



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THE MAYOR'S DESK

Dear Oak Creek Residents:



with many people regarding City business. I will continue my recovery process for the next two to three months; but I plan to stay as active as I possibly can.

Many of my most recent meetings with various department managers and employees became brainstorming sessions regarding the efficiency of every department. Without their visions and extensive knowledge of the department, much of this planning could not have been accomplished.

We were able to identify that vehicles owned by the City could be kept for longer periods of time with more thorough maintenance and record keeping. Vehicle replacement will be based on condition rather than on an arbitrary preset time for turnover.

Street, Parks & Forestry Departments will now be working together. If one department is busy, it will be able to resource additional labor through the other two departments. This will decrease the number of overtime hours and the necessity to call in part-time employees.

Grass cutting on roadsides and parks will also be done on an "as needed" basis rather than cutting grass because, "It's Tuesday."

The Police Department mechanic, the Highway Department mechanics, and the Parks mechanic will now be doing all of the maintenance on the City vehicles. The Street Department mechanics already are handling all of the Fire Department's engines and ambulances for total maintenance and repair, thus saving us a great deal of money.

Forestry has given me a plan to do all of the planting of City trees. We have the equipment and the personnel to handle our own planting projects.

With the above-mentioned ideas, we will become more efficient and bring our outsourcing projects to a minimum.

I would like to see 1/2-acre lots become the norm to minimize our problems with storm water run-off, the expense of additional schools, police officers and fire personnel.

If new schools are needed and approved by the public, I feel that the City could possibly donate some parkland for the building site, saving the taxpayer from buying more land.

I know what I see on a daily basis; I can't be everywhere, your input is valuable tome. The 2nd Saturday of the month, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon is your time to be heard.

At a recent basketball tournament this phrase was on the wall,

"It's amazing how much can be accomplished when no one cares who gets the credit." Let's all work together to make Oak Creek the best it can be.

OAK CREEK POLICE DEPARTMENT CONCERNED PARENTS PROGRAM

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents may leave a key with the Police Department and give permission for officers to gain entry to their home during their absence, in the event that there is a party or other illegal activity on the premises. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent. To register for this program, stop at the Oak Creek Police Department during business hours and sign a consent form.

Make sure to bring an extra key.

PROJECT CHILDSAFE GUN LOCK PROGRAM

The Oak Creek Police Department received a limited supply of gun locks from Project Childsafe, a program sponsored by the National Shooting Sports Foundation, and a federal government Department Of Justice grant. The locks are free to all interested Oak Creek residents. Only one (1) lock per person (or per family) will be distributed due to the limited number of locks available.

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HEALTH DEPARTMENT

PREVENT WEST NILE VIRUS; IT'S MOSQUITO CONTROL TIME AGAIN!!!

Thanks to everyone who made their properties "mosquito proof" last summer. Now is the time to start "mosquito proofing" for 2004. Please do not allow standing water on your property. Empty/refill birdbaths and wading pools every 2-3 days. Don't forget about flowerpots or other containers that can hold water.

Protect yourself. Wear long-sleeved clothing. Apply an insecticide with DEET to your clothing. Try not to be outside when mosquitoes are the most active – dawn and dusk.

The City will be applying larvacide to sewer catch basins that contain standing water. This will be done towards the end of June. We will also be monitoring selected sites for the presence of those mosquitoes known to carry and transmit West Nile Virus. We will continue to take reports of dead birds, especially crow, ravens, and blue jays. Call 768-6525 to report dead birds.

COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY RESULTS

The survey results are in! This was from a telephone survey conducted last year. 62% of the respondents said that their health was excellent or very good. 83% received a routine health checkup within the past two years and 76% received a dental exam in the past year. 41% reported having at least one risk factor for heart disease. Only 29% meet the recommended standards for moderate physical activity levels. 25% are current smokers. 60% prefer smoke-free dining in restaurants and 59% favor an ordinance prohibiting smoking in eating establishments. The Health Department began its 2004 Prevention Grant activities on April 1st. We are working with families to prevent their risk of heart disease by assisting them with

changes in either their diet or physical activity. We will be having a presentation from the Beef Council and a Pilates demonstration during the summer months.

