WATER FRIENDLY LANDSCAPING



Owners of property near a detention pond, ditch, creek, lake, or other waterway have some unique landscaping opportunities and challenges.

Many property owners landscape with a traditional lawn right up to the water's edge.

However, it may be of more benefit to landscape a vegetated buffer zone along the water's edge, rather than traditional lawn. This can provide benefits not found in a regular lawn, such as less mowing and maintenance, as well as habitat and water quality benefits. A vegetated buffer zone can be incorporated into the landscaping using a number of simple and straightforward measures, many of which actually reduce time and effort needed to maintain the area.

- Native plants can provide food and habitat to attract songbirds and butterflies to your yard. Information on native shoreland plant species is available from the UW-Extension at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs. A buffer zone can be incorporated simply by establishing a "no-mow" zone along the water's edge. Turf grasses will grow 12-24 inches tall before going to seed.
- For creating or maintaining a view of the water, consider selective removal of branches, trees, shrubs and ground cover to create clear areas while maintaining vegetation in other areas.
- Please note that City ordinance requires natural lawns to be maintained at a height of 12 inches or less, and certain areas, such as platted subdivisions with buildings on 50% or more of the lots, are required to maintain the grass at six inches or less. Additionally, noxious weeds such as ragweed are excluded from the definition of natural lawn. If you have a question, please check with the City Inspection department to determine specific requirements for your property prior to establishing a vegetated buffer area.

Additionally, many homeowners prefer to dump grass clippings on the bank of their pond, ditch, waterway, or wetland. Unfortunately, as these clippings break down, they will add nitrogen and other compounds to the water, which contributes to algae growth and odors.

A better alternative is to use a mulching mower which eliminates the need to collect and dispose of the larger clippings from a conventional mower. Mowing so that you remove less than one-third of the blade length will help keep the clippings to a size that will quickly dry and filter down to the soil surface for decomposition. Because the smaller grass clippings are spread throughout the lawn and interspersed with the upright grass blades, they are less likely to wash into the waterway even during a heavy rain.

If you choose to collect the clippings during times of heavy grass growth, you can use them to mulch the garden or planting beds. They will add valuable nutrients to your garden soil and help modulate soil and root temperature. Just be careful not to use herbicide treated grass for garden mulch, since the residual herbicide on the clippings may harm your garden plants or contaminate edible plants.

Mulching grass clippings can save time and money by reducing the need for chemical fertilizer and week killers. Reducing the application of chemical fertilizers and weed killers can further help the water quality of the rivers and lakes around us. Additional information on managing yard waste and reducing yard chemical use is available on-line at http://clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs, or from the Engineering Department.

Some residents may choose to use a free standing compost bin to contain and compost the clippings rather than mulch them directly onto the lawn or garden. The City has certain requirements for composting bins, including a maximum volume of 125 cubic feet, and a maximum height of 42 inches. All compost bins must be maintained to prevent odors and prevent the attraction of rodents and pests. It is prohibited to compost lake weeds, cooked food scraps of any type, meat, dairy products, manure, or items that will impede the composting process. Compost bins must be located in the rear yard and at least three feet from the property lines, buildings, or dwellings.

OAK CREEK WATER AGAIN WINS INTERNATIONAL TASTE COMPETITION

The Oak Creek Water Utility's commercially bottled, purified water again received international distinction by winning a gold medal at the largest water tasting competition in the world. The 16th Annual Berkeley Springs International Water Tasting Contest marks a return to glory for the municipal bottled water packaged under the name Claire Baie. The first gold medal came five years ago in what was then its first contest entry.



"We all take great pride in producing great tasting, clean water," said Steve Yttri, Oak Creek Water Utility general manager. "Oak Creek water customers know the great taste of our water every day, but now so does the rest of the world."

Claire Baie defeated silver medalist Clear Springs Natural, Vanleer, Tenn., and bronze medalist Water Boyz, Santa Fe, N.M. More than 70 waters representing a dozen countries and 22 U.S. states competed for medals in four categories in Berkley Springs, W. Va., February 25.

Claire Baie, translated from its French language origin, means "clear creek." The Oak Creek Water Utility has received six Director's Awards for water quality from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as part of its Partnership for Safe Water. It is the only Wisconsin utility to attain Phase III status from the EPA.

