Incredible blend of talented musicians with a unique chemistry that will provide a great evening of fun.


PIG & CHICKEN ROAST SEPTEMBER 7TH


Sunday, September 7th starting at noon brings the annual Pig and Chicken Roast to Oak Creek's very own Henry Miller Park.

OAK CREEK AND FRANKLIN HONORED FOR SOUTH 27TH STREET CORRIDOR EFFORTS



The Public Policy Forum recognized Oak Creek and Franklin for their collaborative work on the South 27th Street Corridor Project as part of its "Salute to Local Government" awards banquet held June 19. Both cities were awarded an Honorable Mention in

the Intergovernmental Cooperation category, which recognizes partnerships between governmental bodies.

"The South 27th Street Corridor is a monumental cooperative effort between Franklin and Oak Creek and it is estimated to bring \$2 billion in economic growth to our two cities," said Franklin Mayor Tom Taylor. "We are very grateful for this recognition."

Oak Creek Mayor Dick Bolender echoed this sentiment, "We are proud of this honor for our efforts. This project will grow our tax base, bring family-supporting jobs, and improve the quality of life for our residents."

Last year, Franklin and Oak Creek jointly received the 2007 Wisconsin Good Government Award for their cooperative planning efforts to prepare the South 27th Street Corridor for high-quality business development.



Fair Housing

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding & keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- Sex
- Color

- Disability
- Religion
- Marital Status

- Age
- Sexual Orientation
- National origin/Ancestry
- Lawful source of income
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

In this day & age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle & difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability.

The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

- → You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign.
- → You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, & the landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along.
- → A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- → You are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- → You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are
- → A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- → Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent reason.
- → Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims

of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court. If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws & what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

The Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic & religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers & other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law & housing discrimination. Illicit Discharges

As part of a permit required and issued by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the City of Oak Creek has implemented a program to detect and eliminate illegal connections or discharges to the storm water management system.

Many people do not realize that whatever enters catch basins and storm water inlets is carried directly to waterways and the lake without treatment. This is why it is so important to keep illicit substances out of the storm sewer system.

As part of this program, City staff will be inspecting storm water outfalls for certain things that may indicate an illicit discharge. The in-

spections are conducted during dry weather, since wet weather results in run off that makes it difficult to check for illicit discharge. If a flow is present during dry weather, staff will use some simple field tests to evaluate if substances such as detergent or



copper are in the water. This will help to determine if the flow is a legal flow, such as water from sump pumps, or an illegal discharge. If the discharge is a type that is prohibited, the City will conduct additional investigation to determine where the discharge is coming from, and work with the owner to eliminate the discharge.

Residents can help prevent pollution by not dumping down the storm drain. Chlorinated water from a swimming pool cannot be discharged down the storm drain unless the water has been de-chlorinated. Proper disposal of liquids is essential for the health of our waterways. Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District has several mobile and year round collection sites where you can properly dispose of items such as driveway sealer, antifreeze, or pool chemicals.

If you notice something being illegally discharged to the storm drain, you can report it to the **Engineering Department at** (414) 768-6541.

Fire Department

If you or someone you love is in need of emergency assistance, you want help to get there right away. Did you know that there's one thing everyone can do to help the firefighters provide this emergency assistance as quickly as possible? It's as simple as Moving to the Right for Sirens and Lights!

Every year in the U.S., there are almost 16,000 collisions involving fire department emergency vehicles while responding to or returning from incidents. These collisions result in over 1,000 firefighter injuries and almost fifty deaths.

Many people panic or simply don't adhere to the rules of the road for approaching emergency vehicles. The law is very specific; drivers must yield the right-of-way to an emergency vehicle, and failure to do so can cause serious accidents or delays in ambulances, fire engines and fire trucks arriving at the scene of an emergency. Firefighters are careful to avoid vehicle collisions by driving slowly when traveling against traffic, or coming to a complete stop at intersections. However, the cooperation of ALL vehicles on the roadway is essential.

There are some simple rules to follow when you're on the road and encounter an emergency vehicle:



DO:

- ⇒Stay calm.
- ⇒Pull to the right and come to a complete stop.
- ⇒If you're traveling on a high-speed road or if there is no room to stop, slow down as much as possible.
- ⇒If you are in the left lane, pull over into the right lane as traffic in the lane to your right moves over.
- ⇒ When an emergency vehicle approaches you from behind while you are stopped at an intersection, stay where you are unless you can pull to the right.
- ⇒Be careful when driving by or around a motor vehicle accident or any situation where emergency vehicles are parked and the firefighters are working.
- ⇒ Drivers should stay at least 500 feet behind emergency vehicles.

