Dear City of Oak Creek Residents,

Winter in Oak Creek is now just a memory. The Street Department did a

fine job of snow removal. They received a rating of A⁺ in a Milwaukee Journal/Sentinel article, and it doesn't surprise me one bit!

The 27th Street Corridor is moving in a very positive direction. Tax Incremental Financing District No. 7 is being created to handle the financial aspects relating to the southern end of the corridor. We have already received information about several businesses that are either expanding or coming in to Oak Creek. Our partnership continues with the City of Franklin to assist us with this development.

The chimney at the WE Energies power plant has been installed and will be a landmark easily seen. The construction work on the generating plant is on schedule.

Milwaukee County was contacted regarding my idea of developing a lakefront park along the entire shoreline of Oak Creek. This would give the public an area of enjoyment of the natural beauty of Lake Michigan. I want to save the entire shoreline for our City. We are now working on a plan of the area west of the shoreline for development with I.R.G. Development Corporation. Remember . . . "Lake Michigan – Everyone's Treasure!"

The 4th of July plans are in full swing. The fireworks display has been promised to be bigger and better than last year. The Celebrations Commission reports that the parade and events at the Legion Grounds will be great fun for all. Make sure you check the City's website <u>www.oakcreekwi.org</u> regarding a change in the parade route. Two additional evenings of music to enjoy have been added to the Music in the Park series this summer. Information regarding the dates and groups scheduled to perform can also found on the City's website.

The elimination of the south end of the Delphi plant has now been completed and construction of the new Woodman's Food Market has begun. Additional businesses will be going in the outlot areas around this development. Information regarding commuter rail (K.R.M.) is being gathered by the City. We are scheduled to have a station on that line and this will be an important growth factor for Oak Creek.

The City has now added a Registered Sanitarian and a Zoning Administrator to ensure that businesses in the City are safe and are in compliance with City ordinances.

"Saturday Morning with the Mayor" is still happening the second Saturday of each month. Great ideas from our residents have been presented and have been helpful. Please continue to share your ideas with me at these meetings.

KEEPING OUR WATER CLEAN

Storm water runoff is the water that runs off our lawns, streets, rooftops, and open space. As the water runs over these surfaces, it picks up excess fertilizer, pesticides, sand and soil, oil, anti-

freeze, litter, sediment, and many other things that pollute our lakes and streams.

Storm water in Oak Creek does not go to any treatment plant. It runs through the storm water collection system directly into the streams and lakes, without treatment by the wastewater treatment plant.

Household waste liquids such as used car oil should never be disposed down the storm drain. Water from a swimming pool must be de-chlorinated prior to emptying the pool. Please keep in mind that draining a pool can create a significant problem for neighbors, and care should always be taken to not negatively affect those around you.

Pet waste is also a source of storm water pollution. Residents with pets should take care to clean up and properly dispose of waste.

Many people apply fertilizer for a quick "green-up" and lush lawn for summer. Nitrogen and phosphorus, the nutrients in fertilizer, can help make your lawn green and lush. But when these same nutrients get washed into the streams and lakes, they make the algae and weeds grow faster and thicker. The water can become cloudy, green and choked with weeds. This is bad for the fish and the overall health of the water, not to mention being simply unattractive for swimming, boating, fishing or viewing.

Many people also apply weed killers and pesticides. Like fertilizer, weed killers and pesticides can be washed into the streams and lakes, where they can get into the food chain, and harm the fish, birds, & aquatic plants in our environment. Fortunately, there are many easy things you can do to make a difference:

• If you use fertilizer and pesticides on your lawn and garden, use them correctly. A simple soil test can help you to determine how much to apply. Excess fertilizer does not improve the condition of your lawn, and is likely to be washed into the creeks and rivers when it rains, contributing to weed and algae growth.

• Read and follow label directions such as "do not apply if rain is forecast". This assures that your fertilizer or pesticide will be as effective as possible, rather than being washed away before it can do its job. It will also help to minimize storm water pollution.

