Grass Clippings & Water Quality

Owners of property near a creek, lake, detention pond, or other waterway have a unique landscaping opportunity and challenge. Organic matter from your yard can wash directly into the adjacent waterway, degrading the water quality. As part of the City's efforts to comply with the State and Federal regulations, the City is taking steps to improve the water quality of the water courses throughout the City.

The City has been conducting State required inspections of various storm water facilities. It has been noted that in some locations, grass clippings have been dumped at the edge of the waterway, or into the ditch flow line. This is detrimental to the water quality

because as the grass break downs it adds nitrogen and other nutrients to the water which contribute to odors and algae growth.

A better alternative is to use a mulching mower which eliminates the need to collect and dispose of

the larger clippings from a conventional mower. Mowing so that you remove less than one-third of the blade length will help keep the clippings to a size that will quickly dry and filter down to the soil surface for decomposition. Because the smaller grass clippings are spread throughout the lawn and interspersed with the upright grass blades, they are less likely to wash into the waterway even during a heavy rain.

If you choose to collect the clippings during times of heavy grass growth, you can use them to mulch the garden or planting beds. They will add valuable nutrients to your garden soil and help modulate soil and root temperature. Just be careful not to use herbicide treated grass for garden mulch, since the residual herbicide on the clippings may harm your garden plants or contaminate edible plants.

Mulching grass clippings can save time and money by reducing the need for chemical fertilizer and week killers. Reducing the application of chemical fertilizers and weed killers can further help the water quality of the rivers and lakes around us. Additional information on managing yard waste and reducing yard chemical use is available on-line at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs, or from the Engineering Department.

Some residents may choose to use a free standing compost bin to contain and compost the clippings rather than mulch them directly onto the lawn or garden. The City has certain requirements for composting bins, including a maximum volume of 125 cubic feet, and a maximum height of 42 inches. All compost bins must be maintained to prevent odors and prevent the attraction of rodents and pests. It is prohibited to compost lake weeds, cooked food scraps of any type, meat, dairy products, manure, or items that will impede the composting process. Compost bins must be located in the rear yard and at least three feet from the property lines, buildings, or dwellings.

Many waterfront property owners landscape with a traditional lawn right up to the water's edge. A vegetated buffer zone can provide benefits not found with a regular lawn, such as less mowing and maintenance, as well as habitat and water quality benefits. A vegetated buffer zone can be incorporated into the landscaping using a number of simple and straightforward measures, many of which actually reduce time and effort needed to maintain the area.

- Native plants can provide food and habitat to attract song birds and butterflies to your yard. Information on native shoreland plant species is available from the UW-Extension at www.clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs.
- A buffer zone can be incorporated simply by establish ing a "no-mow" zone along the water's edge. Turf grasses will grow 12-24 inches tall before going to seed
- For creating or maintaining a view of the water, consid er selective removal of branches, trees, shrubs and ground cover to create clear areas while maintaining vegetation in other areas.
- Please note that City ordinance requires natural lawns to be maintained at a height of 12 inches or less, and certain areas, such as platted subdivisions with build ings on 50% or more of the lots, are required to main tain the grass at six inches or less. Additionally, noxious weeds such as ragweed are excluded from the definition of natural lawn. If you have a question, please check with the City Inspection department to determine specific requirements for your property prior to establishing a vegetated buffer area.

Fertilizer, Pesticides, and Storm Water

Storm water runoff is the water that runs off our lawns, streets, rooftops, and open space. As the water runs over these surfaces, it picks up excess fertilizer, pesticides, sand and soil, oil, anti-freeze, litter, sediment, and many other things that pollute our lakes and streams.

Storm water in Oak Creek does not go to the wastewater treatment plant. It runs through the storm water collection system directly to the streams and lakes, without treatment by the wastewater treatment plant. It does not seem that extra fertilizer from a single lawn, or oil leaking from one car would pollute the water. However, when you add up the small amounts of pollution that come from individual sources, the total pollution can be substantial.