DON'T:

- ⇒Don't panic.
- ⇒Don't play your radio so loudly that you are unable to hear sirens.
- ⇒Don't stop in the middle lane when there is room to pull to the right.
- ⇒Don't pull to the left in the center lane or left turn lane.
- ⇒Don't race ahead to make the green light or turn before the emergency vehicle gets there.
- ⇒Don't drive through a red light or stop sign when an emergency vehicle approaches from behind.
- ⇒Don't disregard the presence of the emergency vehicle by continuing to drive.
- ⇒Don't pass emergency vehicles that are traveling with their lights and siren on.

Week. This year's theme is "Prevent Home Fires." The Oak Creek
Fire Department will be stopping

by area schools to deliver this important fire prevention message.

Here are some tips to help keep your family safe:

- ✓ Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, broiling, or grilling food. Any time you leave the kitchen, turn off the stove.
- ✓ Keep lamps, light bulbs and portable heaters away from anything that can burn; such as bedding, curtains and clothing.
- Keep matches and lighters in a place where children cannot access them.
- ✓ Blow out candles when you leave the room.
- ✓ Test your smoke alarms once a month.
- ✓ Have a home fire escape plan and practice it with your family.

"Undoubtedly, my Air Force firefighting experience helped to prepare me for my career with Oak Creek." Said Giesenschlag. Roy was promoted to Lieutenant December of 1998. He has been in charge of Hazardous Materials Operations and is active in the Firefighter's Union. Giesenschlag says one of the biggest changes in his career as been the advent of computers. "The Fire Service has followed along with the rest of the world. Everything used to be done with paper and pencil. Now it's almost all on computer. Technology has greatly improved effi-

Health Department

DUE TO THE RECENT MEASLES OUTBREAK, DID YOU KNOW THAT THE HEALTH OFFICER CAN ISSUE ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE ORDERS?

Isolation and Quarantine are two actions that can be taken by public health authorities to contain the spread of a contagious disease. Isolation and quarantine are different from one another in that isolation is for people who are known to have an illness or disease, and quarantine is for people who may have been exposed to an illness or disease but are not yet sick. During an outbreak of a contagious disease or a flu pandemic situation, it may be necessary for the Health Department to order isolation or quarantine of citizens. In a situation such as this, it will be critical to understand what you may be asked or required to do. Please follow any instructions given by the health officials.


What can you do? It is always important to avoid close contact with people who are sick. If you are ill, please stay home and away from others as much as possible. Do not go to work sick and do not send sick children to school or day care. Always practice good hygiene habits such as washing your hands and covering your cough. These two simple actions can greatly slow or stop the spread of many diseases.

FREE 2008-2009 SCHOOL YEAR REQUIREMENTS FOR IMMUNIZATIONS

Students in these grades will need <u>ad</u>-ditional immunizations:

Day Care Centers – Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine

Grade K – a second dose of Varicella (chickenpox)



Grade 12 - one dose of Tdap* and a second dose of Varicella Waivers are available for health, religious and personal convictions.

*Tdap is not required if the student has had a dose of Td within the last 5 years.

FLU AND PNEUMONIA VACCINATIONS

Did you know that the CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices now recommends that all children ages 6 months to 18 years receive an annual flu shot? Consider immunizing your children to decrease the spread of the influenza virus. Please call 768-6525 after October 1st to make your appointment. Vaccinations will be based on availability and priority guidelines. Childhood vaccine administration fees are \$5 per child for residents or \$10 per child for non residents. Costs for adults are \$30 for the Flu vaccine and \$40 for the Pneumonia vaccine. We accept Medicare Part B (excluding Managed Care/Medicare programs).

MOSQUITO CONTROL



West Nile Virus

Mosquitoes can be quite pesky! Follow some simple mosquito control techniques.

- * Use a mosquito repellent with DEET do not apply directly to the face.
- * Wear long pants and shirts with long sleeves.
- * Mosquitoes are more "active during the dusk; schedule your activities inside during those times.
- * Mosquitoes lay their eggs on/in water. Make sure you do not have "standing" water in your yard. Watch for crevices in planters or tire swings. If you have a pond or drainage ditch inspect it regularly for signs of eggs. Change water in wading pools every 3-4 days.

Some mosquitoes transmit diseases such as West Nile Virus.

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF LYME DISEASE?

