
Recycling Success

Thank you to everyone who participates in the City of Oak Creek's bi-weekly curbside recycling collection program. Your efforts and those of your neighbors have resulted in nearly 22% of Oak Creek's household waste stream from being taken to a landfill. In addition, all branches and leaves are being recycled.

These local sustainability efforts have helped support industry, created jobs, reduced pollution, and eliminated the charges



which would have been incurred by dumping the materials into a landfill! The graph below shows the volumes of household waste, yard waste, and recycled materials for the last three (3) years. Keep up the good work and include even more recycling in your New Year's pledge for 2012.



In late 2011 the City contracted with Cobalt Community Research to conduct a random sample survey of Oak Creek residents to gauge opinions on a variety of topics including City services, budgeting priorities, and the future of City Hall and the Library. The goals of the study were to aid the City in budgeting and strategic planning decisions, measure performance and compare it statewide, regionally, and nationally, and to determine residents opinions on which City services have priority when making tough budget choices.

The survey was developed from a random sample of 1,500 residents taken from voter records. There were two survey mailings to increase the rate of response. These were sent out in November and December 2011. There was a response rate 35 percent (533 surveys returned) resulting in a 95 percent confidence rate and a +/- 4.2 margin of error.

The city fared well when compared with other surveys both in Wisconsin and nationwide. Our overall Community Satisfaction Index (ASCI) score was 68. In general most City services and programs had very solid scores but residents

MAYOR - AL FOECKLER

Embrace Oak Creek



I was appointed the Mayor of Oak Creek under the most unfortunate circumstance. Mayor Dick Bolender's unexpected death was and continues to

be a great loss to our City. In the wake of this great loss, I was truly honored that the Common Council chose to appoint me to fill Mayor Bolender's term. In filling out his term, my goal was to find a balance between not rocking the proverbial boat while continuing to move the boat forward. Clearly, the boat has moved forward during my short time in office but, I have to admit, this did not come without the boat rocking a bit.

My decision to break the tie vote of the Common Council to move City Hall and the library to anchor a mixed-use urban development at the Delphi site to some rocked the boat. However, I am confident that this decision was the right decision — both from a financial point of view as well as a community/development point of view. As such, I ask that as this project moves forward you embrace this amazing opportunity.

From a financial point of view, it is important to understand that last year the Council adopted a plan to construct a new city hall and library without using any new tax dollars. They did this by using the money the community receives from hosting the WE Energies power plant to build these civic buildings, among other projects. In other words, these civic buildings will be built without your property taxes increasing one dollar.

Equally important from a financial point of view is to recognize that by choosing to relocate the City Hall and library to the Delphi site, the money to build the new civic buildings will not only be spent on construction costs but will also be an investment in the financial future of our City. The new location of City Hall and the library will anchor a mixed-use downtown development. As a result, the antic-

ipated tax base growth of \$38 million at the site for traditional development seen on Howell is expected to grow to over \$189 million by developing a dense mixed-use downtown area. Further, by swapping lands with the School District, the Oak View Business Park at Howell and Oakwood will move forward. This development is projected to bring 1,400 to 1,500 jobs to Oak Creek and generate \$63.6 million in tax base. Finally, by the School District taking possession of the corner of Howell and Puetz, the taxpayers will not be faced with a referendum decision to build another high school campus that would costs tens of millions of dollars. Instead, the School District can roll out expansion of the high school at the current site as needed for significantly less money. This domino effect demonstrates that by simply moving the location of civic buildings already planned to be rebuilt, the City took the opportunity to not only construct new buildings but also invest that money to create significant tax base and jobs.

From a community/development point of view, a mixed-use downtown development anchored by City Hall and the library is truly exciting. The vision for this development abandons the traditional development on Howell in which you park your car, go a store, get back in your car and go to the next big parking lot and building. The vision at the Delphi site is to develop a pedestrian-friendly downtown similar to Bayshore. You park your car and walk around. With \$4 a gallon gas this should be welcomed. Envision taking your child or grandchild to a pediatrician's office on the second floor of a multi-story building and then walking to the library afterwards to pick out some children's books. Or maybe you drop the kids off at the library for an activity and then walk over to an on-site fitness center for a work-out. While walking back to get the kids you stop and get a cup a coffee. Another night you come back for a family concert at the civic square, walk to a few stores, and then get dinner at one of the many different "downtown" restaurants. It is easy to see that if done correctly this mixed-use concept will create a sense of place in Oak Creek

Again, I hope you embrace this opportunity and let the next Mayor and Common Council know that you expect them to remain committed to this mixed-use downtown development in Oak Creek so we can generate significant tax base and jobs as well as build a great community gathering space.

I truly thank you for the opportunity to serve my community.

Embrace Oak Creek.



Abendschein Community Park: Phase 2

Late this summer, Phase 2 development of Abendschein Park will begin. Phase 2 is located in the northwestern portion of the park located at 1311 E. Drexel Avenue. Development includes the creation of a retention pond, parking lot, concession/restroom building, two pedestrian bridges crossing the Oak Creek and its tributary, and walking/bike trails. A portion of the costs for this phase is being funded through Wisconsin DNR grants. It is anticipated that Phase 2 will be completed by the end of October 2012. Immunization Clinic Updates

All City offices are closed on July 4 (immunization clinic day). We are adding an afternoon clinic on Thursday, July 19, 2012, from 2-5 PM. Please call to make an appointment.