CHANGES IN THE IMMUNIZATION LAW

UTILITY GETS EXCELLENCE IN FINANCIAL REPORTING CERTIFICATE 10 YEARS RUNNING

Rate payers served by the Oak Creek Water and Sewer Utility can rest assured the financial accounting of their utility goes beyond standard accounting practices. The utility voluntarily submitted financial reports for independent review, and — for the 10th consecutive year — received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA).

"Sound financial reporting saves rate payers money by allowing the utility to borrow money less expensively," said Steve Yttri, utility general manager. "It enhances our standing in the financial community, making us more attractive for investors."

Award-winning state and local government financial reports are reviewed and selected by the national GFOA. Certified financial reports go beyond the requirements of generally accepted accounting principles, according to GFOA.

"This provides the users of government financial statements — including rate payers, media and investors — with more information useful in evaluating financial conditions of government entities," Yttri says.

Nationally, about 4.5 percent of all cities and 15.16 percent of all counties participate in the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting program. In Wisconsin, only about 1 percent of the 1,850 municipalities and 14 percent of the 72 counties submits a Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for review.

UTILITY UPDATES RATE PAYERS ON OAK CREEK-FRANKLIN WATER DISPUTE

For nearly a year, Oak Creek has been engaged with Franklin to resolve a dispute over who owns the water distribution infrastructure in the eastern retail district of Franklin. The retail district currently is a customer of the Oak Water and Sewer Utility, but was scheduled to become a retail customer of the Franklin Water Utility as a result of a recent Wisconsin Public Service Commission order.

The original retail water district serving eastern parts of Franklin originated in 1973 when the two utilities entered a 30-year retail water service agreement. Then,

Franklin did not have the capacity to service its customers in this area. Franklin officials approached Oak Creek to provide water service, including water system maintenance, customer service and billing.

The differences between wholesale and retail water service is simple. Utilities serving retail water districts distribute the water and maintain the infrastructure as well as service and bill its customers directly. With wholesale water service a utility sells water to a city, which then in turn functions as a retail distributor to its customers.

While Franklin paid for construction of the water system infrastructure, Oak Creek required ownership of the infrastructure to provide retail service. As a result, Franklin deeded the infrastructure for this area to Oak Creek

This year the contract between the utilities expires. Therein, lies the dispute.

Franklin contends it deserves return of the district water main infrastructure from Oak Creek free of charge. Oak Creek, which stands to lose \$350,000 annually due to the difference between retail and wholesale rates, actually owns the infrastructure since it was deeded to it 30 years ago. The utility proposed two solutions to the dispute to ensure retail ratepayers are not impacted by the loss of revenue from the transfer of ownership.

One proposal calls for Franklin to purchase the infrastructure for an undisclosed amount from its current owner Oak Creek. The other proposal calls for an increase in wholesale water rates. Wholesale rates would affect the amount paid by the City of Franklin for water supplied from Oak Creek's pipeline to Lake Michigan. An example was given by Yttri to clarify the issue.

"It's as if you are selling your car and the buyer (in this case Franklin) sues you because your selling price is too high," Yttri said.

Depending on the outcome of a PSC hearing scheduled for the end of March (the time of this article's writing), the dispute might take a few months up to a year to resolve.

"How we proceed and the length of time to resolve this issue really depends on the outcomes of each step along the way," Yttri said.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

THE 2004 REVALUATION IS UNDERWAY...



The revaluation of all property in the City of Oak Creek is underway. The project, being handled by a team from Cole-Layer-Trumble Company (CLT) and overseen by the City

Assessor's office, is scheduled for completion by July, 2004.

Here are answers to some of the most common questions about the revaluation process:

What is a revaluation?

A revaluation is a complete examination of all assessments. In the process, some adjustments are made to guarantee that all property is assessed at 100% of market value. The goal is to fairly and equitably value each property so that taxpayers pay only their fair share.