Many people apply fertilizer in spring for a quick "green-up" and lush lawn for summer. Nitrogen and phosphorus, the nutrients in fertilizer, can help make your lawn green and lush. But when these same nutrients get washed into the streams and lakes, they make the algae and weeds grow faster and thicker. The water can become cloudy, green and choked with weeds. This is bad for the fish and the overall health of the water, not to mention being simply unattractive for swimming, boating, fishing or viewing.

Many people also apply weed killers and pesticides in spring. Like fertilizer, weed killers and pesticides can be washed into the streams and lakes, where they can get into the food chain, and harm the fish, birds, and aquatic plants in our environment.

Fortunately, there are many easy things you can do to make a difference.

If you use fertilizer and pesticides on your lawn and garden, use them correctly. A simple soil test can help you to determine how much to apply. Excess fertilizer does not improve the condition of your lawn, and is likely to be washed into the creeks and rivers when it rains, contributing to weed and algae growth. Read and follow label directions such as "do not apply if rain is forecast". This assures that your fertilizer or pesticide will be as effective as possible, rather than being washed away before it can do its job. It will also help to minimize storm water pollution.


Even if you are not located directly on a shoreline,

pollutants in storm water travel through the pipes and ditches, making their way into the creeks and lakes. Applying the correct type and amount of lawn and garden products will minimize their impact on the environment, and may also save you time and money. When planting a new lawn or garden, cover the bare soil with a mulch to encourage growth and prevent erosion, and sweep (don't rinse) soil off paved areas. Never dump oil or other materials into a storm drain. These drains carry water directly to the rivers and lakes.

PET LICENSE INFORMATION

Attention New Residents and New Pet Owners:





City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs and cats over five months of age. License applications are available at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office. Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. You may mail in the certificate along with your application and fee, and it will be returned with your license. The license year commences January 1 and ends December 31.

Beginning April 1, a late fee will be assessed except for: A new resident who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or:

A resident who purchases a dog or cat that reaches five months of age on or after April 1, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

TAKE A "FREE TEST DRIVE-CANADIAN

Save up to 60% on certain brand drugs from Canada (approved by Health Canada and dispensed by a licensed pharmacy in Canada) using the same safe and effective program that the City of Oak Creek has adopted for their employees. Shipments arrive at your residence within 5-7 business days and are delivered by the United States Postal Service.

You can order a 90 day supply, with 3 refills annually. As a safety precaution, you must have taken theses medications for at least 90 days previously.

In addition you may sign up for a United States retail and mail order drug card that will enable you to enjoy up to 40% savings on medications using the discount card at more than 54,000 pharmacies across the U.S. Please call 1-800-495-0872 to find a pharmacy near you.

TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

According to the Municipal Code, all persons going door-todoor soliciting must be licensed by the City of Oak Creek and must wear a photo ID badge. Non-profit and charitable organizations are not required to be licensed, but must be registered at the Police Department. If you are aware of someone soliciting without proper identification, please contact the Police Department at 762-8200.

ATTN: NEW CONDOMINIUM & NEW SUBDIVISION HOMEOWNERS

2005 Real estate property tax bills are based on what improvements are on the property as of January 1st. If the parcel or condominium unit did not exist as of January 1, 2005, it will not receive a tax bill for 2005. On January 1st this property may have been land only and/or part of one large parcel. Please contact your builder/developer, check your sales contract to review your closing statement or contact your attorney to verify if you will be responsible for property taxes, if any, for the current tax year. If you have any questions regarding how tax payments are handled, please feel free to contact the treasurer's office (414) 768-6501. We are available Monday Friday, from 8 AM to 5 PM.

Address Changes:

If the parcel or condominium unit did exist as of January 1, 2005, and you moved into the newly constructed home or condominium in 2005, please contact our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506 to verify current ownership and address information.

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) Effect of Failure to Receive. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

WEED ORDINANCE-Take Notice that:

(a) In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s. 6.96(1), Wisconsin Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chickory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, Burdock.

(b) Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six (6) inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).

The City Weed Commissioner may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.98(1) Wis. Stats.

(c) The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.

