PET LICENSE INFORMATION

WI State Statutes, Section 174 makes it mandatory for dogs and cats to be licensed. Renewal postcards (emails for online licensing) should be received from MADACC by January 31. If you do not receive one, contact MADACC at (414) 649-8640. Please provide postcard at time of licensing.



Licensing Requirements

- Dogs (limit three) and cats over five months of age.
- A current certificate of rabies vaccination showing the tag number and the expiration date (will be returned with license) for new licenses or if dates on the renewal postcard are expired.

License year of January 1 through December 31 is due by March 31.

Beginning April 1, a late fee will be charged except for a new resident or new pet owner who licenses within 30 days of:

- Residency.
- Obtaining a dog or cat on or after April 1.
- When a dog or cat reaches five months of age on or after April 1.

CITY HALL, only cash or check made payable to City of Oak Creek. You may wish to avoid December and January due to the busy tax collection time.

Winter also marks the beginning of our tax season. City property taxes will be sent out in December. Please look at your tax bill for detailed information on where your tax dollars are going. There are multiple taxing jurisdictions that are included in your tax bill. The City of Oak Creek is just one of those taxing jurisdictions. Oak Creek's portion of the tax bill is used to support our city services and infrastructure. Questions about the Oak Creeks taxes can be answered at City Hall during working hours. Please direct any questions concerning other taxing jurisdictions directly to them. Property taxes can be paid at City Hall or at Tri-City banks in Oak Creek.

This upcoming winter and spring our Celebrations Commission, Tourism Commission, and Library will be hosting many community events. Please take some time to enjoy the City's Annual Tree Lighting and our annual giving trees at City Hall and the Library. February welcomes our Black History Month celebration, spring will see the annual Easter Egg Hunt and, of course, Oak Creek's largest event of the season Winter Festival returns to Town Square. Oak Creek will also be featured on an episode of Around the Corner with John McGivern in February. WINTER PARKING

December 1 through April 1

During this time, there is no parking allowed on the streets in the City of Oak Creek during the following hours:

Monday thru Friday: 2 a.m. to 6 a.m.

Saturday/Sunday: 2:30 a.m. to 6 a.m.

Permission may be granted by the Police Department (on a day-today basis) for exceptions on the restriction during emergencies, if a vehicle becomes disabled, or if there is an overnight guest. For permission call:

WOMEN'S BASIC DANGER AND SELF DEFENSE CLASS

The Oak Creek Police Department will be sponsoring a FREE course on Women's Basic Danger Awareness and Self Defense in spring, 2019. The course is offered to women, 17 years of age or older, who reside in the City of Oak Creek or are employees of businesses in Oak Creek. The goal of this course is to present information that will help reduce the risk of an assault and show participants how to survive a deadly encounter. CHRISTMAS BURGLARIES

Protect yourself from crime this holiday season:

Presents By The Tree: If you choose to display your Christmas tree near a window or glass door, refrain from putting presents under the tree until closer to Christmas. Passersby not only see your festive tree, but also what's under it.

Doors and Windows: Check all of your entryways (windows and doors) into your home. 60% of break-ins happen during the day. Secure those sliding glass doors with a lock and a dowel in the door track. Trim back your bushes and trees; make it difficult for anyone to hide in your bushes and shrubs. DO NOT store that spare key in the potted plant next to the front door or under a doormat.

Travel: Many people leave town for the holidays. Purchase timers for your external and internal lights-offsetting the internal lights to come on and off at certain times. If your TV has this feature, you could have it come on with the volume turned up to a moderate level then turn off later. Arrange to have your mail and newspaper stopped while you are away.

The Holiday Is Over: Once the holidays are over, break down any boxes from presents so they fit in the disposal container with the lid down or take them to the city refuse center.

FLU SEASON IS HERE!