Why is this being done?

The last revaluation was done in 2001, and due to changes in market conditions our current assessments generally are at about 80% of market value.

What revaluation activities will I see in my neighborhood?

CLT representatives will be visiting many areas of the City over the next few months to collect data and take photographs. The field crews will be verifying the accuracy of property data that is currently on file. The representatives may go onto your property, or may request entry into your home or building if an interior inspection is needed; generally, interior inspections are needed if the home has been sold within the past two years, if remodeling has been done, or if requested by the property owner.

How can I be sure that someone entering my property is a CLT official?

All vehicles used by the revaluation personnel will display an identification sign and all field personnel will carry official City of Oak Creek photo Identification Cards.

PLEASE ASK FOR ID FROM ANYONE REQUESTING ENTRY

If you are in doubt about admitting someone, please call the Assessor's office or the Police Department to verify the individual's credentials BEFORE allowing them to enter.

When will I receive information about my assessment?

All property owners will receive a Notice of Assessment form in mid-July. The notice will include information about scheduling an open book appointment to review your assessment if you believe it to be incorrect. The notice will also contain information about the Board of Review.

What if I have more questions about the revaluation? Contact the City Assessor's office at 768-6506 if you need more information.

FALL ELECTIONS



The Fall Partisan Primary Election will be held on <u>Tuesday, September 14, 2004</u>, and the General and Presidential Election will

be held Tuesday, November 2, 2004.

Due to the expected large voter turnouts, those residents not currently registered are encouraged to register early to vote. A qualified elector must be at least 18 years of age, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the City for at least 10 days prior to registering to vote.

- Also watch for special voter registration events in fall

MILWAUKEE COUNTY SUPERVISORY DISTRICT BOUNDARY CHANGES

For your information -

Prior to the 2004 Spring Election, the entire city was in Milwaukee County Supervisory District 19. As a result of Milwaukee County's redistricting and reduction in the number of supervisors, all but two wards within the City of Oak Creek will have their district number changed to Milwaukee County Supervisory District 9. Two wards, Ward 3 in Aldermanic District 1, and Ward 10 in Aldermanic District 4, have become part of County Supervisory District 8.

Residents of Ward 3 and Ward 10 were notified by mail of the change in district. Voting locations remain the same for all city voters.

RAIN GARDENS



Rain gardens are plantings of attractive, moisture tolerant native plants and wildflowers which help to improve the quality of the storm water runoff from suburban lawns and driveways. Runoff from these

areas contains many pollutants that are generated as part of day to day suburban living. These pollutants include excess nutrients from fertilizer, pesticide residue, and particulates from the road and driveways.

Typically, suburban storm water, along with any pollution it picks up along the way, goes directly to the streams and lakes. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, storm water runoff from urban and suburban areas is a leading cause of pollution of our lakes and streams. The City of Oak Creek has implemented programs such as street sweeping, catch basin cleaning, and outfall monitoring, to improve the quality of the storm water runoff and the lakes and streams in the area.

There are also some ways that individual homeowners can contribute to improving the runoff quality in their neighborhood. One of these is incorporating rain gardens in their yard. While all vegetated areas provide some degree of rain water infiltration, rain gardens incorporate additional features to maximize infiltration and minimize vegetation maintenance. Typically, a rain garden should be located near a source of runoff, such as adjacent to a driveway, at the end of the sump pump drain, or at the end of a downspout off the roof. The garden is designed with a shallow depression to allow the water to collect and infiltrate into the soil. The action of the soil particles as well as the nutrient needs of the plants themselves assist in removing many pollutants from the runoff, which minimizes the pollutants that reach our streams and groundwater.

In some areas of the City, homeowners are required to connect the sump pump drain directly to the storm sewer. In other areas, the homeowners are required to connect their downspouts directly to the storm sewer. A homeowner should not eliminate these connections to install a rain garden. However, those homes without direct connections might want to consider a rain garden.

