Dear Oak Creek Residents,

The well attended summer concert series at the Community Center also provided some new entertainment options for all our residents and is anticipated to resume in summer 2005.

The Veterans' Memorial fundraising has been extremely successful. This project continues to grow and gather momentum as this long-awaited dream becomes a reality! Watch for the flags and mural as the project takes shape.

We have successfully traded land and completed the necessary process to build the newest elementary school in Oak Creek. Our growing community necessitated this additional school project. Working together with the School District has been a great benefit to our community, as well as to the families who will be attending this much needed addition to the Oak Creek School District.

MEET YOUR NEW CITY ADMINISTRATOR



The City of Oak Creek is pleased to announce the appointment of Barbara S. Blumenfield, Ph.D., as the new City Administrator, effective July 26, 2004.

Barbara S. Blumenfield has been a resident of the Milwaukee area all of her life and has acquired a great deal of experience working with different levels of government throughout her professional career.

Blumenfield most recently served as the Director of Administrator Services for the Village of Menomonee Falls (WI), the largest Village in the State of Wisconsin. For five years prior to that, she was the Director of Human Resources for the City of Greenfield, WI, a community of approximately 36,000 people.

Before that, Blumenfield served in a variety of other governmental positions, which included Administrator for the Town of Caledonia, the largest town in the State of Wisconsin; Executive and Legislative Liaison for the Racine County Executive and Racine County Board of Supervisors; Senior Legislative Research Analyst for the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee; Field Representative for Congressman Henry S. Reuss; and Aldermanic Administrative Assistant for the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee.

Educationally, Blumenfield attended the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, where she received her Bachelor's Degree in Political Science, a Master's Degree in Urban Affairs and her Doctorate in Urban Studies.

Blumenfield, is a member of a number of professional organizations, including the International City/County Management Association (ICMA), where she has earned the coveted designation of Certified Municipal Manager and is currently a Regional Vice-President-elect; the Wisconsin City/County Management Association (WCMA); the Wisconsin Public Employers Labor Relations Association (WPELRA), where she is a Board member and Secretary; and the Milwaukee Area Municipal Employees Association (MAMEA), which she serves as Treasurer.

The City is looking forward to a long-term professional relationship as she assumes her new position.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

VARICELLA (CHICKENPOX) VACCINE REOUIREMENT

The Wisconsin Student Immunization Law (HFS 144) has been changed to include varicella vaccine. It will be phased in as follows:

School YearSchool GradeDay Care Center2004-2005K thru 82 yrs thru 4 yrs2005-2006K thru 122 yrs thru 4 yrs

To be compliant, the parent (or guardian) must provide to the school or day care center one of the following:

- 1. the date of vaccination (month/day/year); or
- 2. the date that the child had chickenpox disease; or
- 3. a waiver for health, religious or personal conviction reasons.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASE REPORTING

According to State Statutes 252.05 persons are required to report communicable diseases such as chicken pox, hepatitis, measles, mumps, pertussis (whooping cough), rubella, salmonella, and tuberculosis. **Contact the**health department at 768-6525 if you know or suspect that you or a member of your family has any contagious disease.

FLU AND PNEUMONIA-ARE YOU PROTECTED?

The Health Department will be offering flu vaccine at City Hall at the end of October. Please call 768-6525 after October 4 for further information. The newest recommendation is that infants age 6-23 months and their household contact receive the vaccine. We will either bill Medicare Part B or charge \$20/person for the influenza vaccine and \$30/person for the pneumonia vaccine.

HEALTH EXPRESS

Thank you to all community members who have participated in the Health Express during 2004. Participants will celebrate the end of the 2004 program on September 30 with a "Harvest Fest Celebration". Watch for information about the 2005 Health Express in January.

OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Ladies, have you had your yearly mammogram? Clinical breast exam? Pelvic exam with Pap test? Contact your health care provider to schedule these important tests now! If you do not have health insurance or have a high deductible,

you may be eligible for a free mammogram provided by the Wisconsin Well Women's Program (WWWP). Income limits apply. Mammograms will be offered in December through the health department in conjunction with the WWWP. Contact the Health Department at 768-6225 for further information

WANT TO OUIT SMOKING?

If you haven't set a date to quit smoking, yet, here are a few tips to get you started.

- * Choose a method for quitting that fits your personal needs. Discuss your options with your pharmacist or doctor.
- * Don't go it alone. Reach out to family members to try to recruit other smokers you know to join you in quitting.
- * Enroll in a counseling support program, either from a smoking cessation organization or as part of an over-the-counter nicotine replacement therapy.