- When planting a new lawn or garden, cover the bare soil with a mulch to encourage growth and prevent erosion, and sweep (don't rinse) soil off paved areas.
- Never dump oil or other materials into a storm drain. These drains carry water directly to the rivers and lakes.
- Clean up pet waste before it gets washed into the storm water runoff.

E. Puetz Road & S. Shepard Avenue Intersection Construction

The City of Oak Creek will be contracting out the reconstruction

of the intersection of E. Puetz Road and S. Shepard Avenue. The project will involve the reconstruction of the intersection and the installation of traffic signals. Also, new sidewalks will be built and utilities will be relocated. South Shepard Avenue will be closed between E. Groveland Drive to E. Stonegate Drive with a posted detour route. E. Puetz Road will be open with one lane of traffic in each direction through the intersection. The anticipated construction start date is June 12 with the roads to be reopened around August 31. The landscaping should be completed by mid September. Please slow down and use caution traveling through the construction zone. We thank you for your patience during the upcoming construction season.

Water & Sewer Utility water & sewer utility achieves several milestones

The Wisconsin Water Association recently recognized the Utility with the Wisconsin Special Achievement Award for its dedication to the American Water Works Association's (AWWA) Partnership for Safe Water Program over the last nine years. Oak Creek remains the only Wisconsin Utility to receive phase III designation through the program.

"Participating in this program over the past nine years assures consumers as well as local, state, and federal officials that we are on the leading edge of providing the safest, cleanest drinking water possible at reasonable rates," said Steven N. Yttri, Utility general manager. "The award symbolizes the contributions of all Utility employees who seek more effective, efficient ways to produce high quality water."

In 2003, the Utility was one of only 16 elite utilities nationwide awarded the "Five-Year Director's Award" from the AWWA for commitment to continuously improving water quality beyond current regulatory requirements through Partnership for Safe Water.

The Partnership is a voluntary cooperative effort between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), AWWA and other drinking water organizations throughout the United States. The Partnership goal is to provide a new measure of safety to millions of Americans by implementing prevention programs where legislation or regulation does not exist. The preventative measures are based on optimizing treatment plant performance to increase protection against microbial contamination in America's drinking water supply.

Commissioner Gass Recognized as Steward of Safe Water

Gary Gass becomes the Utility's fifth commissioner to be awarded the Steward of Safe Water designation from the Wisconsin Water Association. Gass was recognized for his more than 10 years of leadership and service to citizens of Oak Creek. Now, all of the Utility commissioners have more than 10 years of service and are considered Stewards of Safe Water.

Utility Receives 13th Certificate of Excellence for Financial Reporting

For 13 consecutive years, the Utility has received the Government Finance Officers Association highest honor for its comprehensive annual financial report. The Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting is awarded by an impartial national panel. The panel bestows this honor on public entities with accounting and financial reporting that demonstrates a spirit of full disclosure to clearly communicate its financial story in a fashion that motivates readership.

TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

According to the Municipal Code, all persons going door-to-door soliciting must be licensed by the City of Oak Creek and must wear a photo ID badge. Non-profit and charitable organizations are not required to be licensed, but must be registered at the Police Department. If you are aware of someone soliciting without proper identification, please contact the Police Department at 762-8200.

ATTN: NEW CONDOMINIUM & NEW SUBDIVISION HOMEOWNERS

Real estate property tax bills are based on what improvements are on the property as of January 1. If the parcel or condominium unit did not exist as of January 1, 2007, it will not receive a tax bill for 2006. On January 1 this property may have been land only &/or part of one large parcel. Please contact your builder/developer, check your sales contract to review your closing statement or contact your attorney to verify if you will be responsible for property taxes, if any, for the current tax year. If you have any questions regarding how tax payments are handled, please feel free to contact the **Treasurer's Office (414) 768-6501**. Open Monday – Friday, from 8 AM to 5 PM.

Address Changes:

If the parcel or condominium unit did exist as of January 1, and you moved into the newly constructed home or condominium, please contact our **Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506** to verify current ownership and address information.

Wis. Stats. 74.09 Property tax bill and related information -

(6) Effect of Failure to Receive. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

WEED ORDINANCE-Take Notice that:

(a) In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s.
66.96(1), Wisconsin Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chicory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, and Burdock.
(b) Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).