A rain garden is not a pond. It is intended to dry out

between rainfalls, much like a conventional garden. The rain garden should be planted with native species which are more tolerant of wet conditions and also more tolerant of drought than many non-native plants. The underlying soil type and size of tributary drainage area are also factors to be considered in determining the size and layout of a rain garden. These native plants often provide food and habitat which can help attract more songbirds and butterflies to your yard.

The UW-Extension website at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs/raingarden has a great deal of information and resources regarding which native plant species and wildflowers will do well in a rain garden setting. This site has a brochure with a do-it-yourself guide for homeowners. This brochure includes guidelines such as: the rain garden should be at least 10 feet from the house to avoid water seeping into the foundation; the rain garden should be put in a fairly flat area of the yard for ease of installation; a rain garden should not be located directly over a septic system.

The soils for a rain garden must be capable of infiltrating water. The brochure has information on a simple test you can do to determine if the soil in your yard is suitable for a rain garden. The size of a



rain garden is influenced by the size of the area draining to it, as well as the type and depth of soil in the garden. The brochure explains these factors and gives easy to follow guidelines on sizing your rain garden. This brochure also contains answers to frequently asked questions, including questions regarding mosquitoes and rain gardens.

Copies of these brochures are also available at the public library or at the Engineering Department in City Hall.

GYPSY MOTH UPDATE

Here we go... 2004 will begin the first aerial spray treatment blocks for gypsy moth in Oak Creek. By the time this article is in hand, blocks will likely have been treated already. Oak Creek has two spray blocks, one handled by the City Forester and the other by the County. The City spray block is located in the 10000 to 10200 blocks of S. McGraw Drive and the County spray block is in the northeast section of Bender Park.

Residents with homes or property within and up to 250 feet surrounding spray blocks were contacted by mail, invited to a public informational and given time to respond with questions, concerns or objections. We will continue to hold gypsy moth informational sessions to help address residential concerns and to keep news current on the local treatment program.

Frequently Asked Questions:

- Q: Why are gypsy moths being treated?
- A: Gypsy moth caterpillars feed on the leaves of many trees. Their populations can grow quickly, striping trees of many or even all leaves. The resulting damage can have a severe affect on the survival of trees and the overall urban canopy cover.
- Q: What is used in aerial spray treatment?
- A: Foray, a brand name for *Bacillus thuringiensis kurstaki* (commonly called Btk). The active ingredient is a naturally-occurring soil bacterium that kills gypsy moth caterpillars when they ingest it. Btk is only effective against early-stage caterpillars.
- Q: Does the spray hurt people?
- A: Btk has been used for more than 30 years for gypsy moth control and has undergone thousands of lab and field tests. It is possible, but very unlikely, that people with **severe** food allergies or asthma may react to the spray. Those with such conditions are simply asked to use the precaution of staying indoors while the planes are spraying.
- Q: Does the spray hurt other animals?
- **A:** Btk is harmless for all animals except caterpillars that feed in May.
- Q: Will the spray damage paint on vehicles?
- A: No. However, if you let Btk spray dry on your vehicle for several days, you may need to soak it with wet cloth for 15 minutes before washing it, or run it through the car wash twice (avoiding any wax application until the spray residue is removed).
- Q: When does aerial spraying occur?
- A: We will spray the treatment block once in mid-May to early June; exact timing will depend on the weather and growth/size of the caterpillars. At that time, an update will be available through the Parks, Recreation and Forestry office (768-6515) or the DNR toll free gypsy moth hot line which will be activated in May for updates on regional spray plans: (800-642-MOTH). Spraying may begin as early as 5:15 a.m.