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

Sex

• Age

Color

Religion

Marital status

- Race
- · National origin/Ancestry
- Disability
- Sexual orientation
- Lawful source of income
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

In this day and age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle and difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability. The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

• You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign. You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, and the

landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along.

- A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- You are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- •You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are.
- A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent reason.
- Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court.

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the **Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.**

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination.
- Investigations of behalf of victims of housing discrimination.
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law.

In addition, the Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination. ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

GRASS CLIPPINGS AND WATER QUALITY

Owners of property near a creek, lake, detention pond, or other waterway have a unique landscaping opportunity and challenge. Organic matter from your yard can wash directly into the adjacent waterway, degrading the water quality. As part of the City's efforts to comply with the State and Federal regulations, the City is taking steps to improve the water quality of the water courses throughout the City.

The City has been conducting State required inspections of various storm water facilities. It has been noted that in some locations, grass clippings have been dumped at the edge of the waterway, or into the ditch flow line. This is detrimental to the water quality because as the grass break downs it adds nitrogen and other nutrients to the water which contribute to odors and algae growth.

A better alternative is to use a mulching mower which eliminates the need to collect and dispose of the larger clippings from a conventional mower. Mowing so that you remove less than one-third of the blade length will help keep the clippings to a size that will quickly dry and filter down to the soil surface for decomposition. Because the smaller grass clippings are spread throughout the lawn and interspersed with the upright grass blades, they are less likely to wash into the waterway even during a heavy rain.

If you choose to collect the clippings during times of heavy grass growth, you can use them to mulch the garden or planting beds. They will add valuable nutrients to your garden soil and help modulate soil and root temperature. Just be careful not to use herbicide treated grass for garden mulch, since the residual herbicide on the clippings may harm your garden plants or contaminate edible plants.

Mulching grass clippings can save time and money by reducing the need for chemical fertilizer and weed killers. Reducing the application of chemical fertilizers and weed killers can further help the water quality of the rivers and lakes around us. Additional information on managing yard waste and reducing yard chemical use is available on-line at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs, or from the Engineering Department.

COMPOST BINS: Some residents may choose to use a free standing compost bin to contain and compost the

clippings rather than mulch them directly onto the lawn or garden. The City has certain requirements for composting bins, including a maximum volume of 125 cubic feet, and a maximum height of 42 inches. All compost bins must be maintained to prevent odors and prevent the attraction of rodents and pests. It is prohibited to compost lake weeds, cooked food scraps of any type, meat, dairy products, manure, or items that will impede the composting process. Compost bins must be located in the rear yard and at least three feet from the property lines, buildings, or dwellings




Many riparian property owners landscape with a traditional lawn right up to the water's edge. A vegetated buffer zone can provide benefits not found with a regular lawn,

such as less mowing and maintenance, as well as habitat and water quality benefits. A vegetated buffer zone can be incorporated into the landscaping using a number of simple and straightforward measures, many of which actually reduce time and effort needed to maintain the area.

- Native plants can provide food and habitat to attract songbirds and butterflies to your yard. Information on native shoreland plant species is available from the UW-Extension at www.clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs.
- A buffer zone can be incorporated simply by establishing a "no-mow" zone along the water's edge. Turf grasses will grow 12-24 inches tall before going to seed
- For creating or maintaining a view of the water, consider selective removal of branches, trees, shrubs and ground cover to create clear areas while maintaining vegetation in other areas.
- Please note that City ordinance requires natural lawns to be maintained at a height of 12 inches or less, and certain areas, such as platted subdivisions with buildings on 50% or more of the lots, are required to maintain the grass at six inches or less. Additionally, noxious weeds such as ragweed are excluded from the definition of natural lawn. If you have a question, please check with the City Inspection department at 768-6547 to determine specific requirements for your property prior to establishing a vegetated buffer area.

ELECTION 2004



AVOID THE CROWDS, REGISTER EARLY

The Fall Partisan Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, **September 14**, **2004**, and the Fall General and Presidential Election will be held Tuesday, **November 2**, **2004**.

Due to the expected large voter turnouts, those residents not currently registered are encouraged to register early to vote, to avoid delays at the polling site. A qualified elector must be at least 18 years of age, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the City for at least 10 days prior to registering to vote. You must present a form of ID showing proof of residence, such as a current Wisconsin driver's license. The City Clerk's office can provide you with a list of acceptable forms of identification.