The Partnership for Safe Water is a cooperative effort of six organizations including the EPA and American Water Works Association. Partnership representatives audit a utility's processing capabilities, management and operations. Audit results then are compared to extremely strict standards from which an assessment is prepared and criteria developed for the utility to maintain prior to receiving Phase III status.

"Claire Baie now holds the distinction of receiving awards for water quality, and now two international gold medals for water taste," Yttri said. "The investments we make in providing the cleanest, safest drinking water possible clearly impacts taste and quality."

Fall Elections



The Fall Partisan Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, September 12, 2006, and the Fall General Election will be held Tuesday, November 7, 2006.

Due to the expected large voter turnout at these elections, those residents not currently registered are encouraged to register to vote early. A qualified elector must be at least 18 years of age, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the City for at least 10 days prior to registering to vote. You must present a form of ID showing proof of residence. A Wisconsin driver's license or Wisconsin ID is preferred.

Bicycle License

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind all cyclists to license their bikes. A bicycle license can



be obtained from the Police Department during normal business hours at a nominal \$3.50 fee. The license is non-expiring and will enable the police

to locate the owner of lost or stolen bikes which are retrieved or turned in.



TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

According to the Municipal Code, all persons going door-todoor soliciting must be licensed by the City of Oak Creek and must wear a photo ID badge. Non-profit and charitable organizations are not required to be licensed, but must be registered at the Police Department. If you are aware of someone soliciting without proper identification, please contact the Police Department at 762-8200.

ATTN: NEW CONDOMINIUM & NEW SUBDIVISION HOMEOWNERS

Real estate property tax bills are based on what improvements are on the property as of January 1. If the parcel or condominium unit did not exist as of January 1, 2006, it will not receive a tax bill for 2006. On January 1 this property may have been land only and/or part of one large parcel. Please contact your builder/developer, check your sales contract to review your closing statement or contact your attorney to verify if you will be responsible for property taxes, if any, for the current tax year. If you have any questions regarding how tax payments are handled, please feel free to contact the treasurer's office (414) 768-6501. Open Monday – Friday, from 8 AM to 5 PM.

Address Changes:

If the parcel or condominium unit did exist as of January 1, 2006, and you moved into the newly constructed home or condominium in 2006, please contact our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506 to verify current ownership and address information.

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) Effect of Failure to Receive. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

WEED ORDINANCE-Take Notice that:

(a) In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s. 6.96(1), Wisconsin Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chicory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, and Burdock.

(b) Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a

height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).

The City Weed Commissioner may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.98(1) Wis. Stats.

(c) The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.

PET LICENSE INFORMATION

Attention New Residents and New Pet Owners:




WI State Statutes, Section 174 makes it mandatory for pets to be licensed. The City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs (limit 2) and cats over five months of age. License applications are available at the Oak

Creek Treasurer's Office. Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. You may mail in the certificate along with your application and fee, and it

will be returned with your license. The license year commences January 1 and ends December 31. **Beginning April 1**,

- a late fee will be assessed except for:
- A new resident who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or;



 A resident who owns a dog or cat that is not five months of age on or before March 31, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:

- Residents can request a "vacation watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 (press "0" for Dispatch) and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will conduct periodic checks of your home while you are gone.
- Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away. Arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period of time.
- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. Etch personal identification codes on your valuables with an engraving tool. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.
- Be a good neighbor. Get to know your neighbors and look out for each other. If you notice anything suspicious, call 9-1-1 immediately and report it to the police.

CHILD SAFETY SEAT INSPECTIONS

The Oak Creek Fire Department offers free child safety seat inspections for Oak Creek residents. Safety

seat checks are conducted at Fire Station #3 located at 7000 S. 6^{th} Street by appointment.

Sorry, no walk-ins. Inspections are limited to Oak Creek residents.

MOTORIZED SCOOTERS

Motorized scooters and pocket bikes are a relatively new phenomenon and there is a great deal of confusion where these relatively inexpensive motor vehicles can be legally ridden.

Motorized scooters and pocket bikes are not designed or manufactured for on-highway operation, and because they lack the equipment and certification needed to comply with federal highway safety regulations, they cannot be registered for on-highway operation in Wisconsin.

Since all motor vehicles must be properly registered for operation on any public highway, street or alley, the operator of a motorized scooter or pocket bike can be issued a traffic citation for operating an unregistered motor vehicle. The fine amount can be up to \$200 plus court costs and assessments.

