CARS CAUSE WATER POLLUTION?

We have all seen how a bright fresh new snow turns dirty and dark in areas near roads and parking lots after only a couple of days. This is just one way to visualize the effects of some of the pollution left by our cars and trucks. Each time it snows again, a fresh new layer covers the old grimy layer, until layers of pollution are trapped within the snow banks. Once spring comes, the pollution and particles trapped in the layer of snow will wash with the snow melt into our streams, rivers and lakes. What does not wash off with the snow melt itself, will be left on the pavement until the next rain storm comes along to wash it clean.

Take a look at a parking lot the next time it rains. During the early part of the rain, you may notice an oily sheen, green streaks of leaked antifreeze, and dark gritty particles in the puddles. Look again after it has rained for a while, and you may notice that the oily sheen is no longer there, and the puddles no longer look gritty. Most of us don't stop to think that the ground now looks so clean only because the pollution has been washed away by the rain water, and carried along with the rain water into the storm sewers and ditches, which empty into our lakes and streams with no treatment to remove these pollutants first.

We all know that when the tread on our tires wears away, we need to replace them. What we don't usually think about is that all the rubber from the tire tread is left on the roads, parking lots, and driveways in the form of small rubber particles. These get washed away during rain storms, and are deposited into our rivers and lakes. Tiny bits of brake pads and rusted metal from cars also get washed into the waterways.

If you change your own oil, do not dump it into a storm drain. Just five quarts of oil from a single oil change can create an oil slick the size of two football fields, or pollute a million gallons of drinking water. Recycling is the only safe way to dispose of used motor oil.

The City has initiated a program to identify and prevent illicit discharges throughout the City. City staff are visually inspecting outfalls throughout the City, and conducting chemical sampling if a dry weather flow is present. Most dry weather flows are from sources such as sump pump discharges or lawn sprinklers. However, if the testing shows a parameter is present that indicates illicit discharge, further investigation will be conducted to find and eliminate the source of the illicit discharge. This is one of the ways in which the City is working to protect and improve the quality of our water resources.



POLICE DEPARTMENT

PARKING RESTRICTIONS

The Police Department would like to remind all citizens that winter parking restrictions are in effect until April 1st. During this time, there is no parking allowed

on the streets in the City of Oak Creek during the following hours:



• Saturday & Sunday from 2:30 a.m. to 6 a.m.



Permission may be granted by the Police Department (on a day-to-day basis) for exceptions to this during emergencies, if a vehicle becomes disabled, or if there is an overnight guest.

UTILITY PROBLEMS

During severe weather, the Police Department receives an abundance of telephone calls from residents wishing to report utility problems. These problems should be reported directly to the respective utility company at the following 24-hour phone numbers:. See back cover of *Acorn* for Utility Phone Number Listings.

SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

Citizens are reminded that it is the responsibility of the owner or occupant of property abutting or fronting public sidewalks to remove all snow and ice within 24 hours after a snow fall. If the ice cannot be removed, salt or other similar substance must be spread to eliminate the hazard to pedestrian traffic. In addition, directing sump pump, watershed or rain gutter spouts onto the sidewalk or roadway is against City Ordinance.

Also, for those who plow their driveway or use a snow blower, remember it is illegal to push or blow snow into the street or dump it onto any public ground.

OAK CREEK CRIME STOPPERS

The Oak Creek Police Department is always looking for your help solving crimes. You can remain 100% anonymous and receive a reward for your tip. Crime Stoppers also sponsors a "Quick 50" program in the middle schools and high school. Students remain anonymous when calling in "tips" and can receive a \$50 reward for any information leading to the confiscation of *drugs, alcohol or weapons* on school property with an arrest of the offender(s).

Call the **Crime Stoppers hotline at 766-7699** and help keep our community a safe place to live. Donations are always welcome. Look for donation boxes for the Crime Stoppers Program at various businesses throughout the City.

AUTOMATED PHONE ATTENDANT

The Police Department has installed and automated phone attendance when you call (414) 762-8200. If you are hearing-impaired calls utilizing a TDD system they must call in on (414) 766-6600.