You may register to vote:

City Hall Clerk's Office, Monday through Friday, 8 AM to 5 PM Library, during regular business hours Also watch for special voter registration events in fall

Please call the City Clerk's Office at 768-6500 with questions about your correct voting district/ward, for absentee ballot information, or for registration by mail. Information is also available on the City's website.

If you would like to be considered for assignment as a temporary election assistant for the November 2nd election, call the City Clerk's Office for more information.

CITY TREASURER'S OFFICE

ATTENTION TAXPAYERS!!!

Please read carefully for IMPORTANT CHANGES for payment of property tax bills-

MAKING A PAYMENT

Check(s) should be payable to Treasurer, or City of Oak Creek.

BY MAIL, FOR TAX PAYMENTS MADE ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31st, please use the envelope enclosed with your tax bill. Tax payments after January 31st, mail to: Treasurer, City of Oak Creek, 8640 S. Howell Ave., Oak Creek, WI 53154.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. NO CASH PLEASE!

PAYMENTS WILL BE RETURNED UNPROCESSED AND YOUR TAXES MAY BECOME DELINQUENT IF:

- Checks are not signed or not made payable to the Treasurer or City of Oak Creek
- Checks have missing or incorrect information (i.e. written dollar amount does not match numerical dollar amount)
- Escrow/mortgage checks made payable to the homeowner are not properly endorsed by the homeowner
- Payments sent by title/mortgage companies do not include proper back-up documentation

TO RECEIVE A RECEIPT by mail, you must enclose either a copy of your tax bill or a self-addressed envelope; we will return your tax bill with your receipt. For payments received without a tax bill or self-addressed envelope, your receipt will be placed in a box in the Treasurer's Office and will be available for pick-up until October 1, 2004. Any remaining receipts after this date will be destroyed.

IN PERSON AT ANY OF THE FOLLOWING FOUR TRI CITY BANK LOCATIONS (This service

will only be available through January 31st.)

- S. 27th St. and College Ave
- W. Ryan Rd. near S. 27th St
- MegaMall Pick 'n Save store-corner of Puetz Rd. & Howell Ave
- Pick 'n Save store (S. 27th St. near College Ave.)

The only receipt you will receive will be from the bank. Our copy of your tax payment receipt will be placed in a box in the Treasurer's Office until October 1, 2005.

IN PERSON AT CITY HALL, normal business hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday thru Friday; except City Hall will be closed on December 23, December 24, December 30 and December 31. Possible special tax payment hours will be determined at a later date. To expedite payment, if you do not have a copy of your tax bill or do not know your parcel number(s), you

must first go to the computer at the counter and look up your parcel number(s) before getting into the payment line. If you do not have your check(s) completed in advance we will take care of the next person in line while you finish.

REFUNDS

For refunds over \$200, a check will be issued three to four weeks from date of payment. To receive any refund over \$200 immediately, you must make your payment directly at one of the Tri-City Bank locations. NO REFUND FOR \$10.00 OR LESS will be issued by check. To receive a refund of \$10.00 or less you must make your payment in person at City Hall or at one of the Tri-City Bank locations. ALL REFUNDS BY CHECK will be made payable to THE PAYOR, even if your mortgage company makes a payment from your escrow account after you have made payment in full.

PAYMENT DEADLINES

"PAID-IN-FULL" PAYMENT IS DUE JANUARY 31, 2005. INSTALLMENT OPTION, All payments must be made as listed below. If any payment is not made by the due date, it will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance and forfeiture of the installment option. The tax bill is the only bill you will receive. We do not send reminder notices.

- FIRST INSTALLMENT 50% of net real estate tax plus all special charges due on or before January 31, 2005
- SECOND INSTALLMENT 25% of net real estate tax due on or before March 31, 2005
- THIRD INSTALLMENT 25% of net real estate tax due on or before May 31, 2005

Please, if at all possible, take advantage of the U.S. mail, the drive-up 24-hour depository, or any of the four Tri-City Bank locations, and avoid waiting in long lines at City Hall.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION/CHANGES

The tax bill is the only bill you will receive. Payments are considered delinquent if received in person, or if post-marked after the due date. The postmark governs the date of payment - NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period. All delinquent payments accumulate interest and penalty charges from February 1st at 1 ½ % per month on the unpaid principal balance.

EFFECTIVE DECEMBER 1, 2004 we will no longer make additional copies of tax bills that are available on-line. Beginning with tax year 2003, tax information has been made available online.