- Q: Why do you have to spray so early and fly so low?
- A: We need the high humidity and low winds typical of early morning to assure the Btk doesn't evaporate and/or blow away before it lands on the trees. We also want to avoid distracting commuters with low-flying planes. The planes fly low (about 50 feet above the tree line) to minimize the possibility of the spray evaporating or drifting. This year, airplanes are yellow with a horizontal, blue stripe.
- Q: When do caterpillars do the most damage to trees?
- A: By some time in June, caterpillars will reach their later stages of growth and become hardy feeders. Feeding will continue into July and as late as early August. Please note: gypsy moths do not make webs and adults the moths themselves live only to mate; they do not feed.
- Q: What can I do to manage gypsy moths?
- A: Excellent information is available at:

It is highly likely that we will see a continuing increase in gypsy moth populations in the next few years. Although caterpillar size and activity is monitored (bands and traps are set for caterpillar and moth counts, and fall egg mass surveys are performed yearly), there is no substitute for your direct communication.

EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB)

Keep an eye on news and information regarding the emerald ash borer. This invading, exotic, Asian insect has made its way across the lower peninsula of Michigan destroying millions of ash trees in its path. It has also been found in Maryland, Ohio and Canada. The larva which bores into trees is the damaging agent. The EAB shows a preference for green ash (over white) and has been noted for damage to other trees including lilac and privet. Because this insect is insignificant in its homeland, little is known about it. If you see the emerald ash borer, please attempt to capture it (alive in a jar is best) and call City Forestry. Thanks!

WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

- With the warm weather comes more activities outside. There are more car windows down and gatherings at residences. Please be courteous of your neighbors with regard to loud noise and music levels. The Oak Creek Police Department responds to complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for loud noise/music (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Rummage sale, garage sale, advertising or other such signs cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-of-ways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of illegal *fireworks*, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as hot as 1,200 degrees and can cause serious injury to young hands and eyes.

SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:

• Residents can request a "vacation watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and

when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will then conduct periodic checks of your home while you are gone.

- Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away. Arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.
- Arrange for your lawn to be moved if you are going away for an extended period of time.
- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. The Oak Creek Police Department has an engraving tool available for public use which enables you to etch personal identification codes on your valuables. For more information on signing out the tool, call 766-7623. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.
- Be a good neighbor. Consider starting a Neighborhood Watch Program to get to know your neighbors and watch out for each other. If you notice anything suspicious, call 9-1-1 immediately and report it to the police.

HOME SECURITY SURVEY PROGRAM

The Oak Creek Police Department is sponsoring a FREE home security survey. ALL Oak Creek residents qualify for the program. The home security survey includes:



- A comprehensive analysis of your residential security by a trained police officer.
- · A detailed copy of the security survey that includes recommendations that may reduce your risk of becoming a victim of a property crime.

SEVERE WEATHER

With winds that may exceed 200 mph, tornadoes are one of nature's most violent storms. Unfortunately, we are unable to determine exactly where a tornado will strike, when it will touch down, or how much damage it will cause. However, meteorologists have the ability to identify weather patterns that have the greatest potential for creating tornadoes and severe thunderstorms. When it is apparent that weather conditions are appropriate for severe storms, meteorologists are able to alert you of the approaching, dangerous weather.

To better understand when weather patterns start becoming dangerous, we must first understand some to the terminology used by the National Weather Service. Knowing the difference between a watch and a warning may take away some of the confusion associated with a severe weather alert.

Severe Thunderstorm Watch- indicates the possibility of strong thunderstorms later in the day or night, with wind gust up to 58 mph and /or hail with a diameter of 3/4 inch or larger.

Severe Thunderstorm Warning- a severe thunderstorm has formed and is moving toward or across the indicated counties. (Tornados can be formed by severe thunderstorms).

Tornado Watch- Even though a tornado has not been spotted, conditions are right for the formation of tornadoes. (A tornado watch may be in effect during a thunderstorm warning).

Tornado Warning- A tornado or funnel cloud has been spotted and is moving toward or across the indicated counties.

In the event of a severe thunderstorm watch or warning, get out of water, stay away from trees, and seek shelter (indoors, if possible). Tune into your local weather broadcast and stay informed about changes in the weather. During a tornado watch or warning, prepare to take shelter in the basement, under a solid object, or in the middle of your house away from the windows (if a basement is not available).

