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HEALTH DEPARTMENT

WELCOME!



The Oak Creek Health Department welcomes a new Health Officer! Judith Price, BSN, MS, joined the Oak Creek Health Department on August 28, 2006. Judith has had 24 years of Public Health Nursing experience, working in Walworth County, Kenosha County and Texas. She also spent

a few weeks working in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. Her most recent experiences included 7 years as the Health Officer for the Caledonia/Mt. Pleasant Health Department.

COLD & FLU SEASON

Cold and flu season is upon us, & while both are caused by viruses, there are differences in the symptoms you can expect. *Cold symptoms include*: slow onset; headache is rare; runny nose, sneezing; mild fatigue; cough, chest discomfort; sore throat; fever (rare in adults, may occur in small children). *Flu symptoms include*: swift, severe onset; flushed, hot, moist skin; 102-104 degree temperature; chills, body aches; extreme fatigue; can last 2-3 weeks; cough, sore throat.

Cold and flu viruses are generally spread from person to person via respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs or sneezes. People may also become infected by touching something with the virus on it & then touching their mouth, nose, or eyes.



The following steps may help to prevent the spread of cold and flu viruses:

- * Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze – throw the tissue away after you use it.
- * Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. If you are not near water, use an alcohol –based hand cleaner.
- * Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick, too.
- * If you get the flu, stay home from work, school, and social gatherings. In this way you will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- * **Try not to touch your eyes, nose, or mouth**. Germs often spread this way.

The Centers for Disease Control recommends the following steps to proper hand washing:

- 1. Hands should be washed using soap and warm, running water.
- 2. Hands should be rubbed vigorously during washing for at least 20 seconds with special attention paid to the backs of the hands, wrists, between the fingers and under the fingernails.

- 3. Hands should be rinsed well while leaving the water running.
- 4. With the water running, hands should be dried with a single-use towel.
- 5. Turn off the water using a paper towel, covering washed hands to prevent re-contamination.

ARE YOU AN OWNER OF A DOG OR CAT?

Veterinary Hospitals/Clinics in the area have noticed an increased in confirmed cases of **Blastomycosis** in dogs residing in Oak Creek. After speaking with Dr. Y. Belay, Veterinarian for the State, she stated "that blastomycosis is found in the soil and environment such as in wooded areas, rivers, streams and that WI does have a higher rate than other states. For some reason the conditions are right to harbor this fungus and that there is nothing to do except make the owners aware of this disease. If their animal shows signs of symptoms, the owner should take them to their veterinarian."

Blastomycosis is a systemic fungal infection that affects dogs, cats and humans; however humans do not get this disease from their pet. Nearly all human blastomycosis cases are due to inhalation of spores from the environment. Blastomycosis is transmitted through inhaled fungal spores found in the soil. Since sniffing the ground is a behavior of dogs, they are exposed to this fungus more so than cats. The incubation period is from 5 to 12 weeks and some dogs don't show clinical signs for a long time after being infected. According to Becky Lundgren, DVM, "once the lung disease develops, yeast forms of the organism spread throughout the body. Organs typically affected include eyes, bones, skin, lymph nodes, subcutaneous tissues, brain, and testes. It can also be found in the nose, prostate, liver, mammary glands, and heart, but those locations are less common".

"The signs of illness will depend on what organs are infected and may include one or all of the following: loss of appetite, depression, weight loss, fever (103 degrees or higher), coughing, shortness of breath, exercise intolerance, enlarged lymph nodes, eye disease, or skin lesions that drain bloody or pus-like material" (K. Hutton, DVM). Diagnosis consists of bloods tests, X-Rays, urinalysis, cultures or biopsies.

Treatment involves various antifungal medications. There is no vaccination available at this time. Please contact your veterinarian if you have further questions.

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- National origin/Ancestry
- Color
 Disability

• Sex

- Religion Marital status
- Sexual orientation
- Lawful source of income
 Age
 Family status (household composition, including presence of children)
- Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

METROPOLITAN MILWAUKEE FAIR HOUSING COUNCIL

In this day & age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle & difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability.

The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

- You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign.
- You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, & the landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along.

- A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- You are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- •You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are.
- A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent reason.
- Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court.

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws & what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the **Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.**

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination.
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination.
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law.