CONCERNED PARENTS PROGRAM

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents may leave a key with the Police Department and give permission for officers to gain entry to their home during their absence, in the event that there is a party or other illegal activity on the premises. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent. To register for this program, stop at the Oak Creek Police Department during business hours and sign a consent form. Make sure to bring an extra key.

NEW BRANCH PICK UP POLICY

The City will collect and process brush and tree trimmings placed at the curb five times per year:

- once beginning April 1st
- once beginning May 1st
- once beginning June 1st
- once beginning August 1st
- once beginning October 1st

To ensure that your brush and tree trimmings are picked up, they must be placed at the curb and stacked in an orderly manner, with the cut ends facing the road. This must be done PRIOR to the first of each of the designated collection months.

During the first week of the month, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the City will remove the materials and process them, resulting in chips and/or mulch being made available to the residents for a minimal fee (\$10). In addition, following periods of severe weather that has caused downed limbs and trees and, as directed by the Street Department Superintendent, the City will collect brush and trees resulting from the storm.

The City of Oak Creek will not pick up brush, tree trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of a contractor performing work at a resident's property. The City of Oak Creek will not pick up brush, tree trimmings, and/or stumps as a result of lot clearing.

SPRING CLEAN-UP: MAY 16, 2005

The Street Department will conduct a Spring clean up starting on May 16. Items that will be picked up are as follows:

- Yard Waste; excluding leaves and grass
- Furniture
- Wood
- Appliances
- Construction Materials; not resulting from a contractor
- Metal
- Mattresses
- Televisions
- Carpeting/Rugs

Items that **will not** be picked up are as follows

- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside prior to May 16th in order to be guaranteed a pick up.

SPECIAL PICK UPS

In addition to the spring and fall clean-up, the City of Oak Creek will provide a special pick-up for residents at a price of \$15.00 for the following items:

Appliances ** **Furniture**

Mattresses Carpeting/Padding

Televisions Metals of any kind

** Freon Appliances (air conditioners, refrigerators and dehumidifiers) require an additional \$15.00 fee.

Special pick ups are done on Friday mornings. Residents who request a special pick up, must pay their fees by Thursday Noon

BLOCK PARTIES

You will need to stop by the City Clerk's office approximately two weeks (or more) in advance to fill out an application, along with a map detailing where the party is to be held. The Police, Fire and Street Departments, along with the Alderperson of your district, require approval. No fee is required.

If barricades will be needed to block off a portion of the street, you will be responsible for pickup and delivery from the Street Division, 800 W. Puetz Rd., 570-5682, before 3:00 p.m. on Fridays.

2004 REAL ESTATE PROPERTY TAX FINAL **INSTALLMENT DUE MAY 31, 2005**

IMPORTANT INFORMATION for the final payment of 2004 property tax bills-

MAKING A PAYMENT

Check(s) should be payable to Treasurer, or City of Oak Creek.

BY MAIL, please mail to: Treasurer, City of Oak Creek, 8640 S. Howell Ave., Oak Creek, WI 53154. Please remember to enclose your tax bill or a copy of your tax bill. We will return it with your receipt.

- *The payment is timely if:
- it is mailed in a properly addressed envelope,
- · postmarked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment,
- · with postage prepaid, and
- is received by the proper official not more than 5 days after the prescribed date for making the payment.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. NO CASH PLEASE!

IN PERSON AT CITY HALL, 8640 S Howell Avenue. Normal business hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday thru Friday. Oak Creek City Hall will be closed on Monday, May 30, 2005 for Memorial Day.

Before stepping into the payment line please:

- have all checks completed in advance and;
- bring your tax bill(s) with you to the Treasurer's Office or have your parcel number(s) available.
- Otherwise, we will take care of the next person in line while you prepare your payment. If needed, a computer with an instruction sheet will be available for you to look up your parcel number(s).

RECEIPTS

To receive a receipt for a payment made via US mail or depository, you must include your original tax bill, a copy of your tax bill or a self-addressed envelope with your payment.

