Water Friendly Landscaping

Owners of property near a detention pond, ditch, creek, lake, or other waterway have some unique landscaping opportunities and challenges. There are things a property owner can do to help improve the quality of the water near their property.

Landscaping a vegetated buffer zone along the water's edge, rather than traditional lawn, has many benefits, such as less mowing and maintenance. A buffer can also improve habitat and help water quality by reducing the amount of pollutants getting into the water. A vegetated buffer zone can be created in a number of ways, many of which actually reduce time and effort needed to maintain the area.

Native plants can provide food and habitat to attract songbirds and butterflies to your yard. Information on native shoreland plant species is available from the UW-Extension at www.clean-water.uwex.edu/pubs/index.htm.

A buffer zone can be created simply by establishing a "no-mow" zone along the water's edge. Turf grasses will grow 12-24 inches tall before going to seed.

For creating or maintaining a view of the water, consider selective removal of branches, trees, shrubs and ground cover to create clear areas while maintaining vegetation in other areas.

Please note that City ordinance requires natural lawns to be maintained at a height of 12 inches or less, and certain areas, such as platted subdivisions with buildings on 50% or more of the lots, are required to maintain the grass at six inches or less. Additionally, noxious weeds such as ragweed are excluded from the definition of natural lawn. If you have a question, please check with the City Inspection department to determine specific requirements for your property prior to establishing a vegetated buffer area.

Some homeowners dump grass clippings on the bank of a pond,



ditch, waterway, or wetland adjacent to their property.
Unfortunately, as these clippings break down, they will add nitrogen and other compounds to the water, which contributes to algae growth and odors.

Disposal of grass clippings or other yard waste on the banks of a waterway is prohibited by Section 8.23(b) of the Municipal Code.

Reducing the application of chemical fertilizers and weed killers can further help the water quality of the rivers and lakes around us. OFFICIAL NOTICE - CITY OF OAK CREEK

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT:


- (a) In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s. 66.96(1), Wisconsin Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chickory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, Burdock.
- (b) Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six (6) inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).

The City Weed Commissioner may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.98(1) Wis. Stats.

(c) The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.









GOOSE CONTROL-HENRY MILLER PARK

The City has contracted a company to move Canada geese from the Henry Miller Park area at various times during March through November. Border Collie dogs, a kayak and a small remote controlled boat are used to move the geese. The geese will not be harmed.

DON'T FEED THE WATERFOWL!

Areas such as the pond area in Henry Miller Park are the habitat most loved by Canada geese. Goose droppings are more than unsightly and can result in:

- * damage to manicured turf & landscape plants
- * wear and tear on maintenance equipment
- * health and safety concerns
- * negative property image
- * disturbing noise
- * complaint calls

Please do not attract geese with food. The most basic step in attracting fewer geese is to let them feed from nature.

SAFE SMOKING

According to a 2005 study by the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA), smoking materials were found to be the cause of an estimated

82,400 fires in the United States. These fires caused 800 deaths, 1,660 injuries and an estimated 575 million dollars in property damage. Most smoking material fires occur in living rooms, bedrooms and other rooms that generally contain upholstered furniture. If you do smoke in your home, please keep the following helpful tips in mind:

- 1. Do not smoke if you are tired, have been drinking alcohol, or have taken medicine or drugs that may cause drowsiness.
- 2. If possible smoke outside.
- 3. Dowse cigarette butts in water before discarding them.
- 4. Never smoke in homes when medical oxygen is in use.
- 5. Check under sofa or chair cushions to make sure that a butt has not fallen out of sight.

ROADWAY SAFETY

If you have passed by a car accident lately, you may have noticed something different about the firefighters working on scene. They are easier to see. That is because the Oak Creek Fire Department has taken the lead in instituting a Roadway Safety policy. In addition to reflective vests that are required to be worn by all personnel while operating on the roadway, fire department apparatus are also in the process of being outfitted with reflective material. Firefighters will also place cones on the roadway to direct traffic away from an accident scene. Finally, a large, collapsible road sign is placed on the roadway. This sign warns drivers of the upcoming accident and prepares them for the hazards they may encounter. The Fire Department has also provided training on Roadway Safety to both the police department and to the sheriff's department.