In addition, the Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic & religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers & other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law & housing discrimination. **Please call Felita Daniels Ashley at 414-278-1240 to schedule a presentation.**

Avoid delays in processing your payment which could result in delinquent tax by reading this important information. For questions call the Treasurer's Office at (414) 768-6501.

PERMANENT ADDRESS CHANGES - call our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506. No address changes are made by the Treasurer's Office. Each year tax bills are mailed to the mailing address on record unless you call for a SPECIAL MAIL-ING REQUEST before December 1st.

Make CHECKS(s) payable to Treasurer or City of Oak Creek. Please DO NOT STAPLE your check to your tax bill, DO NOT COMBINE with any other payments and DO NOT send correspondence with your payment. Checks not properly completed or endorsed may be returned unprocessed and your taxes could become delinquent. Receipts are invalid until the check clears our bank. Checks returned from the bank for any reason are subject to a \$25.00 recovery fee and the payment is void. A full replacement payment plus recovery fee, with cash or certified funds, must be received by the original due date to avoid interest and penalties.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

NEW - PAY YOUR TAXES BY CREDIT CARD

We are pleased to announce the availability of credit card payments for payment of real estate taxes and personal property taxes. In cooperation with the City of Oak Creek, Official Payments Corporation offers individuals and businesses the opportunity to pay property tax by way of a credit card by telephone or directly over the Internet. This service is safe, reliable, and in accordance with all state and government regulations. In order to process your payment, *Official Payments Corporation, the credit card service provider, charges a convenience fee based on the amount of the transaction, currently 2.75% subject to change without notice.*

Easy Payment via Telephone or Internet (We <u>cannot</u> accept credit card payments in person; however, we will have a computer available at City Hall).

To pay by telephone call toll-free 1-800-272-9829 (Please enter Jurisdiction Code <u>6717</u> when prompted) or visit www.officialpayments.com to pay taxes **over the Internet** (link also available on the City's website at <u>www.oakcreekwi.org</u>). You will be asked to enter information such as: type of tax (Real Estate or Personal Property), total of your payment, parcel number (located in the upper right hand corner of your tax bill), and credit card information. Please have your tax bill and credit card available.

The system will tell you the total of your payment, including the appropriate fee; obtain approval of the charge and issue an onscreen confirmation number and a printable digital receipt. Confirmation is emailed to users who request it. The charge will also appear on your credit card statement: the tax amount will appear on one line and the convenience fee amount on a separate line.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Any payment not made on or before its due date will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance. Taxes are delinquent if payment is received in person, in the drop box, or *post-marked, after the due date. The *postmark governs the date of payment – NOT the date on your check. There is no

grace period. All DELINQUENT TAX accumulates INTER-

EST AND PENALTY back to February 1st at 1¹/₂ percent per month on the unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. Notices for delinquent 2006 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed in June 2007. Payment of 2006 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2007, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection. All PRIOR YEAR(S) DELINQUENT **REAL ESTATE TAX** must be paid to Milwaukee County Treasurer's Office; call (414) 278-4033 for more details.



Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO RECEIVE. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general

property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

If you did not receive the Lottery and Gaming Credit in 2005 but are eligible in 2006, please complete a form available at the Treasurer's Office or on the website at www.oakcreekwi.org (click on City Departments then Treasurer's Office). If you include a completed form with your tax payment you may deduct the credit from your first payment (the amount of the credit is available on the Treasurer's page of the website). We must receive a completed form no later than January 31, 2006 for us to apply the lottery and gaming credit to your 2006 property tax bill.

Beginning with 2003, tax information is available on the Oak Creek website at www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). Search by parcel number, name, or address. Computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). FIRE DEPARTMENT

On October 2, 2006 the fire service in Milwaukee County, including the City of Oak Creek stepped into a new era of cooperation and response for protecting the lives and property against harm from large-scale emergencies, natural disasters, man-made catastrophes, and acts of terrorism. The City of Oak Creek became part of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System, referred to as MABAS.

MABAS is an association of over 1,400 fire departments across six states (IL, IA, IN, MI, MO, and WI), federated together through signed agreements to provide fire and emergency medical services mutual aid. The primary purpose of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System is to request and coordinate the effective and efficient use of all fire service resources. The system is based on standardized incident management and resource allocation systems to seamlessly move help where it is needed; the system provides a framework to coordinate and utilize the resources from the Federal to the local levels; the system is based in regional cooperation in solving challenges and in sharing resources to meet those challenges.