The City Weed Commissioner may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.98(1) Wis. Stats.

(c) The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.



PET LICENSE INFORMATION

Attention New Residents and New Pet Owners: Wisconsin State Statutes, Section 174 makes it mandatory for pets to be licensed.



The City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs (limit 2) and cats over five months of age. You can license your pet online, by mail or at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office (see options below). Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. The license year commences January 1 and ends December 31. Beginning April 1, a late fee will be assessed except for:

• A new resident who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or;

• A resident who obtains a dog or cat on or after April 1st, and who licenses such pet within 30 days or,

• A resident who owns a dog or cat that is not five months of age on or before March 31, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

Renewals:

NEW: If you licensed your pet for 2006, on or before September 30, 2006, you should have received a 2007 renewal **postcard from Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission** (**MADACC**) in December. For pets licensed on or after October 1, 2006, MADACC did not send renewal postcards. Whether or not you receive a renewal postcard from MADACC, it is your responsibility to license your pet for 2007.

Licensing Options:

NEW: Online with a credit card at <u>www.madacc.com</u>, Note: MADACC has been experiencing a problem with online <u>renewals</u>. The renewal program may ask you to enter a Person ID (no such number exists). If this occurs, please click on "Proceed to Online License", answer "no" to the question, "are you renewing a pet license?" and proceed as though you are licensing a <u>new</u> pet.

NEW: By mail to Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission, 3839 W. Burnham St, West Milwaukee, WI 53215. Include the postcard (for renewals), current certificate of rabies vaccination (will be returned with license) and check, made payable to MADACC. If your license is considered late (see exceptions noted above), you must include the late fee with your payment. Call (414) 649-8640 for questions.

In person at City Hall, bring the postcard (for renewals) and current certificate of rabies vaccination.

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SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:



• Residents can request a "vacation

watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 (press "0" for Dispatch) and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will conduct periodic checks of your home while you are gone.

• Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away. Arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.

• Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period of time.

• Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.

• Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. Etch personal identification codes on your valuables with an engraving tool. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.

• Be a good neighbor. Get to know your neighbors and look out for each other. If you notice anything suspicious, call 9-1-1 immediately and report it to the police.

BICYCLE LICENSE



The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind all cyclists to license their bikes. A bicycle license can be obtained from the Police Department during normal business hours at a nominal \$3.50 fee.

The license is non-expiring and will enable the police to locate the owner of lost or stolen bikes which are retrieved or turned in.

2007 Revaluation

THE 2007 REVALUATION IS UNDERWAY...

The revaluation of all property in the City of Oak Creek is underway. The project, being handled by a team from Tyler Technologies, CLT Division and overseen by the City Assessor's office, is scheduled for completion by July, 2007.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS--

What is a revaluation?

A revaluation is a complete examination of all property assessments. In the process, some adjustments are made in order to assess all property at 100% of market value. The goal is to fairly and equitably value each property so that taxpayers pay only their fair share.

Why is this being done?

The last revaluation was done in 2004, and due to changes in market conditions our current assessments generally are at about 80% of market value.

What revaluation activities will I see in my neighborhood?

CLT representatives will be visiting many areas of the City during spring and early summer to collect data and take photographs. The field crews will be verifying the accuracy of property data that is currently on file. The representatives may go on to your property, or may request entry into your home or building if an interior inspection is needed; generally, interior inspections are needed if the home has been sold within the past two years, if remodeling has been done, or if the inspection is requested by the property owner.

How can I be sure that someone entering my property is a CLT official?

All vehicles used by the revaluation personnel will display an identification sign and all field personnel will carry official City of Oak Creek photo Identification Cards.

PLEASE ASK FOR ID FROM ANYONE REQUESTING ENTRY.

If you are in doubt about admitting someone, please call the Assessor's Office or the Police Department to verify the individual's credentials **BEFORE** allowing them to enter.

When will I receive information about my assessment?

All property owners will receive a Notice of Assessment form in mid-July. The notice will include information about scheduling an open book appointment to review your assessment if you believe it to be incorrect. The notice will also contain information about the Board of Review.