If you are in areas where ticks may be present, the following precautions can reduce the risk of acquiring Lyme disease:



- * Wear a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, and high socks with pant cuffs tucked into the socks.
- * Light colored clothing will make ticks easier to find. Walk in the center of mowed trails to avoid brushing up against vegetation.
- * Conduct thorough "tick checks" on yourself and your children after spending time outdoors.
- * Prompt removal of ticks, even after they have attached, can drastically reduce the chance of Lyme disease transmission.
- * Insect repellents containing 0.5% permethrin or 20-30% DEET have been shown to be effective in repelling deer ticks. If such products are used, be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions on the label.

Free tick ID cards are available at the Health Department.

REMINDER: WINTER PARKING

- Saturday and Sunday from 2:30 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.

SCHOOL BUS LIGHTS



With the start of the new school year, motorists are reminded to use caution when approaching school buses. Motorists should stop their vehicle not less than 20 feet from

the bus when it is displaying flashing red warning lights and remain stopped until the bus resumes motion or extinguishes the flashing lights. School bus operators may submit a written report to the Police Department of those vehicles illegally passing a school bus with its red warning lights flashing. Upon receipt of this information, the Police Department will prepare a traffic citation and serve it upon the owner of the vehicle in violation. The fine for such violation is \$235. Help keep our children safe this school year—

WISCONSIN WELL WOMAN PROGRAM (WWWP)

The WWWP provides breast and cervical cancer screening

services to qualifying women in Wisconsin. Eligibility requirements are:

- * Women age 35-64 (new limitations on services for ages 35-44)
- * No health insurance, or insurance does not cover routine check-ups and screening, OR unable to pay deductibles or co-payments
- * Income is at or below 250% of the federal poverty level

Please call the Oak Creek Health Department at 768-6525 to make an appointment. A public health nurse will help you complete the enrollment process.

FIREARMS SAFETY

As hunting season approaches, it is important to remind our residents of the importance of firearms safety. The majority of accidents that involve a firearm occur in the house. The accidents are a result of negligent handling, improper storage and carelessness. The accidents usually end tragically with serious injuries or even death. Firearms accidents are preventable by following these few simple rules:

- KNOW how your firearm operates and PRACTICE safe handling procedures.
- TREAT every firearm as if it were loaded.
- ALWAYS point a firearm in a safe direction.
- NEVER point a firearm at anything that you do not intend to kill or destroy.
- Use your firearm only for its intended purpose.
- NEVER rely on the firearm's safety.
- NEVER leave a firearm unattended.
- LOCK, TRANSPORT and STORE your firearm(s) properly.
- NEVER use your firearm after consuming alcohol or drugs.
- Make sure that each family member takes a firearms safety course.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY

With Halloween just around the corner, the Police Department would like to remind parents of a few tips to keep your children safe while trick-or-treating:

- Children should always trick-ortreat with an adult or older sibling.
- Costumes should be reflective, flame retardant, and should fit properly to prevent trips & falls.
- Consider wearing makeup instead of a mask which may hinder or restrict your child's vision.
- Stay in neighborhoods with people whom you are familiar with.
- Remind children not to eat their goodies before an adult can check them.
- Eat only unopened candies and those in original wrappers only.



- Put your outside house light on to show that your family is participating in trick-or treating.
- Remove objects from your yard that might present a hazard to trick-or-treaters.
- Keep an eye out for suspicious activities or persons in your neighborhood.

FALL CLEAN-UP BEGINS NOVEMBER 17, 2008

The Street Department will conduct a spring clean up beginning on November 17, 2008. **Items that will be picked up are as follows:**

- Yard Waste; excluding leaves, grass and branches
- Appliances (A \$15 fee will be charged for pick up of freon appliances. This fee must be paid prior to November 14, 2008, to be eligible for pick up on November 17th.)
- Construction Materials; *not resulting from a contractor*
- Mattresses
- Wood
- Televisions
- Carpeting/Rugs
- Furniture

Items that will not be picked up are as follows:

- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves / Branches
- Fluorescent Tubes

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside prior to November 17th in order to be guaranteed a pick up.

FINAL BRANCH PICK-UP



The last branch pick up for 2008 will begin October 1st. Residents are reminded that branches should be placed at the curb or roadside prior to the 1st to guarantee a pick up.

Branches are to be placed in an orderly manner with the cut ends facing the road.