One of the best ways to prevent seasonal flu is to receive the flu shot each year. The Centers for Disease Control recommends that everyone 6 months and older receive an annual flu vaccine. In addition to vaccination, frequent hand washing, covering your cough, and staying home when you are sick will help to prevent the spread of illness. During the 2017-2018 flu season, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services reported that 7,520 people in Wisconsin were hospitalized due to flu-related complications, and 379 people died, which is twice as many as the year before. Most clinics and pharmacies offer flu shots; contact your clinic or pharmacy to schedule an appointment. The Health Department has a limited supply of flu shots available for qualifying individuals. RADON AWARENESS:

Why All Homes Should Be Tested

Radon is a colorless odorless naturally-occurring gas resulting from the breakdown of uranium that is found in soil. Radon can seep into homes through cracks or holes in the foundation. Long-term exposure to radon can increase the risk of developing lung cancer. Testing is the only way to know if your family is at risk for radon exposure, and fall and winter are optimal times of the year to test your home for radon. The Oak Creek Health Department offers short and long-term radon test kits for a small fee. Visit or contact the Health Department (414) 766-7950 for more information or to obtain a test kit.

WINTER IS COMING...

Winter storms can range from a normal snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding snow that lasts for several days. One of the main concerns is that winter weather can knock out heat, power, and communication, sometimes for days at a time. Before a winter storm, make sure to have an emergency kit ready with everything you need, including food, water, and flashlights to survive without power or water for 72 hours. Find a complete list of items at ready.gov/build-a-kit. If you have to venture outside during a winter storm, make sure to bundle up and take breaks inside regularly, especially if you can't feel your fingers, toes, ears or nose. As Wisconsinites we all know that winter is coming, but sometimes we forget we need to prepared and be ready.



SAFE MEDICATION STORAGE

Store them out of sight!

Keeping your prescription painkillers secure and out of sight can prevent them from falling into the hands of someone who might abuse them. And when there are children and teens in the house, it's best to keep them out of sight and out of reach.

Lock them up!

Storing your prescription painkillers and other medications in a lockbox, safe, or locked medicine cabinet is one of the most effective ways to prevent abuse or accidental use. The Oak Creek Health Department has medication lockboxes available at our office.

Safely dispose of them!

Unused medications are a disaster waiting to be found. It is vital to safely dispose of unneeded and expired prescriptions. There is a medication drop box at the Oak Creek Police Department. See our website for details!



DON'T LET YOUR HYDRANTS REMAIN "UNDERCOVER"

The winter months bring a special concern to the Oak Creek Fire Department. Winter storms can often hide fire hydrants under a mountain of snow making them impossible to find quickly. In the event of a fire, firefighters have to locate and shovel out fire hydrants before hooking up to them. Precious time is lost. Please don't let your neighborhood hydrant remain "undercover".

We are asking that you help us by keeping the fire hydrant closest to your residence or business clear of snow. We need a 3-foot clearance on all sides. When shoveling snow be aware of vehicle traffic. Do not stand in the street and be careful not to slip and fall out into the roadway.



DIAL 911

It may seem like a simple task, but in the event of an emergency, dial 911 to reach fire, rescue and emergency medical services. Time is of the utmost importance in the event of an emergency and every second counts. For example, fires double in size every minute. Fires that start out small can easily grow to engulf entire buildings. Serious medical conditions like a heart attack, stroke, or traumatic injury require immediate attention by medical personnel. The Oak Creek Fire Department provides not only fire suppression, but also paramedic level emergency medical care. With three stations strategically located throughout the city, the Fire Department is only minutes away.

CANDLE SAFETY

According to statistics compiled by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), more than 15,000 house fires are started by candles each year. These fires accounted for an annual average of 166 civilian deaths, 1,289 civilian injuries and over 450 million dollars in property damage. December was the peak month for fires started by candles. The top days for these fires are December 23, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day.

Please remember the following tips for the safe use of candles in your home.

- Blow out candles when you leave a room
- Never place candles within 12 inches of anything that can burn
- Place candle holders on a sturdy, firm surface
- Only use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily

CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY

Carbon monoxide, an odorless, colorless gas, is a byproduct of the combustion of fossil fuels. When appliances such as furnaces, water heaters, dryers and stoves malfunction or are improperly vented, a buildup of carbon monoxide gas can occur.