The Mutual Aid Box Alarm System begun in the late 1960's and has experienced slow growth primarily in Illinois until the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. Since that time, MABAS has grown exponentially. In April 2006, Governor Doyle signed SB 642 which identifies MABAS as the mutual aid plan in Wisconsin. The Mutual Aid Box Alarm System is now recognized as a national model of cooperation and deployment of fire service resources to major incidents.

In the wake of Hurricane Katrina disaster, MABAS was on the ground in Louisiana in 26 hours from the request, arriving on Sunday, September 4, 2005, days before Federal and regional resources begun their deployment; they moved 600 firefighters and 75 firefighting vehicles to hurricane ravaged areas of Louisiana and Mississippi; MABAS made the difference in many lives. MABAS will provide the same protection and safety to our City, County and the State of Wisconsin.

"THE BEST WE CAN DO IS THE LEAST WE CAN

DO" is the motto of the Oak Creek Fire Department Honor Guard Team. Approximately 2 years ago, now retired Fire Chief Gerard Hammernik approached FF Peter Joncas with the idea of organizing an Honor Guard team to Honor retired fallen Fire Fighters and to participate in community events as a Color Guard Team. The team began by marching in the 4th of July parade and has expanded their exposure to at least 10 events per year. The *all volunteer* team is supported from donations by individuals and businesses in the community. "We are for-

tunate to have good support from the community," said FF Joncas who is designated as the Honor Guard Commander. The 13 member team is comprised of Fire Fighters, Lieutenants, and Captains. "It can get pretty hectic trying to schedule training and events plus throw in an unexpected funeral around a Fire Fighters schedule. But, it is worth every minute of it", says Joncas.

The team also aids other area Fire Departments at their events. Most recently, Joncas and FF Jack Rehn, Vice Commander, provided protocol expertise to the South Milwaukee Fire Department for the funeral of a retired Fire Chief.

Both Joncas and Rehn have attended a week long Honor Guard camp in Goshen, Indiana. They trained in basic

drill movements, marching, casket movement and proper flag etiquette. The week ended with a mock line of duty death funeral with full honors for a fallen Fire Fighter. Each



member of the class was assigned a certain task to perform. FF John Martin and FF Gary Hildebrandt are scheduled to attend the Camp in the spring. The team's goal is to have as many members as possible attend the camp to give everyone a good foundation for Honor Guard duty.

"Our vision is to attain the highest level of professional appearance and to bestow the highest honor to a fallen Fire Fighter in a line of duty death and to support community events", says FF Rehn.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

CAN CARS CAUSE WATER POLLUTION?

We have all seen how a bright fresh new snow turns dirty & dark in areas near roads & parking lots after only a couple of days. This is just one way to visualize the effects of some of the pollution left by our cars & trucks. Each time it snows again, a fresh new layer covers the old grimy layer, until layers of pollution are trapped within the snow banks. Once spring comes, the pollution & particles trapped in the layer of snow will wash with the snow melt into our streams, rivers & lakes. What does not wash off with the snow melt itself, will be left on the pavement until the next rain storm comes along to wash it clean.

Take a look at a parking lot the next time it rains. During the early part of the rain, you may notice an oily sheen, green streaks of leaked antifreeze, & dark gritty particles in the puddles. Look again after it has rained for a while, & you may notice that the oily sheen is no longer there, & the puddles no longer look gritty. Most of us don't stop to think that the ground now looks so clean only because the pollution has been washed away by the rain water, & carried along with the rain water into the storm sewers & ditches, which empty into our lakes & streams with no treatment to remove these pollutants first.

We all know that when the tread on our tires wears away, we need to replace them. What we don't usually think about is that all the rubber from the tire tread is left on the roads,



parking lots, & driveways in the form of small rubber particles. These get washed away during rain storms, & are deposited into our rivers & lakes. Tiny bits of brake pads & rusted metal from cars also get washed into the waterways.

If you change your own oil, do not dump it into a storm drain. Just five quarts of oil from a single oil change can create an oil slick the size of two football fields, or pollute a million gallons of drinking water.¹ Recycling is the only safe way to dispose of used motor oil.