A driver's license is required to operate a motor vehicle on

any highway, street, or alley in Wisconsin. Although a motorized scooter or pocket bike cannot be registered, they are still considered a motor vehicle. An unlicensed person found operating a motorized scooter or pocket bike on a public street, alley or sidewalk can be issued a traffic citation for operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's



license. The fine amount for a first offense can be up to \$200 plus court costs and assessments.

Since sidewalks in Oak Creek are part of the highway rightof-way, the laws regulating operation of motor vehicles apply on sidewalks as well as on the roadway itself. This means it is illegal to operate motorized scooters or pocket bikes on public sidewalks or bike trails.

Where Can Motorized Scooters be Ridden Legally?

Motorized scooters and pocket bikes can be operated with permission on private property, and on private roads and driveways. "Private road or driveway" is every place in private ownership and used for vehicular travel only by the owner and those having express or implied permission from the owner.

Motorized scooters can be ridden in backyards, fields, and other off-road locations on private property, but only with the permission of the property owner.

Can a Parent or Guardian be Held Responsible?

YES! No parent or guardian of any child shall authorize or knowingly permit such child to use or operate a play vehicle on a roadway. Citations can be issued to parents or guardians who allow these violations to occur.

PAYMENT DEADLINE - THIRD INSTALLMENT – 25% of net real estate tax due on or before May 31, 2006. Please mark your calendar as we do not send reminder notices.

Please include the original or a copy of your tax bill(s) with all payments.

For **PERMANENT ADDRESS CHANGES**, please contact our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506. No changes are made by the Treasurer's Office after the tax roll is complete.

CHECKS(s) should be payable to Treasurer, or City of Oak Creek. Checks not properly completed or endorsed may be returned unprocessed and your taxes could become delinquent. Receipts are not valid until the check clears our bank. Any check returned from the bank for non-sufficient funds, account closed, stop payment or expired date is subject to a \$25.00 recovery fee and the applicable payment will be void. We must receive a full replacement payment plus recovery fee, with cash or certified funds, by the original due date to avoid interest and penalty charges.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

BY MAIL, send to: Treasurer, City of Oak Creek, 8640 S. Howell Ave., Oak Creek, WI 53154. (DO NOT mail your payment to the City's temporary P. O. Box shown on the green envelope enclosed with your tax bill. Any payment mailed to this P. O. Box from February 1through November 30 will be returned to sender unprocessed and your taxes could become delinquent.)

A PAYMENT BY MAIL IS TIMELY IF ALL of the following criteria is met:

- * it is mailed in a properly addressed envelope,
- *postmarked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment,
- * with postage prepaid, and
- * is received by the proper official not more than 5 days after the prescribed date for making the payment.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. NO CASH PLEASE! Third installment payments must be received no later than midnight, May 31, 2006.

IN PERSON AT CITY HALL, 8640 S. Howell Avenue. Normal business hours are Monday thru Friday, 8 am to 5 pm. Oak Creek City Hall will be closed for Memorial Day on Monday, May 29, 2006.

OVERPAYMENTS made at City Hall, cash refunds from Escrow Checks will be given <u>up to \$20</u>. For other overpayments, a refund check will be mailed three to four weeks from the payment date and will be made payable to the Payer, even if your mortgage company makes a payment after you have made payment in full.

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information – (6) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO RECEIVE. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX - Any payment not received

in person, in the drop box, or *post-marked on or before its due date will result in delinquency of the entire unpaid principal balance. All DELINQUENT TAX accumulates INTEREST AND PENALTY charges from February 1 at 1½ percent per month on the unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. The *post-mark governs the date of payment – NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period.

Delinquent notices for 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2006. Payments for 2005 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2006, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection. You will receive a notice from Milwaukee County as to your payment options.

Payment of PRIOR YEAR(S) DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX must be made to MILWAUKEE COUNTY. Please contact the Milwaukee County Treasurer's Office at (414) 278-4033 for more details.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT - Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

2005: The 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit is \$73.94. If you did not receive the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit and are eligible, please complete a 2005 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application. In order to receive the credit, you must return the completed application to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) no later than October 1, 2006.