FIRE DEPARTMENT HIRING AND PROMOTIONS

The Fire Department would like to congratulate **Battalion Chief** of **Operations Joseph Pulvermacher** on his promotion to Battal-

ion Chief of Training. B.C. Pulvermacher was originally hired as a firefighter in 1993. He has been promoted through the ranks as Lieutenant, Captain, and Battalion Chief. He looks forward to the challenges that will come with his new position and is working to develop a training program that encom-

passes the many aspects of firefighting and emergency medical services.

The Fire Department would like to welcome new hires **Ian Perry** and **JJ LaDue**. Perry was hired on November 10th. He comes to Oak Creek after serving as Firefighter/Paramedic with the New Berlin Fire Department for three years. He is extremely proud of achieving his goal of being hired as an Oak Creek Firefighter.



LaDue was hired on January 2nd. Prior to being hired by Oak Creek, he held Firefighter/Paramedic positions at both the Green Bay and Oshkosh Fire Departments. Having grown up in Southeastern Wisconsin, LaDue eagerly anticipated the opportunity to establish his career with the Oak Creek Fire Department.



MASK THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

How much water does a fire engine hold? Is it enough to put out a fire?

Each fire engine holds between 500 and 750 gallons of water. This is typically enough to put out a small fire that involves only the contents of a room or an automobile. Should the fire spread into the walls or ceilings of a structure, additional water must be obtained from fire hydrants connected to the city's water system.

If I see someone collapse in the grocery store, what's the first thing I should do to help them?

First, ask the person if they need help. If they do, direct a bystander to dial 911 and request the Fire Department. Then render any aid that you are comfortable with providing.

FAST FIRE FACTS

ETCO-1, the vehicle used in the 1980's movie, Ghostbusters, was based on a 1959 Cadillac ambulance. The Oak Creek Fire Department had a similar unit when it began transporting to hospitals.

The firefighter badge of today is patterned after the famous Maltese Cross of the Knights of St. John. During the Crusades, those that battled the naphtha fires of the Saracens to save their fellow crusaders were recognized and awarded the Maltese Cross. Today, as in medieval times, this badge remains a symbol of protection and honor for those who fight fire and sacrifice their lives to save others.

WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

- With the warm weather comes more activities outside. There are more car windows
 down and gatherings at residences. Please be
 courteous of your neighbors with regard to
 - loud noise and music levels. The Oak Creek Police Department responds to complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for loud noise/music (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10 p.m. & 8 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. & 7 a.m.
- Rummage sale, garage sale, advertising or other such signs
 cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-ofways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally
 posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as hot as 1,200 degrees and can cause serious injury to young hands and eyes.

SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:

- Residents can request a "vacation watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 (press "0" for Dispatch) and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will conduct periodic checks of your home while you are gone.
- Do not allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away. Arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period of time.
- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places. Burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. Etch personal identification codes on your valuables with an engraving tool. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.
- Be a good neighbor. Get to know your neighbors and watch out for each other. If you notice anything suspicious, call 9-l-l immediately and report it to the police.

PREVENT WEST NILE VIRUS

It's Mosquito Control Time Again!!! Now is the time to start "mosquito proofing" for 2009. Empty/refill birdbaths& wading pools every 2-3 days. Don't forget about flowerpots or other containers that can hold water. Protect yourself. Wear long-sleeved clothing. Apply an insecticide with DEET to your clothing. Try not to be outside when mosquitoes are the most active – dawn and dusk. The City will be applying larvacide to sewer catch basins that contain standing water. This will be done towards the end of June. Report dead birds, especially crows, ravens, and blue jays, to the West Nile Hotline at 1-800-433-1610.