During a tornado warning, the City of Oak Creek uses Emergency Warning Sirens to advise citizens of the approaching weather. The Emergency Warning Siren System is designed to notify people (outdoors) of potential tornado activity. The entire city is capable of being alerted through the use of its three sirens. The north and northwest part of the city is notified by a siren that has been placed at the Little League complex (7800 S. 6th Street). The east and south east part of the city is protected by the siren on E. Ryan Road (2651 E. Ryan Road). The west and south west part of the city is capable of hearing the siren on W. Ryan Road (150 W. Ryan Road).

The Emergency Warning System will be activated one of two ways: (1) Milwaukee County Emergency Management will activate the sirens when a tornado warning as been posted for Milwaukee County, or (2) the Oak Creek Police Department will activate the system when there is a sighting of a funnel cloud by a police officer, firefighter, or trained storm spotter.

The sirens are tested on the second Wednesday of every month at 11:00 a.m. To alleviate confusion, the sirens will not be tested during severe weather, so if you hear the sirens and the weather is threatening, take cover and tune into you local weather broadcast.

One draw back to the system is that it was not designed to notify people who are indoors (especially sleeping). The best way to be notified of severe weather is through the use of a weather radio (available through most electronic stores). The radio should be 110v. with a battery back-up.

Prepare for a disaster, involve your family, and strive to survive. Help your family understand the importance of recognizing bad weather, and how to become more informed about severe weather. Plan for disaster by making a survival kit that you can take into your shelter. Suggestions for survival kit contents include: food and water, first aid supplies, flashlights (not candles), blankets, cellular phone, etc. Practice taking cover and give everyone a job to do (collecting supplies).

NEW AMBULANCES

In March, the Fire Department took delivery of two new MedTec, Freightliner ambulances. One of the new ambulances replaced an older ambulance (1990 Ford), and one is an addition to

the fleet (6 total). Now, each fire station has two ambulances assigned to its inventory. The new ambulances come at a time when emergency medical responses and the need for additional ambulances are increasing- it is not uncommon for several ambulances to be dedicated to separate incidents.

The design of the ambulance matches that of the paramedic unit. The larger frame chassis offers operational versatility and mechanical consistency. In addition, maintenance costs have been projected to decrease as a result labor cost reduction- many repairs can be handled by Street Department mechanics and fire fighters assigned to fleet maintenance.

The new ambulances have been assigned to Station #2 (3950 E. Oakwood Road) and Station #3 (7000 S. 6 Street). For more information stop by for a tour, or call 570-5630.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Sometimes bad things happen to good people. In the City of Oak Creek when bad things happen to our citizens (the good people) they can depend on the City's Emergency Management Team to help put things back to right.

The City has an Emergency Operation Plan that provides a framework for response by City staff to an emergency from any cause, a plane crash, a train derailment, a tornado, flooding, or any other situation that threatens the lives and property of our residents. Extensive training and testing has been done by the staff of City departments to prepare for dealing with these events. Procedures have been improved by lessons learned from dealing with actual emergencies that have occurred.

When a natural or man-made disaster strikes, citizens can obtain information, report problems, and request assistance by contacting the City's emergency services. For emergencies residents can contact our joint dispatch center by dialing 911. (Remember that calls to 911 on cell phones will be answered by the County Sheriff's Department. If you are using a cell phone, be sure to give adequate location information since cellular 911 calls do not yet have the automatic location features of our regular phones.)

For non-emergency calls and calls requesting information, residents can contact the City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at 570-5660.

When an emergency happens the EOC will be staffed by employees responding as quickly as possible. At times when the EOC is not in operation, this phone line will be answered at the joint dispatch center.

While we hope that our community will be safe from disasters, we also can assure residents that if and when they occur, your City staff will be on the job to manage the response and recovery efforts.