OVERPAYMENTS

- For overpayments at City Hall, cash refunds will be given up to \$200. No cash refunds will be given on personal
- Any overpayments over \$200, a check will be mailed three to four weeks from payment date.
- · All refunds by check will be made payable to the Payer, even if your mortgage company makes a payment from your escrow account after you have made payment in full.

PAYMENT DEADLINE

THIRD INSTALLMENT - 25% of net real estate tax due on or before May 31, 2005

Please note the due date on your calendar as we do not send reminder notices.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information –

(6) Effect of Failure to Receive. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

Any payment not made on or before its due date will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance. Payments are considered delinquent if received in person, or *post-marked, after the due date. The *postmark governs the date of payment - NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period. All delinquent tax will accumulate interest and penalty charges from February 1st at 1½ percent per month on the unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. Delinquent notices for 2004 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2005.

Payment of 2004 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2005. After July 31, 2005, all unpaid 2004 Real Estate Property Tax will be turned over to the Milwaukee County Treasurer's Office for collection. You will receive a notice from Milwaukee County as to your payment options.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

2004: The 2004 Lottery and Gaming Credit is \$79.04. If you did not receive the 2004 Lottery and Gaming Credit and are eligible for the credit, please complete a 2004 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application which is available on our website at www.oakcreekwi.org. From the home page click on City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. Lottery Credit applications are also available at the City of Oak Creek Treasurer's Office. In order to receive the credit, you must return the completed application to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) no later than October 1, 2005.

2005: If you do not qualify for the 2004 Lottery and Gaming Credit, but you qualify for 2005, the application for the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit is also available online and at the Treasurer's Office. Please return the completed application to the City of Oak Creek Treasurer's Office at 8640 S. Howell Avenue. If we receive the application by November 15, 2005 the credit will appear on your 2005 Real Estate Tax Bill. For those applications received by the Treasurer's Office between November 15, 2005 and January 31, 2006, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The amount of the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit will be determined in December 2005.

There is a \$.25 charge for additional copies of tax bills. Beginning with 2003, tax information is available on the Oak Creek website www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). You may search by parcel number, name, or address. If you do not have internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). Additional Treasurer's information may be found on the City's website by clicking the applicable link found under City Departments and then Treasurer's Office.

The City of Oak Creek has an Ordinance pertaining to any alarm systems installed in homes or businesses that are connected either to the Police or Fire Department or a commercial alarm company. WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

• With the warm weather comes more activities outside. There are more car windows down and gatherings at residences. Please be courteous of your neighbors with regard to loud noise and music levels. The Oak Creek Police Department responds to

complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for loud noise/music (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

- Rummage sale, garage sale, advertising or other such signs cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-of-ways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as hot as 1,200 degrees and can cause serious injury to young hands and eyes.

SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:

- Residents can request a "vacation watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will conduct periodic checks of your home while you are gone.
- Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away. Arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period of time.
- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. Etch personal identification codes on your valuables with an engraving tool. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.
- Be a good neighbor. Get to know your neighbors and watch out for each other. If you notice anything suspicious, call 9-l-l immediately and report it to the police.

Fire Department

SEVERE WEATHER

Tornadoes produce winds that can exceed 250 mph and are most often accompanied by severe thunderstorms. Unfortunately, we are unable to determine exactly where a tornado will strike, when it will touch down, or exactly how much damage it will cause. However, meteorologists have the ability to identify weather patterns that are likely to create tornadoes and severe thunderstorms. When it is apparent that weather conditions are appropriate for severe storms, the National Weather Service will alert you of the approaching, dangerous weather.

The system that the City of Oak Creek uses to advise citizens of severe weather is a group of emergency warning sirens. These sirens are activated in the event of a tornado warning. The emergency warning sirens are designed to alert people (who are *outdoors*) of potential tornado activity.

We must stress that the *emergency warning sirens are only designed to notify people who are outdoors*. Citizens who are inside during severe weather may not be able to hear the sirens and must rely on other means of notification. During severe weather, weather radios are the most effective way to be alerted to tornado and thunderstorm watches and warnings. When purchasing a weather radio, make sure the radio has a battery back-up.