To Eat or Not To Eat That Is the Question (How to interpret label "freshness dates".)

"Expiration date" means the last date a food should be eaten. In the State of Wisconsin only three products are required to have expiration dates. They are liquid baby formula, smoked fish, and raw eggs. These products may not be offered for sale or sold at retail if the expiration date has expired.

"Sell by date" is an indicator for the store as to when to pull the item from sale. It is the last day in which the product will have its highest level of quality but still remain edible for some time after. "Use by date" is the last date recommended for use while the food is at peak quality by the manufacturer. Consumers should use the product before the "use by date".

WATER QUALITY AT GREAT LAKES BEACHES



ILLICIT DISCHARGES

As part of a permit required and issued by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the City of Oak Creek has implemented a program to detect and eliminate illegal connections or discharges to the storm water management system.

Many people do not realize that whatever enters catch basins and storm water inlets is carried directly to waterways and the lake without treatment. This is why it is so important to keep illicit substances out of the storm sewer system.

As part of this program, City staff will be inspecting storm water outfalls for certain things that may indicate an illicit discharge. The inspections are conducted during dry weather, since wet weather results in run off that makes it difficult to check for illicit discharge. If a flow is present during dry weather, staff will use some simple field tests to evaluate if substances such as detergent or copper are in the water. This will help to determine if the flow is a legal flow, such as water from sump pumps, or an illegal discharge. If the discharge is a type that is prohibited, the City will conduct additional investigation to determine where the discharge is coming from, and work with the owner to eliminate the discharge.

Residents can help prevent pollution by not dumping down the storm drain. Chlorinated water from a swimming pool cannot be discharged down the storm drain unless the water has been de-chlorinated. Proper disposal of liq-



uids is essential for the health of our waterways. Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District has several mobile and year round collection sites where you can properly dispose of items such as driveway sealer, antifreeze, or pool chemicals.

If you notice something being illegally discharged to the storm drain, you can report it to the engineering department at (414)768-6541.

Water & Sewer Utility

Water Treatment Plant Expansion Underway, Project Nearly \$6 Million Under Estimates

Final construction bids totaled \$10.5 million for the Oak Creek Water Treatment Plant expansion, which is scheduled for completion in August 2010. Bids were much lower than original engineering estimates of \$16.3 million for improved filtration and pumping capacity, as well as security measures.

"At the time of our last plant expansion in 1999, our master plan accurately predicted the need for another expansion by 2010 to 28 million gallons of daily water treatment capacity," says Mike Sullivan, Utility Engineer. "The current economic situation and the timing of the bid process for this project, however, generated extremely competitive contractor bids and, as it turns out, tremendous value for rate payers."

Oak Creek and Caledonia Sign 40-Year Water Supply Agreement

The Utility signed an extension of an existing agreement where Oak Creek will supply water to residents of Caledonia for the next four decades. This agreement also increased the Utility's service area by approximately 20 square miles.

"Our existing relationship with Caledonia made us the logical choice to continue supplying what we deliver best, which is some of the nation's cleanest, safest drinking water," Utility General Manager Steven N. Yttri said. "Caledonia had other water supply options, but our approach to serving the communities and ratepayers that depend on our world-class water system for their water played a significant role in Caledonia choosing us."

Utility's Financial Reporting Excellence Recognized for 15th Consecutive Year

For the 15th consecutive year, the Utility received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting, which recognizes financial communication that provides ratepayers with a transparent, easy-to-understand way of knowing how their fees are being spent.

"Our Utility has the longest running streak in Wisconsin for a water utility receiving this recognition," Yttri said. "This speaks volumes about the team of people we have in place at the Utility to ensure our accounting methods and controls continuously exceed industry standards."

Utility Certified Public Accountant Annette Stenzel received the Award of Financial Reporting Achievement for her involvement with its preparation.