SPRING INTO THE OUTDOORS

NEW BRANCH PICK UP POLICY

The City will collect and process brush and tree trimmings placed at the curb *five times per year:*

- once beginning April 1st
- once beginning May 1st
- once beginning June 1st
- once beginning August 1st
- once beginning October 1st

Brush and tree trimmings shall be placed at the curb in a stacked and orderly manner with the cut ends facing the road prior to the *first week of the month*. During the first week of the month, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the City will remove the materials and process them, resulting in chips and/or mulch being made available to the residents. In addition, following periods of several weather causing downed limbs and trees and as directed by the Street Department Superintendent, the City will collect brush and trees resulting from the storm.



The City of Oak Creek *will not* pick up brush, tree-trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of a contractor performing work on the property. The City of Oak Creek *will not* pick up brush, tree trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of lot clearing.

SPRING CLEAN-UP BEGINS MAY 15

The Street Department will conduct a Spring clean up beginning on May 15, 2004. Items that will be picked up are as follows:

- Yard Waste; excluding leaves and grass
- Furniture
- Wood
- Appliances
- Construction Materials; not resulting from a contractor
- Metal
- Mattresses
- Televisions
- Carpeting/Rugs

Items that **will not** be picked up are as follows



- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside prior to May 15th in order to be guaranteed a pick up.

WOULD YOU HELP US WITH THE RECYCLING YARD?

Corrugated cardboard and paper are the most popular items brought to the City of Oak Creek drop off site, especially on Saturdays. As some of you may have experienced, by 1:00 p.m., the cardboard dumpsters are usually full and residents are told to place their cardboard in the garbage truck. For those residents who take the time to correctly handle their cardboard and paper, this can be very aggravating.

One of the ways residents can help us with this problem is to utilize the recycling service offered to all homeowners in the City of Oak Creek. Corrugated cardboard and paper are picked up curbside, along with your other recyclables, if the cardboard is broken down to 4 foot by 4 foot squares, no thicker than 8 inches and placed on top of your recycling cart.



If you must bring your cardboard and paper to the drop off site, PLEASE FOLD YOUR CARD-BOARD DOWN! Styrofoam and/or wood should be removed from the cardboard before it

is placed into the cardboard/paper recycling dumpsters. Please note that these dumpsters are exclusively for the recycling of CARDBOARD AND PAPER! Packing peanuts, Styrofoam, bubble wrap, wood or other miscellaneous packing items should not be placed in these dumpsters. If you are not sure where something should go, ask the yard attendant on duty. You may also call 570-5682 Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. until 3:15 p.m.

We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.



DOGS IN PARKS

In order to provide an opportunity for City residents to walk and exercise their dogs, the Common Council presently allows dogs in City parks. To prevent conflicts between dogs and other park users, we are asking dog owners to comply with the following guidelines:

- 1. It is unlawful for the dog to be allowed to run loose in the park. Owners must hold their dog on a leash not longer than 10 feet. Dogs must always be under the control of the owner.
- 2 Dog waste is not only offensive; it can also spread disease and parasites to other dogs & humans. It is unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit waste deposited by the dog to remain on park property. Owners must carry a waste deposit receptacle to immediately remove all waste matter. Owners are asked to deposit said waste matter in the appropriate manner at their home.

3. Owners are asked to keep their dogs out of picnic areas, playstructure/swing areas and areas marked, "No Dogs Allowed".

SCHOOL-COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS GROWING

Over the years, businesses in the Oak Creek-Franklin area have worked together with the schools to provide job shadowing and work experience opportunities

for Oak Creek High School students. They have participated in Junior Achievement programs and career days at the elementary and middle schools in Oak Creek-Franklin. Students have benefited in many ways from these programs, particularly learning about the strong connection between what they are learning in school and how those knowledge and skills are needed and used in the workplace.

On Thursday, April 29th, the school district honored the businesses and organizations that have supported the high school programs at its annual Employers' Appreciation Breakfast. Their interest in and willingness to partner with the high school is invaluable in providing students with learning opportunities, work opportunities, and potential career opportunities in the future.