2006: If you were not eligible for the 2005 Lottery and Gaming Credit, or if you applied for the 2005 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit, and you qualify for the credit in 2006, please complete the application for the 2006 Lottery and Gaming Credit and return it to the City of Oak Creek Treasurer's Office at 8640 S. Howell Avenue. If we receive the application by November 15, 2006 the credit will appear on your 2006 Real Estate Tax Bill. For those applications received by the Treasurer's Office between November 15, 2006 and January 31, 2007, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The amount of the 2006 Lottery and Gaming Credit will be determined in December 2006.

Lottery and Gaming Credit applications are available on our website at www.oakcreekwi.org, click on City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. They are also available at the City of Oak Creek Treasurer's Office.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION/CHANGES-There is a \$.25 charge for additional copies of tax bills. Beginning with 2003, tax information is available on the Oak Creek website – http://www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search). You may search by parcel number, name, or address. Internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). Additional Treasurer's information may be found in the brochure included with your tax bill and on the City website by clicking the applicable link found under City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. BOOSTER SEATS

Effective June 1, 2006, the newest **Child Safety Restraints, Booster Seats, and Safety Belt Requirements** (2005 Wisconsin Act 106) will be in effect. The tiered structure is as follows:

1. A child **who is less than one year old or who weighs less than 20 pounds** must be "properly restrained" in a rear-facing

than 20 pounds must be "properly restrained" in a rear-facine child safety seat in the back of the vehicle if the vehicle is equipped with a back seat.

- 2. A child who is at least one year old and weighs at least 20 pounds but is less than four years old or weighs less than 40 pounds must be properly restrained in a forward-facing child safety seat in the back seat of the vehicle if the vehicle is equipped with a back seat.
- 3. A child who is at least four years old but less than eight years old, weighs at least 40 but not more than 80 pounds, and is no more than 57 inches tall must be properly restrained in a "child booster seat".
- 4. A child who is under the age of eight and exceeds the weight or height limits specified in item 3, above, must be properly restrained by a seat belt.

Children who are required to be in either a rear-facing or frontfacing child safety seat are also required to be positioned at a designated seating position in the back passenger seat if the vehicle is equipped with a back passenger seat.

WATER QUALITY AT GREAT LAKES BEACHES

Going to the beach is one of the most popular summer activities



along Wisconsin's Great Lakes coastline.

Whether you're there to relax or swim, water quality can have an impact on your experience at the beach. Pollution in beach water is often much higher during and immediately after

rainstorms because water may drain into the beach. Rainwater flows to beaches after running off lawns, farms, streets, construction sites, and other developed areas, picking up animal waste, fertilizer, pesticides, trash, and many other pollutants. Many of these pollutants can end up in the water at our beaches.

LOOK FOR THESE SIGNS AT GREAT LAKES PUBLIC BEACHES



The GREEN or "good" sign indicates that water quality is acceptable for swimming. (Note that some local health departments do not use the green sign, and use only the yellow and red signs.)

The **YELLOW** or "caution" sign indicates an increased risk of illness for visitors who come in contact with the water.





The **RED** or "closed" sign indicates a more serious health risk to people who come in contact with the water. When the "closed" sign is posted visitors are advised to keep out of the water.

What you can do to help:

Dispose of litter in containers, especially diapers and pet waste

Do not feed gulls and waterfowl

Don't enter water if you are ill

Change diapers before allowing children in water

Do not dump anything in storm drains

Avoid using excess fertilizers on your yard

How you can reduce your risk of infection:

Don't swallow lake water

Shower after swimming

Wash hands before eating

TICK AND INSECT REPELLENTS



Products containing up to about 30% DEET are considered safe for use in routine control of ticks and mosquitoes in adults and children over two months of age. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, products containing about 15% DEET are generally sufficient to protect children in situations

where concern about the spread of vector-borne disease is not particularly high. The U.S. EPA recommends that great caution be used in using DEET on children and states that products with DEET concentrations of 10% or lower are effective for children and may be preferred for most situations. Some chemical repellents include products used to treat clothing which contain permethrin or permanone. These products should not be used on skin. Because of the number of insect repellents available to the public, consumers should choose products carefully. Generally, products for tick control will contain more DEET than those for mosquito control. In all cases, label instructions should be followed to ensure that a product is necessary and sufficient for your needs. Apply repellent sparingly, and only to exposed skin or clothing. One application will last four to eight hours. Whenever possible, wear long sleeves, pants, shoes and socks, and apply repellent to clothing instead of to skin. Do not apply repellents to eyelids, lips or wounded skin. Do not spray repellents in a confined space such as a car or tent. Wash treated skin with soap and water after coming indoors. Wash hands before eating.