The next branch pick up will be April 1, 2009

RAKING OF LEAVES INTO THE STREET IS PROHIBITED

The City of Oak Creek has adopted Ordinance No. 1984 which prohibits property owners from placing leaves, grass, yard waste or rubbish in the street, alley

or sidewalk areas. For your convenience, the ordinance reads as follows:

"No owner or occupant shall allow the street, alley or sidewalk pavements abutting on his premises to be littered with rubbish, dirt, grass, leaves or yard waste as defined in S. 8.40. If such

dirt, grass, leaves or yard waste as defined in owner or occupant shall refuse or fail to remove any such rubbish, dirt, grass, leaves or yards waste as defined in S.8.40 when notified to do so by the Common Council or designee, the City may cause it to be done and the cost thereof shall be reported to the City Clerk who shall spread the cost on the tax roll as a special tax against the premises, pursuant to Sec. 66.66(16), Wis. States. or such cost may be covered in action against the owner or occupant."



The City of Oak Creek does not pick up leaves curbside. Residents may bring their leaves to the drop-off site located at 720 West Puetz Road, Monday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

The blowing and/or shoveling of snow onto City streets are in vi-



olation of the City of Oak Creek Municipal Code. Section 6.24(c) reads as follows: "Prohibited Placement. No person except the State, County or City shall deposit or cause to be deposited, upon any street, alley, sidewalk, parkway, or public land, any snow or ice taken or removed from his

premises. No person except the State, County, or City shall use private or public lands within the City as a place for the disposal or dumping of snow or ice from public or private property or from another municipality except with the permission of the owner. The deposit of any snow or ice upon any street, alley, sidewalk, parkway, or public lands of the City, contrary to the provisions of this Chapter, shall be and is hereby declared to be a nuisance. The City may remove any snow and ice so deposited and cause the costs of such removal to be charged to the owner or occupant of the property from which said snow or ice was removed and illegally deposited, pursuant to Section 66.60(16), Wis. Stats."

Property owners are also required to keep clear their mailboxes and fire hydrants on their property per Section 6.24(d) as follows: "Hydrants and Mailboxes. Every property owner or occupant shall keep all fire hydrants and mailboxes abutting his/her property free and clear of all snow and ice."

GARBAGE & RECYCLING CART INFORMATION

Per Section 8.41 of the City of Oak Creek Municipal Code, household combined refuse not placed in a container provided by the City of Oak Creek, will not be collected.

If you find your blue refuse cart is always overflowing, you may purchase an additional cart from the Street Department. These carts will become your property. Contact the Street Department at 570-5682 for pricing.

Also contact the Street Department for any repairs or replacements needed for your blue refuse carts.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information — (6) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO RECEIVE. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

Payment of 2007 and prior years DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX must be made to MILWAUKEE COUNTY. Call (414) 278-4033 for more information.

Payment not received or *post-marked by its due date is delinquent. DELINQUENT TAX accumulates INTEREST AND PENALTY charges from February 1st at 1½ percent per month on the entire unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. The *postmark governs the date of payment – NOT the date on your check.

Delinquent notices for 2008 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2009. Payment of delinquent 2008 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2009, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

If you received the 2007 Lottery and Gaming Credit on or before January 31, 2008, you do not need to recertify for 2008.

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

Lottery and Gaming Credit applications are available on our website and at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office.

2007: The 2007 Lottery and Gaming Credit is \$78.16. If you did not receive this credit and are eligible, complete a 2007 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application and return it to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) by October 1, 2008.

2008: If you qualify for the Lottery and Gaming Credit beginning in 2008, or if you applied for the 2007 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit, complete and return the 2008 Lottery and Gaming Credit application to the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office by November 15, 2008; the credit will appear on your 2008 Real Estate Tax Bill. For applications received between November 15, 2008 and January 31, 2009, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The 2008 Lottery and Gaming Credit amount will be determined in December 2008.

There is a \$.25 charge for additional copies of tax bills.



Water Friendly Landscaping

Owners of property near a detention pond, ditch, creek, lake, or other waterway have some unique landscaping opportunities and challenges. There are things a property owner can do to help improve the quality of the water near their property.

Landscaping a vegetated buffer zone along the water's edge, rather than traditional lawn, has many benefits, such as less mowing and maintenance. A buffer can also improve habitat and help water quality by reducing the amount of pollutants getting into the water. A vegetated buffer zone can be created in a number of ways, many of which actually reduce time and effort needed to maintain the area.

Native plants can provide food and habitat to attract songbirds and butterflies to your yard. Information on native shoreland plant species is available from the UW-Extension at www.clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs/index.htm.

A buffer zone can be created simply by establishing a "no-mow" zone along the water's edge. Turf grasses will grow 12-24 inches tall before going to seed.