What if I have more questions about the revaluation?

PAYMENT DEADLINE - THIRD INSTALLMENT – 25% of net real estate tax due on or before May 31, 2007. WE DO NOT SEND REMINDER NOTICES.

PERMANENT ADDRESS CHANGES, contact our Assessor's Office at (414) 768-6506.

Please include the original or a copy of your tax bill(s) with all payments.

Make CHECKS(s) payable to Treasurer or City of Oak Creek. Third party checks are not accepted (exception – escrow checks made payable to, and endorsed by, taxpayers). Please DO NOT STAPLE to, or send correspondence with, your payment and DO NOT COMBINE with other payments. Checks not properly completed or endorsed may be returned unprocessed and your taxes may become delinquent. Receipts are invalid until the check clears your bank. Checks returned from the bank for any reason are subject to a \$25.00 recovery fee and payment is void. Full replacement payment plus separate recovery fee, with cash or certified funds, must be received by the original due date to avoid interest and penalties.

PAYMENT OPTIONS-NEW- PAY YOUR TAXES BY CREDIT CARD

We are pleased to announce the availability of credit card payments for payment of real estate taxes. In cooperation with the City of Oak Creek, Official Payments Corporation offers individuals and businesses the opportunity to pay property tax by way of a credit card by telephone or directly over the Internet. This service is safe, reliable, and in accordance with all state and government regulations. In order to process your payment, *Official Payments Corporation, the credit card service provider, charges a convenience fee based on the amount of the transaction, currently* 2.75% (\$1.00 *minimum fee*) *subject to change without notice.*

Easy Payment via Telephone or Internet (We <u>cannot</u> accept credit card payments in person; however, we will have a computer available at City Hall).

To pay by telephone call toll-free 1-800-272-9829 (Please enter Jurisdiction Code <u>6717</u> when prompted) or visit www.officialpayments.com to pay taxes over the Internet (link also available on the City's website at <u>www.oakcreek-wi.org</u>). You will be asked to enter information such as: type of tax (Real Estate), total of your payment, parcel number (located in the upper right hand corner of your tax bill), and credit card information. Please have your tax bill and credit card available.

The system will tell you the total of your payment, including the appropriate fee; obtain approval of the charge and issue an onscreen confirmation number and a printable digital receipt. Confirmation is emailed to users who request it. The charge will also appear on your credit card statement: the tax amount will appear on one line and the convenience fee amount on a separate line.

Box from February 1st through November 30th; payments will be returned to sender unprocessed and your taxes may become delinquent. Postmarks from these <u>improperly addressed</u> envelopes will not be honored).

Payments by mail are TIMELY if ALL of the following criteria are met: • it is mailed to the City of Oak Creek in a <u>properly addressed</u> envelope,

• *postmarked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment,

• with postage prepaid, and

• is received by the proper official not more than 5 days after the prescribed date for making the payment.

DRIVE-UP 24-HOUR DEPOSITORY, located at City Hall on the east side of the south parking lot. NO CASH PLEASE! Third installment payments must be received by midnight, May 31, 2007.

IN PERSON AT CITY HALL, 8640 S. Howell Avenue. Normal business hours are Monday thru Friday, 8 am to 5 pm. (closed for Memorial Day on Monday, May 28, 2007).

OVERPAYMENTS made at City Hall, cash refunds from Escrow Checks may be given <u>up to \$20</u>, if funds are available. Otherwise, a refund check will be mailed three to four weeks from the payment date and will be made payable to the Payer, even if your mortgage company makes a payment after you have paid in full.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Payment not received or *post-marked by its due date is delinquent. DELIN-QUENT TAX accumulates INTEREST AND PENALTY charges from

February 1^{St} at $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent per month on the entire unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. The *postmark governs the date of payment – NOT the date on your check. There is no grace period.

Delinquent notices for 2006 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2007. Payments will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2007, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection. You will receive a delinquent notice from Milwaukee County.