In the event of a severe thunderstorm watch or warning, get out of water, stay away from trees and seek shelter (indoors if possible). During a tornado watch, prepare to take shelter in the basement under a solid object, or in the middle of your house away from any windows (if a basement is not available). Do not stay in a mobile home or a motor home during a tornado.



Prepare for severe weather before it happens. Help your family understand the importance of recognizing bad weather. And put together a survival kit that you can take into your shelter (i.e. non-perishable food, water, first aid supplies, flashlight, cell phone, and blanket). By taking these steps today, you may be able to minimize the confusion that is experienced by most people during severe weather.

Designations for Severe Weather

Severe Thunderstorm Watch- indicates the possibility of strong thunderstorms later in the day or night, with wind gusts up to 58 mph and/ or hail with a diameter of ¾ inch or greater.

Severe Thunderstorm Warning- indicates that a severe thunderstorm has formed and is moving toward or across the county. (Tornadoes can be formed by severe thunderstorms).

Tornado Watch- indicates the possibility of severe thunderstorms later in the day or night that may include tornadoes.

Tornado Warning- indicates that a tornado has formed and is moving toward or across the county.

TRAMPOLINE RECALL:

Due to the popularity of back yard trampolines, the Oak Creek Fire Department would like to pass along a product recall that may affect your



recreational activities this summer. In cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), Jumpking Inc.(r) of Mesquite, Texas, is voluntarily recalling about 1 million trampolines and about 296,000 "FunRing" enclosures. The trampoline and enclosures may be sold separately or as a package.

Welds on the frame of these trampolines can break during use, resulting in falls and possible injuries. Additionally, the mounting brackets of the FunRing enclosures have sharp edges, which can cause lacerations.

Jumpking has received 47 reports of one or more welds breaking on these trampolines. This resulted in 21 reports of a variety of injuries, including a concussion; head, neck and back injuries; a broken arm; sprains; lacerations; and bruises. The firm also received 12 reports of other incidents, including nine reports of serious lacerations, when children came into contact with the sharp edges of the enclosure brackets.

If you, or someone you know, own a Jumpking trampoline and/or Fun Ring enclosure, stop using the trampoline and/or the enclosure, and contact Jumpking to receive free repair kits.

Trampoline Injuries

In 2002, the National SAFE KIDS Campaign stated that nearly 74,600 children (ages 14 & under) were treated in hospital emergency rooms for trampoline-related injuries. The majority of trampoline injuries are the result of colliding with other jumpers, falling from or onto the trampoline, or doing stunts. More than 90 percent of trampoline-related injuries occur at home, and the injuries predominantly involve the extremities.

Encourage Safe Play & Follow These Basic Precautions:

- 1. Ensure that your trampoline is properly assembled in a level area with at least 10 unobstructed feet (3 meters) on all sides and a minimum of 20 unobstructed feet (6 meters) above the trampoline bouncing surface. The area directly below the bouncing surface must be kept clear at all times.
- 2. Perform the 'Stop Bounce' after every skill or sequence of skills, or whenever you deviate from the center of the trampoline.
- 3. Never jump off a trampoline, always climb off.
- 4. Keep your bouncing low and under control. Consistently land in the center of the trampoline.
- 5. Allow only one person on the trampoline at a time.

- 6. Do not leave children unsupervised on the trampoline.
- 7. Avoid bouncing for long periods of time and do not bounce when you are tired.
- 8. Do not use your backyard trampoline when under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- 9. Ensure spotters are always stationed around the trampoline.
- 10. Do not attempt back flips (back somersaults), multiple somersaults or twisting somersaults on your backyard trampoline.

The best injury is the one avoided. Have fun and stay safe. DISCOVER OAK CREEK'S NATURAL AREAS

When I moved to the Milwaukee area from the north woods over 20 years ago, I was struck by the great quality natural areas in the Milwaukee County Park system. In general, the southeast region of the state has a great deal to offer those seeking solitude in natural areas at a reasonable distance from the city. In Oak Creek, one need not venture outside of the City to experience some lovely forests!