As gas builds up in a home, occupants may experience headaches, nausea, dizziness, fatigue and confusion. At higher levels, carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms include vomiting, loss of consciousness, and even death. As the winter months draw upon us, we would like to remind residents that carbon monoxide detectors should be placed on **each level** of their home. In addition, they should have appliances inspected by a licensed professional.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Would you know what to do if a disaster struck? The American Red Cross urges everyone to make sure they are prepared for a disaster and not wait until an emergency occurs and it's too late.

Get a Kit: Being prepared means being equipped with the proper supplies you may need in the event of an emergency or disaster. Keep your supplies in an easy-to-carry emergency preparedness kit that you can use at home or take with you in case you must evacuate.

Assemble emergency supplies and make them readily available and transportable in case you need to take them with you – at least 3-5 days' worth of supplies. The impacts of disasters can last quite a while, so anticipate and prepare for this. Thousands of people have needed to take supplies with them to help sustain and comfort them for days. In many cases, they didn't have much time to pull these together.

Make a Plan: Create and practice an emergency plan so your family will know what to do in a crisis. You can create your emergency plan in just three steps:

- With your family or household members, discuss how to prepare and respond to the types of emergencies that are most likely to happen where you live, learn, work and play.
- 2. Identify responsibilities for each member of your household and how you will work together as a team.
- 3. Practice as many elements of your plan as possible.

Get informed: Learn the types of disasters or emergencies that may likely occur in your area. These events can range from those affecting only you and your family, like a home fire or medical emergency, to those affecting your entire community, like an earthquake or flood.

- Identify how local authorities will notify you during a disaster and how you will get information, whether through local radio, TV or NOAA Weather Radio stations or channels.
- Know the difference between different weather alerts, such as watches and warnings, and what actions to take in each.
- Know what actions to take to protect yourself during disasters that may occur in areas where you travel or have moved recently. For example, if you travel to a place where earthquakes are common and you are not familiar with them, make sure you know what to do to protect yourself should one occur.
- When a major disaster occurs, your community can change in an instant. Loved ones may be hurt and emergency response is likely to be delayed. Make sure that at least one member of your household is trained in first aid and CPR and knows how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED). This training is useful in many emergency situations.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE UPDATE

The Assessor's office will conduct a revaluation for 2019. Revaluations were also performed in 2014 through 2018. As opposed to performing revaluations once every three to four years, these annual revaluations ensure assessed values are based on current market conditions which lead to more equitable assessments for property owners.

As in previous years, property owners that were approved for a building permit for remodeling, new construction, additions, wood decks, detached buildings and other similar type permits should expect a visit from a member of the assessment staff to update assessment records. For permits relating to interior remodeling, basement finish, additions and new construction, an interior inspection will be attempted. Properties that sold during 2018 may also receive a request for an interior inspection. The owners of these properties that sold may also receive a letter from the Assessor's Office asking them to answer a questionnaire relating to the details of the sale of the property such as, was the property listed on the open market? These properties are referred to as comparable sales and are used to establish the assessed value of other properties that have not sold. Verifying sales information with property owners is an important part of the assessment process.

All assessment staff will be carrying official City of Oak Creek identification cards and their vehicles are registered with the Police Department.

In addition to the fieldwork and sales verification of certain properties mentioned above, owners of commercial real estate will be mailed and asked to complete an Income and Expense form. This information is for confidential use by the Assessor's office by State statute and City ordinance. The information gathered on these forms is used to help establish equitable assessments for commercial properties based on the current market conditions relating to commercial leases. The form does not request personal or business income, only the income information relating to the lease or potential lease of the property. These forms will be mailed between December 2018 and January 2019 and will include a requested return date.

Business owners that may or may not own the real estate where they conduct business will also be mailed and asked to complete a Statement of Personal Property. Per State statute, business owners are required to complete this form and return it to the Assessor's Office annually. These forms will be mailed to business owners between December 2018 and January 2019, and there is a statutory due date of March 1, 2019 (by March 1 annually.)