Please visit our website at www.oakcreekwi.org, then from the homepage click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). You may search by parcel number, name or address. If you do not have internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library. Additional Treasurer's information may be found on the City's website by clicking the applicable link found under City Departments and then Treasurer's Office.

FORESTRY

ARBOR DAY 2004

Arbor Day is a national holiday founded by J. Sterling Morton (Nebraska) in 1872. In Wisconsin, it is the last Friday of April. Arbor Day is intended as a day to observe the importance of trees and to encourage tree planting, care and education.

2004 marks Oak Creek's fourth year as a Tree City USA. As a provision of this status, we are required to hold an Arbor Day observance. Generally, we hold several and this year was no exception.

ARBOR DAY CELEBRATIONS

WE ENERGIES



On Arbor Day proper, Friday, April 30, WE Energies' Regional Foresters Mike Bognar and Dale Konieczka and Principal Representative, Linda Sodemann, joined the Parks, Recreation & Forestry staff, Mayor

Bolender, Alderwoman Koplin and other City Hall employees for a tree planting Arbor Day observance. WE Energies generously donated two specimen red oaks now planted directly west of City Hall. A warm thank you WE Energies for the gift of trees and a cordial partnership which works together to maintain and enhance our valuable urban forest!

PARKWAY APOSTOLIC CHURCH

Saturday, May 1, Youth Pastor Rob Jadrnicek and approximately 20 of his students gave their all for an incredible day of park tree planting. Eighteen trees of various sizes (some with very heavy rootballs!) were planted at the following parks: Oak Leaf (11), Otjen (5) and Carrolton School Park (2). A thousand thanks for your continued commitment (year two!) to community service and the beautification of Oak Creek.

GRADE SCHOOLS

A number of grade schools participated in Arbor Day informational talks from City Forestry. Three hundred red oak seedlings were handed out at various schools both public and parochial. Thank you teachers and students for your participation! Let me know how the trees survive and hope to see you next year.





GYPSY MOTH UPDATE

2004 began the first gypsy moth aerial spraying in Oak Creek. In addition, a private arborist was hired to spray Miller Park from the ground. Between the aerial spraying and possibly the unusually wet spring, we found a great deal of dead gypsy moth caterpillars. As of late July, no reports of heavy infestations have been called in.

From 2000 through 2003 Oak Creek City Forestry was part of the Cooperator Program with the state. We hung our own traps and watched insect counts escalate over the years. Now that the gypsy moth is considered established in this region we are no longer a Cooperator. However, we will still conduct egg mass surveys in the fall, revisiting many of the sites that will likely become more heavily infested each year. Likely sites would be oak-hickory woodlands or neighborhoods.

We encourage you to become more familiar with this insect, its life stages and treatments. Try this website:

SCHOOL BUS LIGHTS



With the start of the new school year, motorists are reminded to use caution when approaching school buses.

Motorists should stop their vehicle not less than 20 feet from the bus when it is displaying flashing red warning lights

and remain stopped until the bus resumes motion or extinguishes the flashing lights. School bus operators may submit a written report to the Police Department of those vehicles illegally passing a school bus with its red warning lights flashing. Upon receipt of this information, the Police Department will prepare a traffic citation and serve it upon the owner of the vehicle in violation. The fine for such violation is \$226. Help keep our children safe this school year-stop when you approach a bus flashing its red warning lights!

HALLOWEEN SAFETY

With Halloween just around the corner, the Police Department would like to remind parents of a few tips to keep your children safe while trick-or-treating:

- Children should always trick-or-treat with an adult or older sibling.
- Costumes should be reflective, flame retardant, and should fit properly to prevent trips and falls.

- Consider wearing makeup instead of a mask which may hinder or restrict your child's vision.
- Stay in neighborhoods with people whom you are familiar with.
- Remind children not to eat their goodies before an adult can check them.
- Eat only unopened candies and those in original wrappers only.
- Put your outside house light on to show that your family is participating in trick-or treating.
- Remove objects from your yard that might present a hazard to trick-or-treaters.
- Keep an eye out for suspicious activities or persons in your neighborhood.


CHILD CAR SAFETY SEAT CHECKS

Did you know that according to national averages, approximately 4 out of every 5 child car safety seats is installed incorrectly? These installation errors are grave enough to contribute or cause injury or death to your child in the event of an otherwise survivable crash.

If used correctly, child safety seats are 71% effective in reducing deaths for infants in passenger cars and are 54% effective in reducing deaths for children ages 1 to 4.