Payment of PRIOR YEAR(S) DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX must be made to MILWAUKEE COUNTY. Contact the Milwaukee County Treasurer's Office at (414) 278-4033 for information.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT

If you received the 2006 Lottery and Gaming Credit on or before January 31, 2007, you do not need to recertify for 2007.

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

Lottery and Gaming Credit applications are available on our website at www.oakcreekwi.org, click on City Departments and then Treasurer's Office. They are also available at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office.

2006: The 2006 Lottery and Gaming Credit is \$80.21. If you did not receive this credit and are eligible, complete a 2006 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application and return it to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) by October 1, 2007.

2007: If you qualify for the Lottery & Gaming Credit beginning in 2007, or if you applied for the 2006 Late Lottery & Gaming Credit, complete and return the 2007 Lottery & Gaming Credit application to the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office by November 15, 2007; the credit will appear on your 2007 Real Estate Tax Bill. For applications received between November 15, 2007 and January 31, 2008, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The 2007 Lottery & Gaming Credit amount will be determined in December 2007.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION/CHANGES

Beginning with 2003, tax information is available through our website at www.oakcreekwi.org. From the homepage, click on Property Tax and Assessment Information (Land Records Search); search by parcel number, name, or address. DEVELOPMENT AND SAFETY CLINIC FOR 3 YEAR OLDS

IMMUNIZATION FEE CHANGES FOR 2007

Starting January 1, 2007, an administrative fee of \$5 for residents and \$10 for non-residents will be charged per child/per visit. The fee is waived for BadgerCare or Medicaid recipients. A copy of your child's Immunization Record is required at clinic visit. Fees for adults have also changed.

The cost for Tuberculin Skin Tests is now \$15 per test. Testing is done on Mondays between 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. Results may be read 48-72 hours after the test.

Used syringes, lancets and other sharps in an approved container will be accepted for disposal at the Oak Creek Health Department from residents of Oak Creek. Proof of residency must be presented.

PET SAFETY

Wisconsin State Statues, Section 174, makes it mandatory for pets to be licensed. For questions regarding licensing, please contact the Treasurer's office at 768-6501.



Any animal bite must be reported to the Oak Creek Police Department. Remember, pets need vaccines, also. If an animal bites, and is not up to date with rabies vaccination, quarantine at a veterinary facility will be required at the owner's expense. VACATION FIRE SAFETY

As the summer months approach, citizens will be getting ready for family vacations.



Most of these get-a-ways will include a hotel stay. Please remember the following fire safety tips to ensure your vacation is a safe one.

- Choose a hotel or motel that is protected by both smoke alarms & fire sprinklers. Some smaller motels do NOT have sprinklers.
- Familiarize yourself with escape plans posted in your room and in the lobby.
- Locate the two nearest exits and fire alarms. Count the number of doors between your room and the nearest exit.
- Keep your room key and a small flashlight on the nightstand in case of an emergency.
- In the event of a fire, use the stairs. Elevators may malfunction.
- As you leave your room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it.
- If the door is hot, stay inside and place wet towels in the crack of the door.
- If confronted by smoke, stay low to the ground and crawl to safety.

MEET THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Jerry Biggart joined the Oak Creek Fire Department on August 23, 1999. Most recently, Jerry was promoted to Lieutenant. After his swearing in on January 12, Jerry was assigned to one of the shifts at Station One. "I'm fortunate to be assigned with motivated and talented firefighters that



have made for a seamless transition for me from firefighter to Lieutenant" Prior to arriving in Oak Creek, Jerry worked in the Bureau of Technical Services in the City of Milwaukee and as an Assistant Chief with the Town of Brookfield.

Throughout his career, Jerry has always placed an emphasis on his education. "There is so much information out there. I take every opportunity to enhance my knowledge base and better myself as a firefighter." Jerry is certified as a Firefighter II, EMT-Paramedic, and Driver/Operator. He is also a State of Wisconsin certified Company Officer, Fire Instructor, and Fire Inspector. Later this year, Jerry will receive his Bachelor's Degree in Fire Department Management from the University of Southern Illinois.