Where do Fire Poles come from?


Captain David Kenyon of the Chicago Fire Department invented fire poles in 1878.

The first volunteer Fire Company was formed in Philadelphia, PA in 1736. Benjamin Franklin served as America's First volunteer Fire Chief.

In the early days of the fire service, fire trucks were horse drawn. In those days nearly every firehouse had a resident Dalmatian. The job of the Dalmatian was to direct the horses, keep the horses company and guard the firehouse. Today we do not keep horses in the fire station, but



Fair Housing

FAIR HOUSING IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- Sex
- Color

- Disability
- ReligionMarital Status
- Age
- Sexual Orientation
- National origin/Ancestry
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)
- Lawful source of income

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination
- Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

The Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination. 

INVASIVE SPECIES

The term *invasive species* refers to plants and animals that aggressively invade or take over natural ecosystems. Often times, invasive species arrive unnoticed until they begin to spread and cause problems. The word *invasive* tells us that these plants and animals are difficult to control. There are hundreds, probably thousands, of different invasive plants and animals. The adverse impacts that invasive species have range from annoyingly aggressive to causing devastating economic hardships.

One example of an invasive animal is the emerald ash borer which established in Michigan in the late 1990 and has since spread to other isolated areas. The emerald ash borer is a serious threat to



the country's ash tree resource because this tiny insect causes tree mortality and is very difficult to control. We have changed our urban forest planning due to this insect. The City has not planted ash trees in our streets or parks in four years. This is one insect you will be hearing a lot more about.

One woody invasive plant that is well established in our area is buckthorn. Buckthorn was an introduced landscape plant that was able to easily naturalize into woodlands because it produces a large amount of fruit that is eaten and dispersed by birds. In the landscape it is an upright plant but when it naturalizes it becomes a leggy, wild-grown shrub to small tree.

To eradicate buckthorn is very difficult because it is so commonly found that it easily re-invades. However, there are hopeful individuals and groups that will work to keep it out of woodlands. Small areas, such as yards, offer the most likely hope for eradication.

Buckthorn removal projects are tedious and often take place in the spring or fall. Most removal efforts involve chemical herbicides. Luckily it is responsive to Roundup-type products that breakdown and do not become a permanent environmental pollutant. Stems can be cut and immediately painted with a 50:50 Round-up: water solution (or stronger).



I am calling attention to buckthorn because we hope with eradications efforts around us that people will stop introducing more.

Unfortunately, it is still available to purchase and plant at some garden

centers and nurseries. Some names it has been sold under are Tall Hedge or High Hedge. The

scientific names to watch for are *Rhamnus cathartica* (common buckthorn) *and Rhamnus frangula* (glossy buckthorn).

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES--

ABENDSCHEIN PARK STREAM BANK RESTORATION PROJECT

The Oak Creek flows through Abendschein Park (1311 E. Drexel

Avenue), crossing Drexel Avenue just west of the railroad tracks. At some time in the past the land on the west side of the streambank was filled in which created a straight channel without a natural levee. As decades passed, por-



tions of the bank have sloughed off leaving washouts – a naturally occurring process – nonetheless, a process that contributes sediment and erosion to the Oak Creek.

Phase I. A few years ago the City stopped mowing approximately 20 feet on either side of a drainage way that connects perpendicularly to the Oak Creek and passes through a concrete dam. Since, some excellent native plants have emerged. Our plan is to burn and weed this stretch to control invasive plants and, expand the native seed source. This phase was the beginning of addressing water quality issues along the Abendschein Park portion of the Oak Creek.

City Forestry has since secured a small grant from Watershed Initiative Network (WIN) for a stream bank restoration project along the stretch of the creek next to the baseball field. Work will involve upper bank excavation, erosion control fabric installation, shrub planting into erosion fabric and, addition of prairie vegetation buffer along both the river and the drainage way, per illustration.

Our work will continue in phases with varying opportunities for volunteers in community service or conservation along the way. If any of the **bolded tasks below** spark your interest as an individual, family or group, please contact us!