This annual honor is the highest awarded for public entities by the Government Finance Officers Association. Utilities that issue Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports are reviewed by an impartial national panel for accounting and financial reporting. The report must demonstrate a spirit of full disclosure that clearly communicates the financial stories in a fashion that motivates readership.

World Taste Competition Ranks Oak Creek Water Among The Best of Global Suppliers

For the third time, Claire Baie bottled water, which is produced by the Oak Creek Water Utility, received a medal at the International Water Tasting Contest, known as the Academy Awards of water. This year's competition in Berkley Springs, W. Va., also ranked the Utility's tap water fourth among municipalities from around the world, which compete annually at the world's largest water tasting competition, now in its 19th year.

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront

an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents may leave a key with the Police Department and give permission for officers to gain entry to their home during their absence, in the event that there is a party or other illegal activity on the premises. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent. All freon appliances (refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers & air conditioners) brought to the recycling yard will be charged a \$15.00 fee.

Tires brought to the recycling yard should be free of rims. A fee of \$2.00 per tire will be charged.

SPECIAL PICK UPS

In addition to the fall & spring clean-ups that are provided at NO CHARGE, the City of Oak Creek provides special pick-ups for residents for a fee of \$15 for the following items:

- * Appliances (A \$15 additional fee will be charged for Freon appliances – refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers & air conditioners)
- * Furniture * Mattresses
- * Televisions
- * Carpeting/Padding
- * Metals of any kind

Special pick-ups are done on Friday mornings **ONLY**. Items for pick up must be at the road by 6:45 a.m. on the scheduled Friday. Residents requesting special pick ups must pay their fees before noon, Thursday, in order to be put on that Fridays pick up schedule.

Please note that special pick ups will not be done for the following items:

- * Branches
- * Tires
- * Yard Waste

- * Recyclables
- * Concrete
- * Hazardous Waste
- * Contractor generated materials

BRANCH PICK-UP DATES

Branches will be picked up beginning on the following dates: * June 1st * August 1st

To guarantee that your branches are picked up, you must have them at

the roadside BY the first of the months listed above. Once we pass through your neighborhood, we will not be back until the next date listed. Reminder, branches are to be stacked neatly with the cut ends facing the road. Roots should be separate from the brush pile. The

Street Department WILL NOT pickup brush that is the result of a contractor doing work on your property. It is their responsibility to dispose of the brush properly.

Branches may also be brought to the recycling yard, any time of the year, at 720 W. Puetz Road.

BASKETBALL STANDARDS

There has been an ongoing problem with residents placing basketball standards in the right-of-way (Terrace Area). This area is defined as that area between the curb and the sidewalk, and where no sidewalk exists, that area between the street pavement and the right-of-way/property line.



Section 6.25 Terrace Areas, Section (d) of the Municipal Code states: "No structures or fixtures shall be placed in the terrace area. Examples of prohibited items would be basketball backstops, statuary, flagpoles and other objects. The exception to this subsection is the installation of a mailbox as specified by the United States Postal Service."

GARBAGE & RECYCLING CART INFORMATION

Per Section 8.41 of the City of Oak Creek Municipal Code, household combined refuse not placed in a container provided by the City of Oak Creek, will not be collected.

If you find your blue refuse cart is always overflowing, you may purchase an additional cart from the Street Department. These carts will become your property. Contact the Street Department at 570-5682 for pricing.

Also contact the Street Department for any repairs or replacements needed for your blue refuse carts.

***FOR RECYCLING CART REPAIRS, PLEASE **CONTACT WASTE MANAGEMENT AT 761-2100.**

REMINDER: Your recycling cart should be used for recyclables **ONLY**. In 2008, 1/3 of the items placed in the recycling carts were trash. This equaled 171 tons of trash. Rather than the City picking this up as regular trash, the City paid Waste Management to pick this up and sort it out of the recyclables. Please rinse your containers prior to placing them in to the recycling cart and cardboard should be clean & uncontaminated. Pizza boxes are food contaminated. Therefore, they belong in the garbage cart rather than in the recycling cart.