The City has initiated a program to identify & prevent illicit discharges throughout the City. City staff are visually inspecting outfalls throughout the City, & conducting chemical sampling if a dry weather flow is present. Most dry weather flows are from sources such as sump pump discharges or lawn sprinklers. However, if the testing shows a parameter is present that indicates illicit discharge, further investigation will be conducted to find & eliminate the source of the illicit discharge. This is one of the ways in which the City is working to protect & improve the quality of our water resources.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

PARKING RESTRICTIONS

The Police Department would like to remind all citizens that

winter parking restrictions are in effect until April 1st. During this time, there is no parking allowed on the streets in the City of Oak Creek during the following hours:

- Monday thru Friday from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m.
- Saturday & Sunday from 2:30 a.m. to 6 a.m.

Permission may be granted by the Police Department (on a day-to-day basis) for exceptions to this during emergencies, if a vehicle becomes disabled, or if there is an overnight guest.

UTILITY PROBLEMS

During severe weather, the Police Department receives an abundance of telephone calls from residents wishing to report utility problems. These problems should be reported directly to the respective utility company at their 24-hour phone numbers:. See back cover of *Acorn* for Utility Phone Number Listings.

SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

The blowing and/or shoveling of snow onto City streets are in violation of the City of Oak Creek Municipal Code,

Section 6.24(c) as follows: "Prohibited Placement. No person except the State, County or City shall deposit or cause to be deposited, upon any street, alley, sidewalk,

parkway, or public land, any snow or ice taken or removed from his premises. No person except the State,



County, or City shall use private or pub-. .

the disposal or dumping of snow or ice from public or private property or from another municipality except with the permission of the owner. The deposit of any snow or ice upon any street, alley, sidewalk, parkway, or public lands of the City, contrary to the provisions of this Chapter, shall be & is hereby declared to be a nuisance. The City may remove any snow & ice so deposited & cause the costs of such removal to be charged to the owner or occupant of the property from which said snow or ice was removed & illegally deposited, pursuant to Section 66.60(16), Wis. Stats."

Property owners are also required to keep clear their mailboxes & fire hydrants on their property per Section 6.24(d) as follows: "Hydrants & Mailboxes. Every property owner or occupant shall keep all fire hydrants & mailboxes abutting his/her property free & clear of all snow & ice."

EMERALD ASH BORER - SIGNS & SYMPTOMS OF INVASION

City forestry would like the City of Oak Creek to be informed and prepared for emerald ash borer (EAB) invasion which will likely occur in the next 5 to 10 years. We have received at least 50 calls in 2006 regarding this insect which tells us that information is being received. We are always happy to provide information and investigate sites that are truly suspect.

First, learn to identify ash trees. A picture in the Acorn



will do very little as we do not have the space to provide clarity. Most people have some access to the internet or a tree book (both available at the library). One thing for sure, they haven't changed in the last 100 years, so, even an old text will do. You can always call forestry and we will provide you with local

examples for you to visit in your neighborhood. Ash trees are everywhere.

In Wisconsin we have green, white, black and blue ash. Most commonly the green and white ash types are used in urban landscapes. Mountain ash and prickly ash are not true ash and do not get destroyed by EAB.

Signs and Symptoms of Ash Borer

Here are the major factors of ash decline associated with EAB:

- 1. 1/8-inch, capital D-shaped exit holes (where the adult insect exits the tree).
- 2. Thinning of leaves followed by dieback of branches, usually beginning in the top of the tree.
- 3. Splits in tree bark.
- 4. Epicormic or water sprouts sprouts that emerge from buds activated under the bark of the tree usually due to a disturbance, for instance, a wound. Ash likes to react to pruning much this way.
- 5. Squiggly, S-shaped, meandering galleries just under the bark layer. These galleries are packed with frass the sawdust exuded by the worm-like borer.
- The presence of the insect itself either the borer or the adult beetle. The borer ¹/₂-inch long, cream colored and segmented. The adult beetle is a dark green metallic color (with a bronzy colored body under its wings). It is 3/8 to 5/8 inches in length.
- 7. Woodpecker damage.

It is worth noting that some of the symptoms are specific and some are not. The size and shape of adult exit holes and the tunneling pattern of the borer galleries are very specific. Crown thinning, dieback, epicormic sprouting and woodpecker activity would indicate something is awry but are not dead sure signs of EAB.