Basic project timeline:

<u>February/March:</u> Removal of large trees along bank, leaving roots intact

March to May: Burn accumulated vegetation along drainage way Summer through Fall: Prairie planting preparation: herbicide grass along edges of drainage way, multiple applications as necessary

Summer through Fall: Invasive plant removal along drainage way

<u>Later Summer (when dry):</u> Excavation work on upper bank followed by **installation of erosion control materials, shrub and tree planting**

Autumn: Prairie planting

Ongoing: Natural area development, education & maintenance





ALARM REQUIREMENTS

The City of Oak Creek has an Ordinance pertaining to any alarm systems installed in homes or businesses that are connected either to the Police or Fire Department or a commercial alarm company. The Police Department requires the completion of a Night Call Information/Alarm Application Form which contains information needed by the police should your alarm sound when no one is on the premises. If you have an alarm and have not completed this form, please contact Dispatch Supervisor Rebecca Leigh at the Police Department (766-7687) so that you can supply the information needed.

CRIME ALERT!

The Police Department has seen an increase in the number of nighttime garage burglaries occurring within the City. It appears that the individuals responsible drive around during

the day—observing items through open garage doors—then return at night to commit the burglaries. The method of entry is most often through side garage service doors. Their target is high-end tools and equipment such as power washers, welders,



air compressors, pneumatic tools, etc.

The Police Department highly advises that citizens keep their

garage doors closed when not in use and turn on outside lights during the evening hours. Anyone noticing suspicious persons driving around neighborhoods should contact the Police Department to report their observation, giving as much descriptive information as possible.

WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

- With the warm weather comes more activities outside. There are more car windows down and gatherings at residences. Please be courteous of your neighbors with regard to **loud noise and music** levels. The Oak Creek Police Department responds to complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for loud noise/music (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Rummage sale, garage sale, advertising or other such **signs** cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-of-ways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as hot as 1,200 degrees and can cause serious injury to young hands and eyes.

CONCERNED PARENTS PROGRAM

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents may leave a key with the Police Department and give permission for officers to gain entry to their home during their absence, in the event that there is a party or other illegal activity on the premises. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent.

To register for this program, stop at the Oak Creek Police Department during business hours and sign a consent form. Make sure to bring an extra key.

DOGS IN PARKS

Plan Commission

In order to provide an opportunity for City residents to walk & exercise their dogs, the Common Council presently allows dogs in City parks. To prevent conflicts between dogs & other park users, we are asking dog owners to comply with the following guidelines:

✓ It is unlawful for the dog to be allowed to run loose in the park. Owners must hold their dog on a leash not longer than 10 feet. Dogs must always be under the control of the owner at all times.

✓ Dog waste is not only offensive; it can also spread disease & parasites to other dogs & humans. It is unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit waste deposited by the dog to remain on park property. Owners must carry a waste deposit receptacle to immediately remove all waste matter. Owners are asked to deposit the matter in the appropriate manner at their home.

✓ Owners are asked to keep their dogs out of picnic areas, playstructure/swing areas and areas marked, "No Dogs Allowed".

✓ You must keep your dog's license current & the license tag must be on your dog's collar. Do not allow your dog to trespass on public or private property, run loose, unleashed or unattended. Prevent your dog from injuring any person, property or other animal. Never allow your dog to bark, growl or threaten another person.

EXERCISE AREA-

The "Runway", located at 1300 E. Rawson Ave., is owned & maintained by Milwaukee County. It is a 27 acre parcel where dog owners can exer-

cise their pets off-leash. The area is fenced, has a cut grass area with signage, gravel parking, port-a-lets, doggy bags & waste containers. Current dog license & proof of rabies immunization required!

Rain Gardens-Keeping Rain Where it Falls

KEEPING RAIN WHERE IT FALLS

Rain is natural, and necessary. Keeping rain where it falls, using a beautiful garden, can provide many rewards and benefits compared to letting it run off and away over hard surfaces like driveways and sidewalks. Rain gardens are plantings of attractive, moisture tolerant plants and native wildflowers which help to improve the quality of the storm water runoff from suburban lawns and driveways. They can also be used to soak up water in lawn areas that may be wetter than the rest of the lawn. Rain gardens are not for use in wetlands, or swale lines, but can be very useful in a yard landscaping plan.