Jerry has been instrumental in the training of Oak Creek's Emergency Services Dispatchers. He has worked to implement a set of guidelines to aid the dispatchers in determining the proper response to each emergency situation.

ASK THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Here are some frequently asked questions:

When should I call 911?

Use 9-1-1 to stop a crime in progress, report a fire, or call for an ambulance. 9-1-1 is the right number to call in an emergency when a prompt response is needed.

What will the dispatcher ask me when I call?

- What happened?
- What is the location?
- Where are you calling from?
- What is your name?
- What is your phone number?

I just signed up for digital phone service. Will my phone still work if there is a power outage?

Unfortunately, your digital phone service does not work in the event of a power outage. You can still use your cell phone in the event of an emergency.

Speaking of cell phones, if I call 911 from my cell phone and am unable to provide my exact location, will the dispatchers know where I'm calling from?

Milwaukee County currently has Enhanced 911 in place for wireless communication. Enhanced 911 allows Emergency Service Dispatchers to receive the caller's name, telephone number, and exact location immediately upon answering a call. This provides for a prompt and efficient response of emergency personnel when seconds count.

STROKE AWARENESS

According to the National Stroke Association, strokes are the third leading cause of death in Americans and the leading cause of adult disability. A stroke occurs when a blood clot blocks blood flow to an artery in the brain or a blood vessel in the brain breaks. Both situations result in an interruption of blood flow to brain tissue. When the brain is without this oxygen-filled blood, brain cells begin to die.



The symptoms of a stroke vary and may be difficult to notice. Symptoms may occur suddenly and include trouble seeing in one or both eyes, slurred speech, a headache without a known cause, weakness or numbness to one side of the body, and trouble walking due to a loss of balance and coordination.

A stroke is a serious medical condition that requires immediate attention. If you feel that you or loved one is exhibiting the warning signs of stroke, dial 911 immediately.

Fair Housing



FAIR HOUSING **IS YOUR RIGHT: PROTECT YOURSELF!**

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding and keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Color Race • Sex • Marital Status
- Disability Religion
- Age Sexual Orientation
- National origin/Ancestry
- Family status (household composition, including presence of children)
- Lawful source of income

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination

· Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

The Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination.



DON'T FEED THE WATERFOWL!

Manicured grass near an unobstructed body of water such as the pond area in Miller Park describes the habitat most loved by Canada geese. There is no need to attract geese with food. Goose droppings interfere with people's enjoyment of the

park. The most basic step in attracting fewer geese is to let them feed from nature.



CALLING 911 WITH INTERNET-BASED PHONE SERVICE

If you subscribe to VoIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) phone service through companies such as Vonage or VoiceWing, the Police Department would like you to know



of a very important setback to these internetbased calling services. Emergency calls (911) made through VoIP services are not directed to traditional 911 Emergency Response Centers. Instead, calls are directed to a PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) where the operators do not have access to location information and cannot use tracing technolo-

gy to locate the caller. Some VoIP providers have been integrating technology called E911 so that emergency-center operators can identify a caller's location and phone number automatically. However, for E911 to work, subscribers must register their physical address online.

In addition, unless you have a backup battery, a power outage can knock out Internet phone service even when traditional phones continue to work. A breakdown in cable TV service would do the same. With this in mind, the Police Department strongly advises residents with internet-based phone service to consider keeping an active analog phone line available for emergencies.

WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

- With the warm weather comes more activities outside. There are more car windows down and gatherings at residences. Please be courteous of your neighbors with regard to loud noise and music levels.
- The Oak Creek Police Department responds to complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for **loud noise/music** (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- **Rummage sale**, garage sale, advertising or other such signs cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-of-ways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of **illegal fireworks**, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as hot as 1,200 degrees and can cause serious injury to young hands and eyes.

ALARM REQUIREMENTS

The City of Oak Creek has an Ordinance pertaining to any alarm systems installed in homes or businesses that are connected either to the Police or Fire Department or a commercial alarm company. The Police Department requires the completion of a Night Call Information/Alarm Application Form which contains information needed by the police should your alarm sound when no one is on the premises. If you have an alarm and have not completed this form, please contact Dispatch Manager Rebecca Leigh at the Police Department (766-7687) so that you can supply the information needed.