We are pleased to announce the availability of credit card payments for payment of real estate taxes. In cooperation with the City of Oak Creek, Official Payments Corporation offers individuals and businesses the opportunity to pay property tax by way of a credit card by telephone or directly over the Internet. This service is safe, reliable, and in accordance with all state and government regulations. In order to process your payment, Official Payments Corporation, the credit card service provider, charges a convenience fee based on the amount of the transaction, currently 2.75% (\$1.00 minimum fee) subject to change without notice.

Easy Payment via Telephone or Internet (We cannot accept credit card payments in person; however, we will have a computer available at City Hall).

To pay by telephone call toll-free 1-800-272-9829 (Enter Jurisdiction Code 6717 when prompted) or visit www.officialpayments.com to pay taxes over the Internet (link also available on the City's website at www.oakcreekwi.org). You will be asked to enter information such as: type of tax (Real Estate-7 to 10 digit parcel #) or (Personal Property-6 digit parcel #, for businesses only), total of your payment, parcel number (located in the upper right hand corner of your tax bill), and credit card information. Please have your tax bill and credit card available.

The system will tell you the total of your payment, including the appropriate fee; obtain approval of the charge and issue an onscreen confirmation number and a printable digital receipt. Confirmation is emailed to users who request it. The charge will also appear on your credit card statement: the tax amount will appear on one line and the convenience fee amount on a separate line.

DELINQUENT REAL ESTATE TAX

Payment not received or *post-marked before midnight of the last date prescribed for making the payment is delinquent. DELINQUENCY results in forfeiture of the installment option and accumulates IN-TEREST AND PENALTY charges from February 1st at 1 ½ percent per month on the entire unpaid principal balance, regardless of when it becomes delinquent. The *postmark governs the date of payment -NOT the date on your check.

Delinquent notices for 2008 Real Estate Property Tax will be mailed to the address on record in June 2009. Payment of delinquent 2008 Real Estate Property Tax will be accepted by the City of Oak Creek through July 31, 2009, after which will be turned over to Milwaukee County for collection.

Failure to receive a property tax bill does not affect the validity of the general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments levied or the collection of delinquent general property taxes, special taxes, special charges and special assessments.

LOTTERY AND GAMING CREDIT If you received the 2008 Lottery and Gaming Credit on or before January 31, 2009, you do not need to recertify for 2009.

Those who qualify are owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1 (Certification Date) of the year in which property taxes are levied. Primary residence is defined as the home where an individual lives more than six months of the year.

2008: The 2008 Lottery and Gaming Credit is \$71.83. If you did not receive this credit and are eligible, complete a 2008 Late Lottery and Gaming Credit application and return it, along with a copy of your tax bill, to the State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue (address is shown on the application) by October 1, 2009.

2009: If you first qualify for the Lottery and Gaming Credit beginning in 2009, or if you applied for the 2008 <u>Late</u> Lottery and Gaming Credit, complete and return the 2009 Lottery and Gaming Credit application to the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office by November 15, 2009; the credit will appear on your 2009 Real Estate Tax Bill. For applications received between November 15, 2009 and January 31, 2010, you may deduct the credit from your first payment. The 2009 Lottery and Gaming Credit amount will be determined in December 2009.

Lottery and Gaming Credit applications are available on our website or at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

There is a .25 charge for additional copies of tax bills. Internet service, computers and copy machines are available at the Oak Creek Public Library (north of City Hall). PET LICENSE INFORMATION



The City of Oak Creek requires a license for dogs (limit 2) and cats over five months of age. You can license your pet online, by mail or at the Oak Creek Treasurer's Office (see options below). Residents must provide a current certificate of rabies vaccination (showing the tag number and the expiration date) at the time of licensing. The license year commences January 1st and ends December 31st. Beginning April 1, a late fee will be assessed except for:

- A new resident who owns a dog or cat over five months of age, and who licenses such pet within 30 days of residency or;
- resident who obtains a dog or cat on or after April 1st, and who licenses such pet within 30 days or,
- A resident who owns a dog or cat that is not five months of age on or before March 31st, and who licenses such pet within 30 days from the date in which it reaches five months of age.