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for children of every age from 6 to 14 years - due in part to the fact that most kids are unbuckled or improperly restrained in vehicles. From birth to age one, restraint use is

97 percent, for ages one to four it is 91 percent. From age 5 to 15, restraint use falls to 68.7 percent, and over 47 percent of fatally injured children ages four to seven are completely unrestrained. One study conducted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) showed that only 6.1 percent of booster-aged children were restrained in a booster seat.

2004 REVALUATION HAS BEEN COMPLETED . . . WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

WHAT IS A REVALUATION AND WHY WAS THIS DONE?

A revaluation is an examination of assessed values of all properties. In the process, some adjustments are made to guarantee that all property is assessed at 100% of market value. The goal is to fairly and equitably value each property so that taxpayers pay only their fair share. The last citywide revaluation was done in 2001, and due to changes in market conditions, 2003 assessments were generally at about only 80% of market value.


HOW DO I RECEIVE MORE INFORMATION ABOUT MY ASSESSMENTS, OR ABOUT THE REVALUATION?

Notice of Assessment forms were mailed to all property owners in mid-July. The notice included information about steps to take to review your assessment if you believed it to be incorrect. If you did not receive a notice, please contact the staff of the City Assessor's office at (414) 768-6506. For those property owners that believe their assessment is incorrect, the notice included information about scheduling an Open Book review with the assessment firm's staff. The notice also contained information about the Board of Review, which will be held in mid-September. Please contact the City Clerk's office at (414) 768-6500 if you need information on the Board's procedures.

HOW WILL MY NEW VALUES AFFECT MY PROPERTY TAXES?

The revaluation of property does not increase or decrease taxes. The amount of tax to be levied is determined by the governing bodies later in the year, and the value of a property is used to

determine the share of the taxes to be paid by that property. The new values will be reflected on the 2004 tax bill, issued in December.

The City of Oak Creek web site is continually being updated with pertinent information for City residents. If you have not checked us out recently, now may be a good time visit our site. If something new or different is happening in City government it is featured on the web site.

Many Oak Creek residents are proficient web surfers and



email users. With the advent of broadband connections, hackers, and malicious programmers, the Internet has become a dangerous place for computers. In the past several months the proliferation of new viruses, spam, fraudulent emails and spy ware has become endemic. To protect your computer, there are

several relatively simple steps you can take to minimize the dangers when surfing the net, reading emails or using chat rooms.

I have several suggestions for Internet surfers. Don't load software from the Internet unless you really have a need for it or are sure exactly what it is. The reason that you can download and install search bars, screen savers, weather, shopping/coupon savers, KaZaA, or cute animal programs like Bonzo and others is that they want to sell you something or sell your name and information to others. Nothing is truly free. Many times the software that you think you are installing is only part of the package, the software may install a spy ware program to run in the background.

For those of you who are not aware spy ware is stealth software installed on your PC that can read your files, track what you type, where you surf or even take control of your PC and have it running a program that you are not aware of. Note: most spy ware programs will load without your knowledge or permission and you will not realize that they are installed on your computer.

A caution for those of you who use email, most viruses are transmitted thru emails. Don't open emails from people you don't know especially if they have an attachment. Also as with sickness and viruses in the real world, it is likely that you will receive infected emails from those you love as most viruses proliferate by sending infected files to everyone in your friend/relatives address book. Also many viruses will spoof (in effect steal) your email address making it look like you are sending an email message when it is someone's computer that actually is sending it. A last word of caution – if you get an email from a person in a foreign country offering

to transfer money into your account or from any bank (including your own), credit card company, or the IRS etc. requesting they want to verify personal or financial information

Don't do it – it is a scam!! And don't go to the web site or call the telephone number listed in the email; instead look up the correct web address or telephone number and visit or call it.

It is always a good idea to back up any documents or files (word processing, spread sheet, pictures etc.) that you have created in case something happens to your computer i.e. a hardware failure or a virus infection. Most documents are automatically stored in your My Documents folder. If you have a CD burner make a regular habit of copying those files off

If your computer has Windows 95/98 on it realize that your system is more vulnerable. With the current wave of spy ware and viruses going around, here are a few suggestions to make your computer more resistant to them:

- 1. Check many Internet service providers offer virus scanning, spam and spy ware protection as part of their services to their customers. However, do not rely only on them to keep your PC safe.
- 2. Make sure and use windows update http://www.microsoft.com to load patches on a regular basis.
- 3. Install anti virus software and make sure you update it daily or weekly at a minimum.
- 4. You may want to use Netscape, Mozilla or other free Internet browser instead if Microsoft Internet Explorer as many viruses and spy ware need I.E. to load and operate.
- 5. In the Add/remove programs look for installed software that does not look like it should be on your system like Bonzo, coupon advertisers, search bar, etc. and remove.
- 6. Loading Spy Sweeper or Spybot software (\$30+/-) will also help protect your PC.
- 7. If you can afford a firewall either hardware or software install one. Note: many times you can purchase a router for DSL or Cable with a built-in firewall.