CONCERNED PARENTS PROGRAM

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents may leave a key with the Police Department and give permission for officers to gain entry to their home during their absence, in the event that there is a party or other illegal activity on the premises. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent. DOGS IN PARKS

In order to provide an opportunity for City residents to walk & exercise their dogs, the Common Council presently allows dogs in City parks. To prevent conflicts between dogs & other park users, we are asking dog owners to comply with the following guidelines: ✓ It is unlawful for the dog to be allowed to run loose in the park. Owners must hold their dog on a leash not longer than 10 feet. Dogs must always be under the control of the owner at all times.

Dog waste is not only offensive; it can also spread disease & parasites to other dogs & humans. It is unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit waste deposited by the dog to remain on park property. Owners must carry a waste deposit receptacle to immediately remove all waste matter. Owners are asked to deposit the matter in the appropriate manner at their home.
 Owners are asked to keep their dogs out of picnic areas, playstructure/swing areas and areas marked, "No Dogs Allowed".

✓ You must keep your dog's license current & the license tag must be on your dog's collar. Do not allow your dog to trespass on public or private property, run loose, unleashed or unattended. Prevent your dog from injuring any person, property or other animal. Never allow your dog to bark, growl or threaten another person.

"THE RUNWAY" - DOG EXERCISE AREA

The "Runway", located at 1300 E. Rawson Ave., is owned & maintained by Milwaukee County. It is a 27 acre parcel where dog owners can exercise their pets off-leash. The area is fenced, has a cut grass area with signage, gravel parking, port-a-lets, doggy bags & waste containers. Current dog license & proof of rabies immunization required!

Emergency Management

BE PREPARED: HAVE DISASTER SMARTS

Many problems were exposed in the wake of the Hurricane Katrina disaster with the preparation, the disaster response, and the aftermath in the affected communities. From those many lessons learned, the Oak Creek Emergency Management Committee wants to prevent a similar occurrence here. Disasters and emergencies can strike quickly and without warning and anywhere, at anytime, and affect anyone of us, so it is important to *Be Prepared*.

In the last *Acorn*, Oak Creek Emergency Management along with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security urged families to be better prepared. The theme of the article was to think about plans and supplies that you would need for a disaster. Families should be prepared for 3 to 5 days without assistance from governmental and outside agencies. This article will focus on when the disaster strikes, there are steps you and your family can take to increase everyone's safety and survival.

Stick to Your Plan – If you have made a family plan, stick to it. Other family members will be expecting you to follow the plan. Call them if possible and let them know your situation and then don't use the phone again unless it is an emergency. Telephone and cell phone lines are jammed and unusable during major disasters. Remember to use your disaster kit; remember replace stored water and food every 3 to 6months. Find the safest and more secure location in your home to assemble before a tornado touch down. Test your smoke detectors and practice the plan. Every year the plan should be reviewed and updated.

Home Hazards – During a disaster, ordinary objects in you home can cause injury or damage. Anything that can move, fall, break, or cause a fire is a home hazard during a disaster. For example, a hot water heater can start a fire or release gas or a bookshelf can fall and injure someone. Know where to shut off your home's gas supply and have the proper tool available. Inspect your home at least once a year for hazards and fix potential problems before they cause injury. Contact the Fire Department to learn about other home hazards.

Check for Injuries – Give first aid and get help for seriously injured people. Remember that unless a person's life is immediately threatened by the disaster or their injuries, it is best to leave them in position and keep the person still. Assist the person by providing a blanket to keep the injured person warm, calm and reassure them, and watch over to see if their mental status changes. Show arriving rescuers where the person is located. To provide the best help for your family and neighbors, get training in first aid and CPR.

Check for Damage – When checking for damage, remember to watch for your own safety in the process. Because explosive gases may be present, only use flashlights to see – do

not use matches or turn on electrical switches. Check for fires, fire hazards, and other hazardous conditions and, if possible, make it safer. Use your senses to detect gas leaks, starting at the water heater and furnace – if gas is suspected, turn off the main supply at the meter. If safe to do so, clean up spilled medicines, bleaches, gasoline, and other flammable liquids immediately.