Please share this information with friends, neighbors and relatives that are hearing impaired.

ILLEGAL U-TURNS

The Oak Creek Police Department has seen an increase in illegal U-turns, specifically at controlled intersections. All drivers are reminded that, according to the State of Wisconsin Traffic Code, a U-turn at any intersection at which traffic is being controlled by traffic control signals or by a traffic officer is illegal.

If a driver is cited for this violation, they will be subjected to a \$78.50 fine and 3 points for the first offense. Second offense violations will be subject to a \$116 fine and 3 points.



Please be aware that making a U-turn at a controlled intersection is a very dangerous maneuver and could cause an accident with oncoming vehicles.

TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

According to the Municipal Code, all persons going door-to-door soliciting must be licensed by the City of Oak Creek and must wear a photo ID badge. Non-profit and charitable organizations are not required to be licensed, but must be registered at the Police Department. If you are aware of someone soliciting without proper identification, please contact the Police Department at 762-8200.

BLOCK PARTIES

If you are planning to hold a "block party", please be aware that City officials require approval. You will need to stop by the City Clerk's office approximately two weeks (or more) in advance to fill out an application, along with a map detailing where the party is to be held. The Police, Fire and Street Departments, along with the Alderperson of your district, require approval. No fee is required.

If barricades will be needed to block off a portion of the street, you will be responsible for pickup and delivery from the Street Division, 800 W. Puetz Rd., 570-5682, before 3 p.m. Friday.

FORESTRY & PARKS

MUCH ADO ABOUT COTTONWOOD

Eastern cottonwood (*Populus deltoids*) is a tree in the willow family and more narrowly related to the poplars. Named after its cottony fruit that disperses late May to July. It easily maintains a presence in the suburban landscape because of its ability to naturalize and to tolerate adverse conditions, including urban conditions such as soil compaction, contaminants and disturbance. Often times it is these low-ground



trees that remain after development because wetlands are not to be disturbed during development.

Cottonwood can be a very aggressive tree, sending out root sprouts from even a dead trunk and, capable of growing more than five feet a year. Fast growth usually translates into brittle, weak wood and cottonwood is no

exception.




Cottonwood is associated with wet areas, river bottoms and prairie, in its natural habitat, but will live well on upland soils. It can survive floods and its thick

bark is fire tolerant, a prairie-sustaining natural phenomenon. Its massiveness can be impressive in the plains states. My favorite in this area is at the entrance to the McKinnley Arena on Lake Drive. There it has a bluff buffer between a parkway area and the multifamily residential neighborhood of Prospect Avenue. I'm not sure that I ever saw it produce cotton. Perhaps it is a natural male cultivar. Speaking of cotton... Each year, City Forestry receives a flood of residential complaints regard-

ing cottonwood trees. In fact, no other tree species generates anywhere near the complaints.

In Oak Creek, as in most Wisconsin communities, cottonwood is not illegal. Often times the tree was there before the house. However, when it comes to selecting trees for your yard and getting along with some



neighbors, cottonwood is not a good selection. According to the horticultural world guru Michael Dirr, "....impressive in river bottoms and should remain there."

EMERALD ASH BORER UPDATE

The Emerald ash borer (EAB), an invasive asian beetle that has established well in the state of Michigan, is slowly crossing the line. Also found in parks of Ontario, Canada, Ohio and Indiana. This summer it was

found in the upper peninsula of Michigan. At this time, no chemical treatments are know to keep EAB from attacking trees. Stay tuned. One way you can help slow the spread is to refrain from moving

OPEN AIR SHELTER: (OAK LEAF & JOHNSTONE PARK)

Up to 4 hours \$10 Daily(over 4 hrs) \$20

VOLLEYBALL SETS OR THROW BASES:

Limited availability, call in advance to reserve.

- \$10/weekend (Fri/Sat/Sun) Late fee: \$5 per day
- \$5/daily (Monday thru Thursday) Late fee: \$5 per day
- All rentals require \$15 refundable security deposit

PARKS

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:

The possession, sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages &/or drugs is not allowed in parks, buildings, tennis courts, ballfields or any athletic field areas, etc.