Suburban run off, along with any pollution it picks up along the way, goes directly to the streams and lakes. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, storm water runoff from urban and suburban areas is a



leading cause of pollution of our lakes and streams. Excess fertilizer contained in run off contributes to overgrowth of algae, which in turn can lead to odors. The City of Oak

Creek has implemented programs such as street sweeping, catch basin cleaning, and outfall monitoring, to improve the quality of the storm water runoff and the lakes and streams in the area.

Typically, a rain garden should be located near a source of runoff, such as at the end of the sump pump drain, next to a driveway, or at the end of a downspout off the roof. The garden is designed with a shallow depression to allow the water to collect and infiltrate into the soil. The action of the soil particles as well as the nutrient needs of the plants themselves assist in removing many pollutants from the runoff, which minimizes the pollutants that reach our streams and groundwater. Ideally, the soil in the bottom of the rain garden has been prepared to encourage infiltration and storage of water in the soil. The plant roots will take up water from the wet soil during the drier periods.

In some areas of the City, homeowners are required to connect the sump pump drain directly to the storm sewer.

In other areas, the homeowners are required to connect their downspouts, as well as their sump pumps, directly to the storm sewer. A homeowner should not eliminate these connections



to install a rain garden. However, those homes without direct connections might want to consider a rain garden.

A rain garden may be particularly useful in yards where a sump pump discharge tends to keep a certain portion of the lawn more soggy than the rest of the lawn.

A rain garden is not a pond. It is intended to dry out between rainfalls, much like a conventional garden. The rain garden should be planted with species that are more tolerant of wet conditions and also more tolerant of drought than many non-native plants. Some of the most commonly used flowers include Cardinal Flowers, which attract hummingbirds, and Black-eyed Susans, which attract butterflies. Various types of plants in a rain garden can be used to attract hummingbirds and butterflies to your back yard.

The size of the garden will be determined by a number of factors, including the underlying soil type and the size of area draining to the garden. Even a little garden can be helpful in reducing runoff.

The Wisconsin DNR website at http://dnr.wi.gov/org/water/wm/nps/rg/index.htm has a brochure with a do-it-yourself guide for homeowners. This brochure includes numerous guidelines for rain garden design and placement, such as: the rain garden should be at least 10 feet from the house to avoid water seeping into the foundation; the rain garden should be put in a fairly flat area of the yard for ease of installation; a rain garden should not be located directly over a septic system. This site also has a link to a list of plants suitable for a rain garden, complete with pictures.

The soil for a rain garden must be capable of infiltrating water. The website has information on a simple test you can do to determine if the soil in your yard is suitable for a rain garden, and ways to improve the soil in the garden if necessary. The size of a rain garden is influenced by the

size of the area draining to it, as well as the type and depth of soil in the garden. The brochure explains these factors and gives easy to follow guidelines on sizing your rain garden.



This brochure also contains answers to frequently asked questions, including questions regarding mosquitoes and rain gardens.

Copies of these brochures are also available at the public library or at the Engineering Department in City Hall.

Street Department

Items that will not be picked up are as follows

- Paints
 - Tires
- Batteries
- Hazardous Materials
- Grass Clippings Leaves

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside prior to May 15 in order to be guaranteed a pick up.

SUMMER DROP-OFF SITE HOURS

On Tuesdays only, beginning the 1st Tuesday in June and ending the last Tuesday in September, the drop-off site will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. Mondays and Wednesday through Saturday hours will remain the same (8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.).

BLOCK PARTIES

If you are planning to hold a "block party", please be aware that City officials require approval. You will need to stop by the City Clerk's office approximately two weeks (or more) in advance to fill out an application, along with a map detailing where the party is to be held. The Police, Fire and Street Departments, along with the Alderperson of your district, require approval. There is no fee.

If barricades will be needed to block off a portion of the street, you will be responsible for pickup and delivery from the Street Division, 800 W. Puetz Rd., 570-5682, before 3 p.m. on Friday.

Fine Print: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, age requirement will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office to arrange for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Transfers will be made at no charge, upon request, for persons who meet the age/skill level requirements of the class requested provided there is space available at the time of the request.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

OPEN HOUSE

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

MAKEUPS?

Classes missed for individual absences (i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participants attend classes other than the one they are registered for.