In recent years, City Forestry staff has monitored for gypsy moth in just about every sizeable woodland in Oak Creek. We notice that the neighborhood woodlands are frequented, whether publicly or privately owned. However, we rarely notice the Milwaukee County natural areas being used. So naturally we wondered if the citizens of Oak Creek were aware of these jewels among us.

Four Great County Woodlands in Oak Creek

Bender Park can be accessed at the east end of Old Ryan Road and South 5th Avenue. This park has an excellent woodland with some great trees like American beech and naturally occurring white birch. Bender Park is home to many plants and animals worth viewing, including bluestem goldenrod, a Wisconsin endangered forest plant that does not resemble the full-sun goldenrods found along roadsides and in fields (for a picture and description see this website:

http://www.dnr.state.wi.us/org/land/er/factsheets/plants/blugold.htm). Bender Park woodland trails are a little rough going but it is worth it to stand atop a bluff and view the lake through the trees.

Patrick Cudahy Nature Preserve is located on East College Avenue just blocks east of Howell Avenue. This natural area is my favorite place in Oak Creek because within this woodland can be found many lovely, large red oak trees, musclewood and witchhazel (small interesting trees), among many worthy native plants. Trails are rough or non-existent, including a stream to cross midway. I suspect the spring flora to be exceptional in places and have found unusual plants along the stream in late summer.

<u>Falk Park</u> is located on West Rawson Avenue just west of the I-94 Rawson Exit. Falk Park has an extensive trail system and is the easiest hike among the County natural areas of Oak Creek. In recent years, the County has put up some interpretive signs and one can walk though various woodland stages from old field, to young developing woodland, to mature forest. Here too, many exceptional native trees and spring flowers can be found.

Root River Parkway is located down along the county line, shared by Milwaukee and Racine Counties. In this site, the going is rough and much of the area is wet. Paths are not constructed but exist from common usage. A good time to avoid this site would be after the mosquitoes have arrived for the year! But spring flora includes some rare, wet, riverside plants that you may not have seen before.

Woodland Ps and Qs

Woodlands can be enjoyed for something different in every season. A woodland stroll is a great way to relax, take in some personal or family time and slowly digest the beauty of your surroundings. In spring, the woodland wildflower display is enchanting. All of the places highlighted above have charming wildflowers in late April to early May. These early blooms are called spring *ephemerals* for their fleeting seasonal moment. Picking or digging woodland wildflowers is not permitted because a good number of these plants are rare. These special woodland remnants are disappearing from urban areas so please be thoughtful when visiting.

Each of the sites described above is a high quality woodland – a self-maintaining ecosystem. In other words, the woodlands need no help from us other than perhaps some invasive species removal. Often people remove deadwood from these types of sites thinking they are "cleaning" and helping the woods along. In actuality, woodlands utilize their deadwood like an urban yard utilizes mulch: to recycle nutrients back to the natural system. Deadwood must remain part of the system in order for forests to continue to function and reproduce in a healthy fashion. Healthy forests can support plant and animal wildlife in a sometimes delicate inter-dependent relationship.

I hope this article gets you out there appreciating some of the beauty around Oak Creek! As always, the City Forester is happy to provide information or materials as requested.

RESERVATIONS/PERMITS

The following may be reserved by Oak Creek residents. **Proof of residency is required**. Any non-reserved facility (except Henry Miller Pavilion) may be used on a first-come, first-served basis without a permit. The permit holder receives priority for the rented facility.

\$3 for one hour. Use of courts and fields without a permit is on a first-come, first-serve basis. Rental does not include equipment, supplies, etc. Call for league, tournament and special event rates.



Health Department Reviewed by the State

The Oak Creek Health Department was reviewed on March 4, 2005, by the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services. The DHFS examined information provided relating to:

- The Board of Health
- Staffing of the health department
- · Community involvement
- · Available resources for public health
- The health department's role in identifying, investigating, controlling and preventing health problems and environmental health hazards in the community

State law requires this review every 5 years.