If your computer has Windows 2000 or XP installed as your operating system there are several additional steps you can take. They are:

- 1. First create an admin account on your computer to load software. Next, create separate accounts for each user and make these accounts limited users not administrators or power users. To do this as the administrator go to User Accounts in the Control Panel. Using a limited user account will prevent or make it difficult for any spy ware to load. Do not use the administrator account to surf the Internet except to load Windows updates.
- 2. In Windows XP you can activate the firewall in the Control Panel under Network connections.

Finally, if your computer is infected with a virus you can go to most virus software web sites and download virus removal tools.

Hopefully this information will make your computing experiences more trouble free.

FALL CLEAN-UP BEGINS NOVEMBER 15, 2004

The Street Department will conduct a Fall clean up beginning on November 15, 2004. Items that will be picked up are as follows:

- Yard Waste; excluding leaves, grass and branches
- Construction Materials; not resulting from a contractor
- FurnitureAppliances
- Wood
- AppliancesMattresses
- MetalTelevisions
- Carpeting/Rugs


Items that will not be picked up are as follows:

- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- · Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves
- Branches
- Fluorescent Tubes

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside prior to November 15th in order to be guaranteed a pick up.

NEW GARBAGE CART AND RECYCLING CART LOCATION

The City of Oak Creek has now changed to an automated garbage pick up system which means that a mechanical arm that is attached to the garbage truck will be mechanically picking up the City of Oak Creek blue garbage carts that were recently delivered to your residence. This automated arm must have a three foot (3') clearance in order to pick up the cart. No object can be placed within a three foot (3') radius of your blue garbage cart. This includes your Waste Management recycling cart. Please see the illustration below:







BRANCH PICK UP POLICY

The City will collect and process brush and tree trimmings placed at the curb five times per year:

- once beginning April 1st
- once beginning May 1st
- once beginning June 1st
- once beginning Aug. 1st
- once beginning October 1st

Brush & tree trimmings shall be placed at the curb in a stacked & orderly manner with the cut ends facing the road prior to the *first week of the month*. During the first week of the month, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the City will remove the materials & process them, resulting in chips and/or mulch being made available to the residents. Following periods of several weather causing downed limbs/ trees and as directed by the Street Department Superintendent, the City will collect brush & trees resulting from the storm.

The City of Oak Creek *will not* pick up brush, tree-trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of a contractor performing work on the property. The City of Oak Creek *will not* pick up brush, tree trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of lot clearing.



NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL & PARK FACILITIES

The Oak Creek-Franklin School District and City officials have approved a land-swamp deal that allows the school district to receive a 9 acre city-owned piece of land located at 10511 S. Chicago Road (once proposed Scanlan Park Site) in exchange for two 4-5 acre parcels (located at Manor Marquette and Chapel Hills Parks) owned by the school district.

The school district will use the acquired site to construct a new elementary school. The development will include such park facilities as a softball diamond, multipurpose grass play area, basketball standards, playstructure/swings and asphalt pedestrian pathway.

District officials hope to have the new school open by September 1, 2005.

SOUTH HILLS PARK

The filling, grading and restoration work at South Hills Park should be completed this year at this new neighborhood park site located at 9299 South 22nd Street. The City Common Council approved Sixth District Alderman Stephen Jonas' proposal to sell the current one acre South Hills playground site located at 2300 West Southland Drive and use the proceeds to help develop the new neighborhood park site.

The new 12 acre neighborhood park may include such park facilities as an early childhood playstructure (for children ages 2-5), school age playstructure (for children 5-12), sledding hill, ballfield, multi-purpose grass play field, basketball court, tennis courts, sand volleyball court, picnic shelter, parking lot and asphalt pedestrian pathway.

Additional funds for park facility development will be requested during the 2005 budget process. The intent is to coordinate the sell of the playground site with development of the park facilities in 2005.