In addition to the high school school-work cooperative programs, youth apprenticeship programs, and job shadowing experiences, this past January our district began piloting an Adopt-a-Classroom program for grades K-8. The program links businesses with a particular classroom or grade level at one of the elementary or middle schools. The businesses are matched up with a grade level based on how the business would connect with the curriculum at that grade level. The businesses could choose to provide speakers to talk about their business or industry, provide resource materials about their business or industry, offer tours, implement Junior Achievement, provide job shadowing, work with students on special class projects, etc. All of the activities of the business would be directly related to the curriculum.

This semester, we had three businesses volunteer to pilot our Adopt-a-Classroom program. Tri-City is matched with a 5th grade Meadowview classroom. The students and the

staff of Tri-City are doing a checkbook project that integrates with the math curriculum. The activities also link with the school's character education program.

WE energies adopted all three of the 5th grade class-rooms at Carollton to enrich the motion and design unit in the fifth grade science curriculum. Six visits and a field trip were arranged, including a solar car race held on April 7th. WE energies provided all of the solar car kits and helped students learn about how these cars are powered. To follow up on the car race, WE energies plans to plot the results of the race with the kids and then sponsor a trip to Barron, Wisconsin, to wrap out the whole unit by visiting the Wind Turbines.

M&I was paired with an 8th grade classroom and is enhancing a stock market project in the eighth grade curriculum. Students did an inventory of all the products and consumables they use in one day and looked up these products in the stock market. M&I employees helped students see the importance and influence they have in the economy. The M&I employees will presented information on what credit reports are, how they are used, etc.

A kick-off for the 2004-05 Adopt-a-Classroom program will be held in October. Information regarding the program will be sent out soon in August and September. If you would like more information now about the program, please call 414-768-6173.

FINE PRINT: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

WHO'S THE TEACHER?

The Recreation Department assigns the most qualified leaders available to all program activities. Your feedback regarding instructors/leaders is always welcome.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the needs of the program, such as leadership, equipment and supplies, etc.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Any family unable to pay all or part of the fees or charges may contact the office. Arrangements will be made for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Anytime a team or individual requests a transfer, and the Department can accommodate the transfer, a \$3 service charge will be payable to the Department.

There is no charge for transfers initiated by Department Instructors or for those accompanied by proof of the child passing/failing the previous class.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested by an individual.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

Overpayments must be picked up in the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Office within 2 weeks of notification to avoid forfeiture (under \$5) or a \$3 check processing fee (over \$5).

IS THERE CLASS TODAY?

It is sometimes necessary to cancel an activity due to school-related functions, weather, etc. Participants will be notified of cancellations as soon as we are aware of them.

Every attempt will be made to reschedule a cancelled activity. However, if a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to provide the best and safest environment for programs, we do not allow persons other than registered participants in the classroom or pool during instruction.

Our instructors have found that parents and/or other children can cause distractions and interruptions in instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

Open House:

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

HAVE A COMPLAINT?

If, after you begin a class it does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

DO YOU HAVE INSURANCE?

The Department does not provide hospital/medical insurance coverage for program participants. Further, the School District does not provide hospital/medical coverage for Department sponsored activities on school property. Participants are encouraged to obtain their own insurance coverage prior to and for the duration of the activity they take part in from their own insurance agent.

WEST MIDDLE SCHOOL:

AMIA RESIDENT?

A non-resident fee is set for most activities. The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is **not** within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. All individuals or groups registering in classes or activities must show proof of City residency such as a current State of Wisconsin driver's license, a current utility bill, etc. If proof of residency cannot be validated, the non-resident fee standards will be applied.

PROOF OF DATE OF BIRTH

Effective March 15, 2004, proof of date of birth is required for *all* children participating in Parks & Recreation activities.



- Any child who does not attend the Oak Creek-Franklin public schools is required to show proof of their date of birth. Some examples include, but are not limited to:
 - * birth certificate

- If the child's name does not match the parent who is presenting proof of residency, proof of residency will be required for the child. Some examples include, but are not limited to:
 - *medical records
- * mail addressed to the child
- * report card
- * daycare/preschool form
- * tax forms
- * custody papers
- *church records
- * mail with "To the Parent/Guardian of