Mosquito Control

- Mosquitoes can be quite pesky! Follow some simple mosquito control techniques.
- Use a mosquito repellent with DEET do not apply directly to the face.
- Wear long pants and shirts with long sleeves.
- Mosquitoes are more "active during the dusk; schedule your activities inside during those times.
- Mosquitoes lay their eggs on/in water. Make sure you do
 not have "standing" water in your yard. Watch for crevices
 in planters or tire swings. If you have a pond or drainage
 ditch inspect it regularly for signs of eggs. Change water in
 wading pools every 3-4 days.

Some mosquitoes transmit diseases such as West Nile Virus. The City will be applying larvacide to sewer catch basins that contain mosquito larvae. Contact the Health Department at 768-6525 if you have any concerns.

Are You Prepared for "Summer HEAT"?

Please listen to the news for heat alerts this summer. Extreme heat can be deadly, especially in the elderly or infants, those with chronic heart/lung/metabolic diseases, those taking medications for mental illness, and individuals whose activity or environment place them at increased risk of heat injury (construction workers, athletes, etc.).

Try to avoid heat related illness/death. If at all possible--

- Stay in a "cool" area from 10 AM to 2 PM when the sun's rays are the strongest
- Always apply sunscreen before going out
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing
- Drink plenty of fluids, but avoid alcohol and caffeine
- Take cool showers or baths
- Use fans to circulate air in your home
- Use air conditioning if possible
- Go to a "cooling" center such as a shopping mall, store, library, or other such facility
- Contact your Health Department at 768-6525 with any heat-related concerns

DOGS IN PARKS

In order to provide an opportunity for City residents to walk and exercise their dogs, the Common Council presently allows dogs in City parks. To prevent conflicts between dogs and other park users, we are asking dog owners to comply with the following guidelines:

1. It is unlawful for the dog to be allowed to run loose in the park. Owners must hold their dog on a leash not longer than 10 feet. Dogs must always be under the control of the owner at all times.

2 Dog waste is not only offensive; it can also spread disease and parasites to other dogs & humans. It is unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit waste deposited by the dog to remain on park property. Owners must carry a waste deposit receptacle to immediately remove all waste matter. Owners are asked to deposit said waste matter in the appropriate manner at their home.

- 3. Owners are asked to keep their dogs out of picnic areas, playstructure/swing areas and areas marked, "No Dogs Allowed".
- 4. You must keep your dog's license current and the license tag must be on your dog's collar. Do not allow your dog to trespass on public or private property, run

loose, unleashed or unattended. Prevent your dog from injuring any person, property or other animal. Never allow your dog to bark, growl or threaten another person.

DOG EXERCISE AREA

Milwaukee County would like to develop a 27 acre "Dog Exercise Area" north of Rawson Avenue in the City of Oak Creek where dog owners and their pets can exercise off-leash. The area will be fenced in, have a cut grass area with signage, gravel parking, port-a-lets, doggy bags and waste containers. It is hoped the park will be open in June of this year. FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the

Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

Race **Sex **Color

**Disability **Religion **Marital Status*

Age **Sexual Orientation **National origin/Ancestry **Family status (household composition, including presence of children) **Lawful source of income

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.

DEERFIELD ELEMENTARY TO OPEN **AUGUST 2005**

In April 2003, the residents of the Oak Creek-Franklin Joint School District approved a referendum to build a new elementary school. That school, Deerfield Elementary, located at 3871 E. Bluestem Drive, will be opening its doors to its first group of students on September 1, 2005. Mr. Christopher Gabrhel, who has been principal at Oak Creek's Edgewood Elementary for the past nine years, will be principal at the new school. Mr. Bernard Nikolay, who has been principal at Marshall Elementary School in Marshall, Wisconsin for the past six years, has been hired as the new principal of Edgewood Elementary.

The construction company working on the project, Voss Jorgensen Schueler Co., has been able to keep up an aggressive schedule in order to complete the project by mid-August. Luckily, the weather was cooperative this past winter, which allowed construction to continue on course. The school district and Voss Jorgensen Schueler Co. are optimistic that the school will be ready for parents to register there on August 18.

Deerfield Elementary will house the school district's Early Childhood program as well as the CD program, with rooms specifically designed for the needs of these students.