How EAB Destroys Trees

EAB can arrive to a new site or tree as an adult beetle or a larva (borer) under the bark of wood. Because of this, the state and federal agencies dealing with this



invasion are outlawing the movement of firewood and establishing quarantines for wood movement in areas where EAB has established.



The EAB life cycle is very similar to other borers: adults lay eggs on ash tree bark in May/June. Eggs hatch into a first stage larva that no doubt have amazing mouths that can

eat through the bark and into the cambium. (The cambium is the layer where the sap (phloem) and water (xylem) transport system is found. A functioning cambium is essential to tree life. The larva then begins eating sap and grows until it is about a half inch long. Larva feeding may last all winter.

In spring, metamorphosis occurs and the adult emerges head first from the tree leaving the D shape in the bark which is, in fact, the shape and size of its body – from a frontal or face view - very precise. The adult will then fly off to mate and lay eggs on perhaps another ash tree close by. Adults emerge in May and June and may even be around and detectable a bit past August.

Plan for the Future

Finally, get your mind prepared for fewer trees in the landscape once EAB has arrived. Less shade will mean higher cooling costs. You might even get started planting a replacement now so that it has a chance to grow before you lose that big ash in your front or back yard.

PARK & OPEN SPACE PLAN UPDATE

The City is in the process of updating the 5-Year Park & Open Space plan. The main purpose of a Park & Open Space Plan is:

- 1. Assess the need for park land within the City as a whole;
- 2. Identify a workable system of regional, community,' neighborhood and sub-neighborhood park facilities;
- 3. Identify & propose acquisition of lands that are suited for park & open space purposes;
- 4. Suggest standards for park facility development;
- Prioritize proposals for acquisition an development based on objective analysis of needs & resources; and
- 6. In order to be eligible for grant assistance for the acquisition & development of local parks (ADLP) local units of government must adopt a local comprehensive outdoor recreation plan.

Some other items addressed in the plan will be:

- 1. Bikeways & recreational trails
- 2. Preservation & enhancement of the City's Urban Forest
- 3. Identify & plan for new recreational trends

Public input is an important component of the planning process. Watch for public information meeting announcements this fall.



REIMBURSEMENT FOR CITY DAMAGE TO MAILBOXES

In 2001, the City of Oak Creek adopted a policy to reimburse property owners for mailbox damage caused by city vehicles such as snowplows. This policy limits the city's liability to \$150 upon presentation of receipts for replacement. If the mailbox was not installed according to city & post office standards,



there will be no reimbursement. If the box was installed over the edge of the pavement or so low to the road that the snowplow blade couldn't pass under it, the property owner is responsible for repair/replacement. Contact the Street Department at 768-6552 to request repair if a plow has damaged your mailbox. Claims for replacement may be submitted to the City Clerk's office for review by the Small Claims Committee.

2007 CITY REVALUATION

The Common Council has made a policy decision to keep property values more in line with current market values by doing a revaluation of all property in the City of Oak Creek for 2007. The City of Oak Creek has contracted with Tyler Technologies | Cole-Layer-Trumble Company (CLT) to perform work for the 2007 revaluation.

Here are answers to some of the most common questions about the revaluation process:

What is a revaluation?

A revaluation is a complete examination of all assessments. In the process, some adjustments are made to guarantee that all property is assessed at 100% of market value. The goal is to fairly & equitably value each property so that taxpayers pay only their fair share.

Why is this being done?

The last revaluation was done in 2004, & due to changes in market conditions our current assessments generally are at about 85% of market value.

What revaluation activities will I see in my neighborhood?

CLT representatives will be visiting many areas of the City over the next few months to collect data & take photographs. The field crew will be verifying the accuracy of property data that is currently on file. The representatives may go onto your property, or may request entry into your home or building if an interior inspection is needed. Generally, interior inspections are needed if the home has been sold within the past two years, if remodeling has been done, or if requested by the property owner.

How can I be sure that someone entering my property is a CLT official?

All vehicles used by the revaluation personnel will display an identification sign & all field personnel will carry official City of Oak Creek photo identification cards. **PLEASE ASK FOR IDENTIFICATION FROM ANYONE REQUEST-ING ENTRY**. If you are in doubt about admitting someone, please call the Assessor's office or the Police Department to verify the individual's credentials BEFORE allowing them to enter.

When will I receive information about my assessment?