Property owners will be mailed a 2019 Notice of Assessment in April 2019. That Notice of Assessment will include the 2019 assessed value and will include instructions on how to contact the Assessor's Office during the Open Book period in order to schedule a meeting if they are in disagreement with the value.

GARBAGE & RECYCLING COLLECTION INFO FOR UPCOMING HOLIDAYS

When there is a holiday during the regular collection days of Monday through Thursday, from the holiday day forward, pickups will be one day later than normal, for the holiday week ONLY. The regular schedule will then resume the next week. Reminder signs are no longer being placed street side.

The following holidays are observed by Advanced Disposal: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

GARBAGE AND RECYCLING CART INFORMATION

- Household combined garbage not placed in a container provided by the City of Oak Creek or its contractor will not be collected.
- All containers shall be stored on private property and shall not be stored in the front yard setback.
- Garbage shall be placed for collection no later than 6:45 a.m. of the morning of collection.
- No carts shall be placed at the curb any earlier than 6:45 p.m. on the day prior to the scheduled collection day.
- Resident shall restore containers to their original storage location after collection on the same day as the collection.
- Questions? See Oak Creek Municipal Codes 8.41, 8.42 and 8.43.

Advanced Disposal collects both the garbage and the recycling for the City of Oak Creek. If you have collection issues, need additional carts, replacement carts or a repair to either of your carts, please contact Advanced Disposal at (262) 679-0860.

RECYCLING YARD INFORMATION

Location: 720 W. Puetz Road

Hours: Tuesday, Friday, and Saturday, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. In addition to the regular hours, the yard is open Tuesday evenings ONLY until 8 p.m. starting the first Tuesday in April through the last Tuesday in September. Any residence that receives an individual property tax bill may use the recycling yard. Occupants of manufactured home parks that have private garbage pickup may use the recycling yard for disposal of yard waste ONLY with the exception of grass clippings, which are not accepted.

The recycling yard will be closed for the following holidays:

Christmas Day	Tuesday, December 25
New Year's Day	Tuesday, January 1, 2019
Good Friday	Friday, April 19, 2019
Easter weekend	Saturday, April 20, 2019

Recycling Yard Restrictions:

- NO items may exceed 4 feet in length with the exception of branches, furniture, appliances and metals. Carpet and padding rolls should not exceed 4 feet in width.
- NO contractor vehicles will be allowed in to the yard.
- The yard does NOT accept shingles, roofing materials, grass, gasoline, medical or hazardous waste, paints or vehicle salvage.

curtains, handbags, backpacks, etc. It is located at the end of the garbage compactor. Please see the recycling

2019 BRANCH PICKUP DATES

Branches will be picked up beginning at 6:45 a.m. on the following dates:

Wednesday, May 1 Monday, July 1 Tuesday, September 3 Friday, November 1

To guarantee that your branches are picked up:

- You must have them at the roadside BY the dates listed above, but no earlier than 2 weeks prior.
- Once we pass through your neighborhood, we will not be back until the next date listed.
- Branches are to be stacked neatly with the cut ends facing the road.
- Roots should be separate from the brush pile.
- The DPW WILL NOT pick up brush that is the result of a contractor doing work on your property. It is their responsibility to dispose of the brush properly.

Note: Citywide branch collection can take several days to complete. There is no need to be concerned if your branches are not picked up on the first day of collection!

Branches may also be brought to the recycling yard at 720 W. Puetz Road during the days and times listed.

MULCH

Generally, from mid-April through mid-November, mulch is often available for free pick-up at the recycling yard. Residents may call the Department of Public Works at (414) 570-5682 to check availability and/or to be put on a list to have mulch delivered to their homes. The fee for delivery is \$25 per load which is approximately 5 yards.