A Grand Opening for Deerfield Elementary will be held in early September, at which time the community will be invited to tour the new facility. More details regarding the Grand Opening will be published later.

DISTRICT SUMMER SCHOOL EXPANDING, **CHANGING**

This year's summer school has a few changes and some exciting new opportunities for students. One change the school district is implementing this year for the elementary and middle school program is an early start and longer break over the Fourth of July holiday. The first term will begin on Wednesday, June 15, and end on Thursday, June 30. The second term will begin on Wednesday, July 6, and end on **Thursday, July 21.** Classes will run Monday through Friday, and students can attend either terms or both terms.

The elementary summer school program will be held at Carollton Elementary and will run 8:00-11:55 a.m. The middle school summer school program will be held at East Middle School and will run 7:45-11:40 a.m. In addition to this regular summer school program, some enrichment opportunities will be offered in the afternoon through the Community Education These include classes in American Sign Language, Crafty Creations, Technical Design for Theater Productions, and Weights and Conditioning.

DISTRICT DEVELOPING LONG-TERM **MASTER PLAN**

The Oak Creek-Franklin Joint School District has been working with DLR Group in developing a long-term master plan. A citizens' committee and a teacher leadership committee have been studying information compiled by the UW-Madison Applied Population Lab regarding enrollment projections for our schools for the next ten years and information compiled by engineers and architects regarding the current and projected status of our facilities. Using this information, along with studies focusing on future trends in educational programs, the two committees have identified program needs and possible solutions to increased enrollment in the future. The committees have been providing ideas and insights to the school board and district administration.

The purpose of the master plan is to "develop a long range facility plan that supports modern instructional methodologies, proactively manages enrollment growth, responds to programmatic needs and enhances the quality of life in the Oak Creek -Franklin Joint School District." The committees have been asked by the Board of Education to develop a long range facility plan for the school district that, when accepted, provides the school district with a course that responds to the growing needs of our students and community. This is being accomplished through an interactive, consensus-based decision-making process involving staff, school board, administration, and community members. The committees have been addressing the needs of the school district and community, taking into consideration current and projected student enrollments, current and future community enhancements and educational program needs, and the remaining useful life of all district facilities and building systems.

The master plan will address solutions that could be implemented once enrollments hit a target number. When and if the enrollments hit those target numbers that indicate space needs for expanding student populations, then the plan would be phased

The citizens committee will be completing its work on the master plan in mid-June, and the final plan, including the conclusions and recommendations of the committee, will be presented to the Board of Education either at its July 11 or August 8 meeting. The Board would then act on the plan at the following month's meeting (either August 8 or September 12).

The master plan is a pro-active approach that will allow the school district and community to plan ahead for potential growth in the schools and community over the next 3-15 years.

Fine Print: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

WHO'S THE TEACHER?

The Recreation Department assigns the most qualified leaders available to all program activities. Your feedback regarding instructors/leaders is always welcome.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the needs of the program, such as leadership, equipment and supplies, etc.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Any family unable to pay all or part of the fees or charges may contact the office. Arrangements will be made for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Anytime a team or individual requests a transfer, and the Department can accommodate the transfer, a \$3 service charge will be payable to the Department.

There is no charge for transfers initiated by Department Instructors or for those accompanied by proof of the child passing/failing the previous class.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested by an individual.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

Overpayments must be picked up in the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Office within 2 weeks of notification to avoid forfeiture (under \$5) or a \$3 check processing fee (over \$5).

IS THERE CLASS TODAY?

If you have a question concerning the cancellation of a program (inclement weather, school closed, etc.) CALL THE 24-HOUR INFORMATION LINE AT:

It is sometimes necessary to cancel an activity due to school-related functions, weather, etc. Participants will be notified of cancellations as soon as possible.

Cancelled activities will be rescheduled if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

OPEN HOUSE:

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

The Department does not provide hospital/medical insurance coverage for program participants. Nor does the School District provide hospital/medical coverage for Department sponsored activities on school property. Participants are encouraged to obtain their own insurance coverage for the duration of their activity from their own insurance agent.

AM I A RESIDENT?