All property owners will receive a Notice of Assessment letter in the summer of 2007. The notice will include information about scheduling an open book appointment to review your assessment should you believe it to be incorrect. The notice will also contain information about the Board of Review.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

IS YOUR FAMILY PREPARED FOR A WINTER STORM OR DISASTER?

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the National Preparedness Month Coalition urge all Americans to take some simple steps to make their families better prepared for emergencies including:

Sheltering - When using alternative heat devices properly ventilate to avoid carbon monoxide dangers. Purchase a carbon monoxide detector. If you have no heat, close off unneeded rooms. Stuff towels, rags, or duct tape in the cracks under doors and cover windows at night.

Protect Yourself - Eat and drink food that provides the body with energy for producing its own heat. Keep the body replenished with fluids to prevent dehydration. Wear layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing. Remove layers to avoid overheating, perspiration and subsequent chill.

Get a Kit - Get a kit of emergency supplies that will allow you and your family to survive for at least three days in the event an emergency happens. When preparing for a possible emergency situation, it's best to think first about the basics of survival: fresh water, food, clean air and warmth. The kit should include basic items like water, food, battery-powered radio, flashlight, sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person and a first aid kit.

Make a Plan - Plan in advance what you and your family will do in an emergency. Your plan should include communications with other family members outside the affected area. Ask your child's school for a copy of their emergency plan for you to keep at home or work. And drive your planned evacuation route and plot alternate routes on a map in case main roads are blocked or grid locked. If you must evacuate, remember to take with you the 3 P's – purses (or wallets), pets, and pills.

Be Informed - Learn more about different threats that could affect your community and appropriate responses to them. Take advantage of free training courses like the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training and Tornado & Severe Weather Awareness Seminars. In addition, take CPR and first aid courses.

Get Involved - After preparing yourself and your family for possible emergencies, take the next step: get training in first aid and emergency response and get involved in preparing your community. Citizen Corps provides residents with opportunities to prepare, train and support local emergency responders.

The National Website for National Preparedness is <u>www.ready.gov</u>. This website has a wealth of information and is broken into three sections: Ready America, Ready

Business and Ready Kids. The website is easy to navigate and has many resources to help you be better prepared.



FINE PRINT: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, **age requirement will be as of the date of the first class,** unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office to arrange for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Transfers will be made at no charge, upon request, for persons who meet the age/skill level requirements of the class requested provided there is space available at the time of the request.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

OPEN HOUSE

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

MAKEUPS?

(i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participants attend classes other than the one they are registered for.

Cancelled activities by the Department will be rescheduled if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

HAVE A COMPLAINT?

If, after you begin a class it does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

DO YOU HAVE INSURANCE?

Insurance coverage for program participants is not provided by the Department or by the School District for Department sponsored activities. Please obtain your own insurance coverage for the duration of the activity.

AM I A RESIDENT?

The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is not within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. Current proof of City residency is required once per year (August-July). If proof of residency is not provided, the non-resident fee will apply.

WHAT IF?

My child wants to be on the same team or in a class with a friend or sibling?

Siblings who meet the requirements for the same class section or sports league will be placed together unless otherwise requested in writing by the parent or guardian.

All other requests for unrelated children to be placed together:

- are not guaranteed
- will be for a maximum of 3 persons
- may result in the entire group being placed on the waiting list
- must be in writing and signed by parents/guardians of both children

I want to register with my adult friend:

Please note:

- If one person is placed on the wait list, the entire group will be placed on the wait list
- If one person is a non-resident, the entire group will be processed during non-resident registration (if space is available)

PROOF OF DATE OF BIRTH

• All children are required to show proof of their date of birth at their first registration.

• If the child's name does not match the parent who is presenting proof of residency, proof of residency will be required for the child at their "first" registration.

WATER WORKS

Persons new to the program should read the skill descriptions for each level to determine their correct placement.

Age and height requirements are set for the safety & welfare of the students! *Please do not ask for an exception.*



BEFORE YOU GET WET!

Only lifeguards and SWIMMERS are permitted in the pool area during SWIM INSTRUCTION & OPEN SWIM.

For safety reasons, flotation devices, including life jackets and other equipment & toys are

not allowed during open swim.

Unexpected pool closings can occur. Always check to be sure the pool is open & has not reached maximum capacity before leaving children for open swim.