Helping Neighbors – Working with neighbors can save lives and property. Meet with your neighbors to plan how the neighborhood could work together after a disaster until help arrives. If you are a member of a neighborhood organization or residential association, such as Neighborhood Watch, introduce disaster preparedness as a new activity. Know each others special skills (e.g. medical, technical) and consider how you could help one another or neighbors with special needs, such as the elderly or disabled persons. Make plans for child care in case parents can't get home.

Evacuation – The Fire and Police Departments working together with Emergency Management, will determine if evacuation is necessary during an incident. Notification will be made to you either directly door-to-door or by media outlets such as radio, television, or vehicle loudspeaker. Listen to the instructions carefully and follow them. If immediate evacuation is ordered, remember to take your disaster supply kit, checkbook, cash, credit cards, car keys, medications, infant formula, and personal needs. Don't forget to take your pet and its' needs. If you are going to a government shelter, pets generally are not permitted. Be sure to shut off all vents, close and lock doors and windows, and most importantly remain calm.

Shelter-In-Place – Sometimes evacuation will be more dangerous to the public if there is a hazardous vapor present, so an option that public safety officials may choose is shelter-inplace. If you are told to stay in your homes, remember to get family and pets inside, close doors, windows and fireplace dampers, turn off air conditioning, fans, and heating vents, go into an upper room with few windows, take your disaster supply kit, stuff wet towels in the cracks under doors, duct tape windows, and listen for announcements on radio or television. If outside and the tornado siren has activated, immediately get to the designated tornado sheltering indoors.

The National website for National Preparedness is <u>www.ready.gov</u>. This website has a wealth of information and is divided into three sections; Ready America, Ready Business, and Ready Kids. The website is easy to navigate and has many resources to help you be better prepared.

The Street Department would like to welcome our new equipment operator, Tyler Buerger. Tyler was hired on November 13, 2006 and is replacing Marv Hunt who retired December 31, 2005.

The Street Department would like to inform residents that there will be a reconstruction of the intersection at Shepard and Puetz Road starting in approximately June. Definite details are not available at this time; however, residents may check the City of Oak Creek Web Site, Engineering Department, at <u>www.oakcreekwi.org</u>. PLEASE NOTE: Due to the intersection closing, the 4th of July Parade route will have to be changed. Please see the *ACORN* Table of Contents, Celebrations Commission, for further details.

Fine Print: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

IS SHE/HE OLD ENOUGH?

For all programs, **age requirement will be as of the date of the first class**, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

The policy of the Department is that those who participate must help defray the overall cost of the activity. Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program.

Note:

The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay these fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office to arrange for their participation.

NEED TO TRANSFER?

Transfers will be made at no charge, upon request, for persons who meet the age/skill level requirements of the class requested provided there is space available at the time of the request.

NEED A REFUND?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund requested.

In the event an activity a person signs up for is cancelled, that person will have the option of a full refund or a transfer to another activity.

OPEN HOUSE

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class, and attend the open house held during the final class of the session.

MAKEUPS?

Classes missed for individual absences (i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participants attend classes other than the one they are registered for.

Cancelled activities by the Department will be rescheduled if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

CAN I WATCH?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

We also feel it is most beneficial for your child to have recreational time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adults-only atmosphere.

HAVE A COMPLAINT?

If, after you begin a class it does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

DO YOU HAVE INSURANCE?

Insurance coverage for program participants is not provided by the Department or by the School District for Department sponsored activities. Please obtain your own insurance coverage for the duration of the activity.

AM I A RESIDENT?

The non-resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is not within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration. Attendance in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District does not constitute residency. Current proof of City residency is required once per year (August-July)at each registration. If proof of residency is not provided, the non-resident fee will apply.

WHAT IF?

My child wants to be on the same team or in a class with a friend or sibling?

Siblings who meet the requirements for the same class section or sports league will be placed together unless otherwise requested in writing by the parent or guardian.