For creating or maintaining a view of the water, consider selective removal of branches, trees, shrubs and ground cover to create clear areas while maintaining vegetation in other areas.

Please note that City ordinance requires natural lawns to be maintained at a height of 12 inches or less, and certain areas, such as platted subdivisions with buildings on 50% or more of the lots, are required to maintain the grass at six inches or less. Additionally, noxious weeds such as ragweed are excluded from the definition of natural lawn. If you have a question, please check with the City Inspection department to determine specific requirements for your property prior to establishing a vegetated buffer area.

Some homeowners dump grass clippings on the bank of a pond, ditch, waterway, or wetland adjacent to their property. Unfortunately, as these clippings break down, they will add nitrogen and other compounds to the water, which contributes to algae growth and odors. Disposal of grass clippings or other yard waste on the banks of a waterway is prohibited by Section 8.23(b) of the Municipal Code.

Reducing the application of chemical fertilizers and weed killers can further help the water quality of the rivers and lakes around us. Additional information on managing yard waste and reducing yard chemical use is available on-line at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/index.htm, or from the Engineering Department.

Fireplace Safety



Approximately 14,000 house fires each year are started by fireplaces. Most of these fires escalated beyond the fireplace because of an overloaded fire, damage to the fireplace such as missing bricks, obstructed flues, ignition of

nearby combustibles, and flying sparks. The Oak Creek Fire Department offers these tips to help keep your family safe when enjoying a night by the fireplace.

- 1. Always open the damper before lighting the fire and keep it open until the ashes are cool. This will avert the build-up of poisonous gases, such as carbon monoxide.
- 2. Fuel the fire safely. For burning firewood in wood stoves or fireplaces, choose well-seasoned wood that has been dried for a minimum of six months to a year and stored properly.
- 3. Never use gasoline, charcoal lighter or other fuel to light or relight a fire because the vapors can explode. Never keep flammable fuels near a fire. Vapors can travel the length of a room and explode.
- 4. **Do not use coal or charcoal in a fireplace because of the danger of carbon monoxide build-up**. Do not burn trash or gift wrap in the fireplace because polystyrene foam and other coated materials can generate deadly fumes. Flying paper embers could also ignite the roof.
- 5. Keep flammable materials such as carpets, pillows, furniture or papers away from the fireplace area. This includes your Christmas tree during the Holiday season.



Fine Print: Things You Should Know

Is She/He Old Enough?

For all programs, age requirements will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

How Much Is It?

Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program. The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office.

Need To Transfer?

Transfers will be made at no charge.

Need A Refund?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund initiated by the participant.

Open House

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class and attend the open house held during the final class session.

Makeups?

Classes missed for individual absences (i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participant attend classes other than the one they are registered for.

Cancelled activities by the Department will be rescheduled, if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

Can I Watch?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, for your child to have recreation time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adult-only atmosphere, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

Have A Complaint?

If a class does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Office at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

Do You Have Insurance?

Insurance coverage for program participants is not provided by the Department or by the School District for Department sponsored activities. Please obtain your own insurance coverage for the duration of the activity.

Where Do I Park? Enter?

CITY HALL: East doors closest to fire station.

DEERFIELD: Front entrance to school.

EDGEWOOD: Gym doors at rear of building.

HIGH SCHOOL: Main doors or East Entrance #210nly.

SHEPARD HILLS: North doors next to the playground.

WEST MIDDLE SCHOOL: Southwest doors at the back of school next to dumpster.

Am I A Resident?

The resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration and children in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District. Current proof of City residency is required once per year (August-July) to receive resident fees.

What If?

My child wants to be on the same team or in a class with a friend or sibling. Siblings who meet the requirements for the same class section or sports league will be placed together unless otherwise requested in writing by the parent or guardian. All other requests for unrelated children to be placed together:

- are not guaranteed
- will not be considered for girls softball or youth baseball
- will be for a maximum of 3 persons
- ◆ may result in the entire group being placed on the waiting list
- must be in writing and signed by parents/guardians of both children

I want to register with my adult friend:

- If one person is placed on the wait list, the entire group will be placed on the wait list
- If one person is a non-resident, the entire group will be processed during non-resident registration (if space is available)

Note: All "Buddy Link" Requests:

 If you request a buddy link and "the buddy" does not register by lottery deadline, you will be waitlisted for the class.

Proof of Date of Birth

- Proof of date of birth for all children is required at their first registration.
- ◆ If the child's name does not match the parent who is presenting proof of residency, proof of residency will be required for the child at their "first" registration.