SPRING CLEANUP

The Department of Public Works will conduct their spring cleanup beginning

Wednesday, May 15, 2019

for residential homes or condos that have City-provided garbage and recycling pickup. There is **no charge** for this pickup, but **there is a charge for freon appliances and televisions**. In order for these items to be picked up, this fee will need to be pre-paid prior to May 15. **See fee chart on page 10.**

- Construction Materials (not resulting from a contractor)
- Metal
- Mattresses
- Televisions [\$20/each]
- Carpeting/Rugs/ Padding (rolls no greater than 4 feet in width)

Items that will not be picked up are as follows:

- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves
- Concrete
- Branches
- Fluorescent Lights
- Concrete/Stone

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside by **6:45 a.m. on Wednesday, May 15** in order to be guaranteed a pickup. Once we pass through your neighborhood, we will not return for additional no-charge pickups until the **Fall Cleanup on Friday, November 15, 2019.**

See **Special Pickups** section for information on how to make arrangements for a prepaid special pickup for other times of the year, or if you should miss the fall cleanup date.

SPECIAL PICKUPS

In addition to the fall and spring cleanups that are provided at no charge, the City of Oak Creek provides special pickups for residential homes or condos that have Cityprovided garbage and recycling pickup. The fee for this service is \$25 and includes pickup of the following items:

- Appliances (doors must be removed from refrigerators and freezers) [an additional \$15 fee will be charged for each freon appliance]
- Furniture
- Mattresses
- Construction Materials (not resulting from a contractor)
- Carpeting/Padding (rolls no greater than 4 feet in width)
- Metals of any kind
- Televisions [an additional \$20 fee will be charged for each TV]

Special pickups are done on Friday mornings ONLY. Items for pickup must be at the road by 6:45 a.m. on the scheduled Friday. Residents requesting special pickups must prepay their fees before noon on Thursday prior to pick up in order to be put on that Friday's pickup schedule. **Payment for Special Pick Ups**

FOLLOWING SNOWPLOWS

WI Statute Chapter 346.915 prohibits a person operating a vehicle from following an official snowplow, equipped and engaged in snow and ice control/removal:

- Closer than 75 feet when on any highway having a posted speed limit of 35 mph or less.
- Highways with posted speeds more than 35 mph require a minimum following distance of 200 feet.
- A person operating a vehicle to stop not less than 20 feet from a snowplow at an intersection and to remain stopped until the snowplow resumes motion.

SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

Property owners are responsible for snow and ice removal from public sidewalks along their frontages within 24 hours after a snowfall event. Lack of proper and timely snow and ice removal presents a dangerous condition for pedestrians.



- The blowing and/or shoveling of snow onto City streets is a violation of the municipal code and is subject to a ticket and fine.
- The City may remove any snow and ice deposited and charge the costs of the removal to the owner or occupant of the property from which the snow or ice was removed and illegally deposited.
- Property owners/occupants are required to keep clear mailboxes and fire hydrants abutting their property.

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY BY SNOW REMOVAL

Mailboxes:

- Once notified, the City will first attempt to repair a damaged mailbox and/or post.
- If damage is too extensive, the mailbox will be replaced at no cost to the resident with a standard 20.5" x 9" x7.25" metal mailbox with steel latch and aluminum flag or an all-in-one polyurethane constructed mailbox, dependent on the type of mailbox that was damaged.
- The City will not replace any custom mailboxes. If a resident prefers a custom mailbox, the City will reimburse the resident up to \$100 per event for parts only. No labor will be reimbursed.

The City will attempt to repair damaged "gang" mailboxes. If it is not repairable, claims need to be made by each property owner to receive reimbursement. Maximum payment will be \$100 per event, per property owner, but will only include one post reimbursement. To be reimbursed, property owner must bring in the damaged parts along with a paid receipt and the approximate date the damage was done to the Municipal Services building located at 800 W. Puetz Road.

Lawn Damage: City crews shall install black dirt and seed for any areas of lawn damaged by plowing or replacement of mailboxes by late Spring.

Other Appurtenances: The City will not reimburse for damage to other appurtenances installed within the City right-of-way such as walls, planters, sprinkler heads, etc.