BEER PERMIT--FEE \$10:

Beer permits may be purchased which allows the consumption of beer by adults aged 21 & over when one of our facilities is rented (i.e. Miller Park shelter). No other alcoholic beverages may be consumed such as liquor, wine coolers, etc.

HENRY MILLER PARK PAVILION:

Oak Creek residents may rent Henry Miller Park Pavilion for your special events.

- 2006 Reservations open on Tuesday, January 3, 2006.
- \$80 rental fee plus \$40 refundable security deposit for Friday thru Sunday *including holiday rentals*. (\$40 refund if cancelled prior to 30 days of the event).

MILWAUKEE COUNTY BIKE TRAIL CONSTRUCTION-UPDATE

The North Shore Trail-Root River Extension that currently connects the North Shore Bike Trail at County Line Road, extends west using County Line Road and Milwaukee

County parklands has been extended west from the East Randy Road subdivision connection to Howell Avenue. The North Shore box culvert project will allow bicycles to travel under Highway 100 when biking to the North Shore-Oak Leaf trail. The

box culvert is presently being constructed, but don't look for the project to be completed and the trail open until early 2006.

GREENLAWN PARK BIKE TRAILHEAD PARKING LOT

The City developed an eight parking stall parking lot at Greenlawn Park at 7628 South Howell Avenue to serve the Oak Leaf Bike Trail segment that starts at the Manitoba Avenue cul-de-sac.

SKATE PARK



The Oak Creek Skate Park is located on the east side of the East Middle School building, 9330 S. Shepard Avenue.

The installation of the skate park components was completed in

September of 2005 & the skate park is currently open for use from sunrise (no earlier than 6 AM) to dusk. The facility is closed on school days from sunrise to 4 PM. The facility is for skateboarding, inline skating and BMX bikes only (street bicycles are prohibited).



PET LICENSE INFORMATION

ATTENTION NEW RESIDENTS AND NEW PET OWNERS:

Wisconsin State Statutes, Section 174 makes it mandatory for pets to be licensed.

The City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs and cats



over five months of age. License applications are available at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office. Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. You may mail in the certificate along with your application and fee, and it will be returned with your license. The license year commences January 1 and ends December 31. Beginning April 1,

a late fee will be assessed except for:

A **new resident** who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or;

A resident who obtains a dog or cat on or after April 1st, and who licenses such pet within 30 days or,

A resident who owns a dog or cat that is not five months of age on or before March 31st, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

RENEWALS:

If you licensed your pet for 2005, on or before September 30, 2005, you should receive a 2006 renewal notice from Milwaukee County near the end of December or beginning of January. If you licensed your pet for 2005 on or after October 1, 2005, Milwaukee County will not send you a renewal notice. Please bring in the 2005 application along with a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date). Whether or not you receive a renewal notice from Milwaukee County, it is your responsibility to license your pet for 2006, on or before March 31, 2006.

NOXIOUS WEED ORDINANCE

NOXIOUS WEED ORDINANCE

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT:

- (a) In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s. 66.96(1), Wisconsin Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chickory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, Burdock.
- (b) Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts

shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six (6) inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).

The City Weed Commissioner may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.98(1) Wis. Stats.

(c) The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.

FINE PRINT: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the participants and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

WHO'S THE TEACHER?

The Recreation Department assigns the most qualified leaders available to all program activities. Your feedback regarding instructors/leaders is always welcome.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the needs of the program, including leadership, equipment, and supplies, etc.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children of residents who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Please contact the office if you need financial assistance.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Please give us a call! There is no charge for transfers between programs.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged for each refund requested by an individual.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity. Overpayments must be picked up in the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Office within 2 weeks of notification to avoid forfeiture (under \$5) or a \$3 check processing fee (over \$5).

IS THERE CLASS TODAY?

AMIA RESIDENT?

A non-resident fee is set for most activities. The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is not within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. All individuals or groups registering in classes or activities must show proof of City residency such as a current State of Wisconsin driver's license, a current utility bill, etc. each time they register.