SCHOOL NEWS & EVENTS

SCHOOL DISTRICT CONTINUES WORK ON STRATEGIC PLAN

In the fall of 2002, a district strategic plan was developed with input from community members, staff, administrators, and school board members. The goals and plan were approved by the Board of Education in December 2003. The strategic plan committee identified five long-term goals and developed specific objectives for each year from 2003 through 2006. Below is a summary of the objectives that were achieved this past school year for each of the goals.

Goal 1: Annually increase student achievement scores on the WKCE and district assessments by focusing on writing across the curriculum

- Oak Creek 4th, 8th, and 10th graders scored above the state average in each subject area on the 2003-04 Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE).
- Oak Creek 3rd graders scored above the state average on the 2003-04 Wisconsin Reading Comprehension Test (WRCT).
- The school district offered a 3-credit graduate course on Using Writing to Extend Learning across the Curriculum in the summer of 2003, the fall of 2003, and the summer of 2004.

Approximately 60 staff members have participated in this course.

- All 7th and 9th graders in the district participated in the pilot of the district writing assessment this spring. This has established the baseline for assessing and improving student writing. During the 2004-05 school year, this will be expanded to include all 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th graders in the district.
- During the 2003-04 school year, district inservices and workshops focused on increasing the quality and quantity of student writing to support learning within the curricular areas.

Goal 2: Annually provide specific staff development opportunities that are related to student achievement and the state teacher/ administrator/pupil services standards

• District inservices and staff development this year focused on developing and using valid formative and summative assessments (standard 8), improving student writing (standard 1),

developing lessons that align with state academic standards and appropriately match students' needs and abilities (standards 1 and 2), and planning instruction that challenges students appropriately and differentiates accordingly (standards 3, 4, and 7). The staff development opportunities included 5 inservice days, 3 courses, 16 after school workshops, and 3 summer workshops.

• Administrative inservices have been conducted throughout the year to focus on implementing the new teacher supervision/evaluation process based on the ten standards, developing professional learning communities (standards 9 and 10), and facilitating change.

Goal 3: Increase the number and effectiveness of partnerships within the community that complement and supplement our educational programs

- Three businesses worked with the schools in piloting the Adopt-a-Classroom program: WE Energies partnered with the 5th grade classrooms at Carollton in helping students learn about solar power and the principles of motion; M&I Bank partnered with 8th graders at East Middle School in applying math concepts in learning about financial investment; and TriCity Bank partnered with a 5th grade class at Meadowview Elementary in helping students apply math skills and understand basic banking concepts such as managing bank accounts.
- A Business-Education Partnership steering committee (including representatives from area businesses, MATC, and the school district) has been meeting monthly since March 2003 to plan and implement programs such as Adopt-a-Classroom, Career days, Job Shadowing, and Service Learning projects.
- During the 2003-04 school year (the first year of our Community Education program) 13 adult education courses involving 118 adult learners in our community were offered during the fall of 2003 and 24 adult education courses involving 205 community members were offered during the spring of 2004.
- A database has been developed to identify where service learning is being integrated into the curriculum, what community service projects are being done, and which businesses or organizations are working with our schools on these projects.
- The school district is part of a consortium with neighboring school districts and area colleges that has received a Vista Grant to develop and support service learning projects in our school districts and communities, including partnerships with area businesses and organizations. During the 2004-05 school year, Oak Creek-Franklin Joint School District will host one of the Vista service learning facilitators for the consortium; the facilitator is being provided through grant funds.

Goal 4: Develop ways to make our schools safe, positive, inviting places for students, staff, and community members

- Cameras and buzzers were installed at each school district facility to help provide more security for students, staff, and community members in our buildings.
- Proximity access (swipe cards) have been investigated this past year and will be implemented next year to better control access to the buildings. The programmable cards will replace keys for staff and community members who use or rent the facilities.
- The Crisis Plan has been updated and will continue to be reviewed and revised annually.

SCHOOL NEWS & EVENTS

- Each school is implementing a character education program focused on making the school environment safer and more positive for students.
- Teachers and administrators have participated in inservices and discussions on developing professional learning communities and becoming more invitational schools.