EMERALD ASH BORER HISTORY AND 2018 UPDATE

For those residents new to the region or to yard and tree care, you will want to be aware of the devastation of ash trees by emerald ash borer (EAB) around Oak Creek, the Midwest, and beyond.

If you think there are more visibly dead trees than usual, it isn't your imagination! If you take a trip from Milwaukee to Detroit, you will notice the millions of ash trees lost to this very adaptable insect. Ash is one of the most common species of trees in this region, representing approximately 20 percent of urban trees. Wisconsin is one of the three states with the most ash trees, along with Michigan and Minnesota.

EAB, a native resident of Asian countries, was first identified in Michigan in 2002 - a side effect of globalization. EAB managed to establish quietly, and soon ballooned out of control. From Michigan, it spread throughout much of the US and Canada, mostly through the movement of ash firewood.

Oak Creek Forestry responded to news of EAB by ceasing to plant ash trees in approximately 2003. We were already working to diversify tree species for the very reason of guarding against devastations by insects or diseases to trees. In a worst case scenario, an insect or disease may take out a lot of trees quickly. Examples of this are the Great American Chestnut Blight, Dutch Elm Disease and Butternut Canker. We may see a similar loss of walnut trees in our lifetime to Thousand Canker Disease.

Green ash, the favored food of EAB, naturally grows in wet areas and readily self-seeds. If your property backs up to a river or wet woodland, you may be all too familiar with this tree already. Ash often pops up in mulch beds and grows surprisingly fast. EAB was discovered in Oak Creek in December 2009. At that time, we had approximately 1,400 street tree ash and another 1,000+ trees along the rural right-of-ways (and many thousands more on City lands and in parks.) Our first goal for street trees was a 7-year plan to remove and replace. However, we soon realized that we needed to spread that project out over a longer period of time. The appearance of a vacant tree canopy in a neighborhood can be very aesthetically unpleasant, as we saw from areas that had to be nearly clear-cut.

The Forestry Division began a treatment program in 2010 which will continue indefinitely. While we still intend to eventually remove and replace ash street trees with other types of trees, we have slowed the removal pace considerably. Our goal is to allow establishing trees a chance to take on some size before we remove remaining ash trees. Examples of this strategy can be viewed along Quincy and Parkway Estates Drives.

We have tried most of the chemicals available for EAB treatment. They all work if applied correctly. However, treatments needed to start seven years ago with no lapses!

If you have standing dead trees on your property, please get them down as soon as possible. Insurance companies are changing their strategies with regard to fallen ash trees, so please check your homeowner policy.

A couple of dead tree management options if your household is truly financially strained:

- Remove the hazard, not the tree. Hire someone skilled and insured to drop or top out the branches only.
- Get together with your neighbors and hire the same company, share the cost.

The City will not get involved with neighbor-to-neighbor tree disputes other than to offer general advice.

Lottery and Gaming Credit

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

If you qualify and the credit does not appear on your tax bill, complete and return the 2018 Lottery and Gaming Credit application with your payment by January 31, 2019.

Delinquent Real Estate Tax

All delinquent taxes are subject to interest and penalty of 1.5% per month from February 1 until paid in full. The City of Oak Creek accepts real estate tax payments until July 31, after which payments must be made to Milwaukee County.



Is he/she old enough?

Age requirements are as of the date of the first class unless otherwise specified and are designed to provide the best and safest environment for the children. Children who will meet the age requirement by or before 1/3 of the classes have been held may be placed on a waiting list. We will contact you if there is space available approximately 1 week prior to class start.

How much is it?

Fees and charges are assessed based on the cost of the program. Resident families needing financial assistance for their children to participate are encouraged to contact the office at 766-7920.

The resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration and children who live in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District.

Transfers and Refunds

Transfers will be made at no charge.

Refunds will be made upon request until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held, except as noted. Refunds are issued based on your original payment method. A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund. Avoid the service fee by requesting credit to your account in place of a refund.

Can I stay and watch?

Only registered participants are permitted in classrooms during instruction. This avoids distractions and interruptions in instruction, and allows adults to participate in an adult-only atmosphere.