Renewals:

If you license your pet on or before September 30th you should receive a renewal **post-card from Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MADACC)**in January. For pets licensed on or after October 1st, MADACC does not send renewal postcards.

Whether or not you receive a renewal post-card from MADACC, it is your responsibility to license your pet on or before March 31st.

BY MAIL to Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission, 3839 W. Burnham St, West Milwaukee, WI 53215. Include the postcard (for renewals), current certificate of rabies vaccination (will be returned with license) and check, made payable to MADACC. If your license is considered late (see exceptions noted above), you must include the late fee with your payment. Call (414) 649-8640 for questions. MADACC charges an additional \$1.00 fee for this service.

BY MAIL to City of Oak Creek, 8640 S Howell Avenue. Include the postcard (for renewals), current certificate of rabies vaccination (will be returned with license) and check, made payable to Treasurer or City of Oak Creek. If your license is considered late (see exceptions noted above), you must include the late fee with your payment. Call (414) 768-6501 for questions.



Fair Housing is Your Right: Protect Yourself!



should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- Race
- ✓ Sex
- Color

- → Disability
- Religion
- ion 🗸 Age
- Status
- ✓ Lawful source of income
- ✓ National Origin/Ancestry ✓ S
- ✓ Sexual Orientation
- ✓ Family status (household composition, including presence of children)

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council

In this day and age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle and difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability.

The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

- ✓ You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign.
- ✓ You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, and the landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along.
- A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- ✓ Are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- ✓ You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are.
- → A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- ✓ Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent reason.
- ✓ Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court.

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the **Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-1240.**

The Fair Housing Council offers many helpful services, including:

- ✓ Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- ✓ Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination
- → Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

In addition, the Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination. **Please call Felita Daniels Ashley at 414-278-1240** to schedule a presentation for your group.

Fine Print: Things You Should Know

Is She/He Old Enough?

For all programs, age requirements will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader. In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

How Much Is It?

Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program. The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office.

Need To Transfer? Transfers are made at no charge

Need A Refund?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund initiated by the participant.

Open House

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class and attend the open house held during the final class session.

Makeups?

Classes missed for individual absences (i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participants attend classes other than the one they are registered for. Cancelled activities by the Department will be rescheduled, if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

Can I Watch?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, for your child to have recreation time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adult-only atmosphere, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

Have A Complaint?

If a class does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Parks, Recreation & Forestry Office at 768-6515 to discuss your concerns.

Do You Have Insurance?

Insurance coverage for program participants is not provided by the Department or by the School District for Department sponsored activities.

Am I A Resident?

The resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration and children in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District. Current proof of City residency is required once per year (August-July) to receive resident fees.

What If?

My child wants to be on the same team or in a class with a friend or sibling. Siblings who meet the requirements for the same class section or sports league will be placed together unless otherwise requested in writing by the parent or guardian. All other requests for unrelated children to be placed together:

- are not guaranteed
- will not be considered for girls softball or youth baseball
- will be for a maximum of 3 persons
- may result in the entire group being placed on the waiting list
- must be in writing and signed by parents/guardians of both children

I want to register with my adult friend:

- ◆ If one person is placed on the wait list, the entire group will be placed on the wait list
- ◆ If one person is a non-resident, the entire group will be processed during non-resident registration (if space is available)

Note: All "Buddy Link" Requests:

◆ If you request a buddy link and "the buddy" does not register by lottery deadline, you will be waitlisted for the class.

Proof of Date of Birth

- Proof of date of birth for all children is required at their first registration.
- If the child's name does not match the parent who is presenting proof of residency, proof of residency will be required for the child at their "first" registration.