Goal 5: Evaluate future facility needs and explore the possibility of an elementary or early learning school

- The Future Facilities Committee began meeting in the summer of 2003 through spring of 2004 to look at the space needs of the elementary schools and explore five options for addressing these space needs.
- The Future Facilities Committee recommended to the Board of Education that a new elementary school be built to help address the space needs.
- The Board of Education voted in February to place a referendum question on the April ballot for borrowing up to \$8 million for a new elementary school. The referendum was approved by the voters in April.
- The City of Oak Creek worked with the school district in a land exchange in order to save the taxpayers money on purchasing a site for the new elementary school.
- Schematic drawings for a new school have been completed and construction documents are currently being developed. The project is expected to be completed prior to the start of the 2005-06 school year.
- building committee of staff and community members has been providing input on the project and another committee will work in the fall of 2004 to recommend new boundary areas to the Board of Education.
- The Board of Education is currently developing a long-term facilities planning committee to work with a facilities planning consultant in creating a 10-15 year plan to address the school district's facilities needs.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL SET TO BREAK GROUND

Planning for the new elementary school is well underway, and construction is set to begin in late September of early October. Voss Jorgensen Schueler, the construction manager for this project, estimates the timeline for the construction phase to be about $10 \frac{1}{2}$ months, which gives us time to have the building ready for occupation in time for the beginning of the 2005-06 school year.

The City of Oak Creek has been working with the school district in acquiring land, exchanging the nine acres of Scanlan Park property for two 4-5 acre parcels of park land that the school district owned and helping to facilitate coordination of street access and storm water management with the neighboring subdivisions. The planning commission and Common Council also approved the zoning change for Scanlan property to institutional.

A building committee including staff and community members has been meeting regularly with representatives from the architect firm, Eppstein Uhen, and from Voss Jorgensen Schueler. They have been providing input into the design details.

The committee has also been working to come up with a name and mascot for the new elementary school. They will be making their recommendations to the Board of Education at its August meeting, at which time the Board will act to approve a name for the school.

Another committee will begin working in October to begin studying enrollments by area, including projected enrollments for the next three years, in order to redraw the attendance area boundaries for each of the elementary schools. The Board of Education will also begin working this fall on developing a long-term facilities plan to help create a master plan for the next 10-15 years. The plan will address building maintenance, possible space needs, and potential solutions to possible space needs. The event is named after the first president of the OCFFE and one of its co-founders, John Grahovac, who passed away last spring.

The event begins at 5:30 p.m. with a cash bar and silent auction. Dinner begins at 6:30 p.m., and entertainment will be provided by the staff and students of the Oak Creek-Franklin Joint School District. A variety of musical groups will be performing. The silent auction will close at 8:30 p.m., at which time the winners will be announced.

The cost of the event is \$30 per person. \$10 of the cost of each ticket is tax deductible. All funds raised through this event will be distributed by the Oak Creek-Franklin Foundation for Education (an independent, community-based, non-profit organization) to students, staff, educational groups, or programs in order to enhance the educational opportunities of students in the Oak Creek-Franklin schools.

FINE PRINT: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

WHO'S THE TEACHER?

The Recreation Department assigns the most qualified leaders available to all program activities. Your feedback regarding instructors/leaders is always welcome.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the needs of the program, such as leadership, equipment and supplies, etc.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Any family unable to pay all or part of the fees or charges may contact the office. Arrangements will be made for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Anytime a team or individual requests a transfer, and the Department can accommodate the transfer, a \$3 service charge will be payable to the Department.

There is no charge for transfers initiated by Department Instructors or for those accompanied by proof of the child passing/failing the previous class.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested by an individual.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

Overpayments must be picked up in the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Office within 2 weeks of notification to avoid forfeiture (under \$5) or a \$3 check processing fee (over \$5).

IS THERE CLASS TODAY?

It is sometimes necessary to cancel an activity due to school-related functions, weather, etc. Participants will be notified of cancellations as soon as we are aware of them.

Every attempt will be made to reschedule a cancelled activity. However, if a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to provide the best and safest environment for programs, we do not allow persons other than registered participants in the classroom or pool during instruction.

Our instructors have found that parents and/or other children can cause distractions and interruptions in instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

Open House:

DO YOU HAVE INSURANCE?

The Department does not provide hospital/medical insurance coverage for program participants. Further, the School District does not provide hospital/medical coverage for Department sponsored activities on school property. Participants are encouraged to obtain their own insurance coverage prior to and for the duration of the activity they take part in from their own insurance agent.

AMIA RESIDENT?

A non-resident fee is set for most activities. The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is **not** within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. All individuals or groups registering in classes or activities must show proof of City residency such as a current State of Wisconsin driver's license, a current utility bill, etc. If proof of residency cannot be validated, the non-resident fee standards will be applied.