School Immunization walk-in clinics targeting children in 6th thru 12th grades only, who may need the Tdap and 2nd dose of varicella, will be held on Tuesday, August 7th from 9-11 am and 1-3pm and on Wednesday, August 8th from 9-11 am and 1-6:30 pm. Please bring your child's records with you.

Hepatitis B- IF YOU OR SOMEONE YOU LOVE IS DIABETIC ... This information is for you. On October 25, 2011, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommended that all previously unvaccinated adults aged 19 through 59 years with diabetes mellitus (type 1 and type 2) be vaccinated against hepatitis B as soon as possible after a diagnosis of diabetes is made. Unvaccinated adults aged ≥60 years with diabetes may be vaccinated at the discretion of the treating clinician after assessing their risk and the likelihood of an adequate immune response to vaccination. The Health Department has Hepatitis B vaccine available for a low administration fee of \$10 for eligible adults, or contact your health care professional for more information.

Public Health Preparedness - What is a POD?

In cooperation with federal, state and local officials, the Oak Creek Health Department has plans to obtain needed vaccines, medication, and medical supplies in the event of a declared emergency. Local officials will open designated *points of dispensing* or **PODs**. PODs can be set up quickly to distribute free medication to all residents. The community will be notified about POD openings via the TV, radio, newspapers, the Internet, fliers or street signage. Specific instructions about what to bring and directions will be in the emergency message.

If a disaster strikes learn how to protect your family. Consider joining a Community Emergency Response Team.

MAKE A PLAN BUILD A KIT BE INFORMED

Do you have a Go-Kit? Please continue to update or start your personal preparedness go-kit in the event of a local emergency. If the power goes out, have flashlights and other items ready. To learn about emergency preparedness - go to our website at

Mosquito Bite Prevention Tips

- * Wear long pants and shirts with long sleeves.
- * Limit outdoor activities after dusk.



- * Eliminate standing water in your yard when possible. Change water in wading pools every 3-4 days.
- * Use a mosquito repellant following the manufacturer's directions on the product label.
- * If you are concerned about using repellent products on children you may wish to consult a health care provider for advice or contact the National Pesticide Information Center (NPIC) through their toll-free number, 1-800-858-7378 or http://npic.orst.edu.

Some mosquitoes transmit diseases such as West Nile Virus. The City will be applying larvacide to sewer catch basins that contain mosquito larvae.

Fire Department Training

Safe Grilling

There is nothing better than a barbecue on a warm summer night. The Oak Creek Fire Department would like to make sure that residents keep safety in mind when they fire up their grills.

Gas Grill Safety Tips

- 1. Check grill hoses for cracking, brittleness, holes, and leaks. Make sure there are no sharp bends in the hose or tubing.
- 2. Move gas hoses as far away as possible from hot surfaces and dripping hot grease.
- 3. Always keep propane gas containers upright.
- 4. Never store a spare gas container under or near the grill or indoors.
- 5. Never store or use flammable liquids, like gasoline, near the grill.
- 6. Never keep a filled container in a hot car or car trunk. Heat will cause the gas pressure to increase, which may open the relief valve and allow gas to escape.

Charcoal Grill Safety Tips

- 1. Never burn charcoal inside of homes, vehicles, tents, or campers.
- 2. Charcoal should never be used indoors, even if ventilation is provided.
- 3. Since charcoal produces
 CO fumes until the charcoal is completely extinguished, do not store the grill indoors with freshly used coals.
- 4. Allow charcoal and ashes to completely cool prior to disposal

Fire Safety While on Vacation

Vacations are a time to relax and have fun. Please follow these hotel safety tips to keep your family safe:

- -Take some time to familiarize yourself with the hotel fire escape plans located on the back of the hotel room door.
- -Locate the two exits nearest to your room.
- -Count the number of doors between your room and the exits.

If the hotel does have a fire:

- -Check the hallway for fire by touching the door with the back of your hand to test the temperature. If the door is cool, get low to the floor, brace your shoulder against the door and open it slowly. Be ready to close it quickly if there are flames on the other side.
- -Crawl low in the smoke to the nearest exit; the freshest air is near the floor.
- If your room door is hot, do not open it. Instead, seal the door with wet towels or sheets. Turn off the fans and air conditioners. Call the fire department to give your location. Signal from your window.
- -Always use a stairwell, never an elevator. The elevator could stop at the floor of the fire.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Often the Fire Department receives a call for a carbon monoxide detector that is sounding. Carbon monoxide, an odorless, colorless gas, is a byproduct of the combustion of fossil fuels. When appliances such as furnaces, water heaters, dryers and stoves malfunction or are improperly vented, a buildup of carbon monoxide gas can occur. As this gas builds up in a home, occupants may experience headaches, nausea, dizziness, fatigue and confusion. At higher levels, carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms include vomiting, loss of consciousness, and even death. On occasion, the carbon monoxide detector is found to be defective. This can occur for any number of reasons. Test your carbon monoxide detector once a month and replace the batteries twice a year. Manufacturers recommend replacement of carbon monoxide detectors every 5-7 years.

It may seem like a simple

task, but in the event of an emergency, dial 911 to reach fire, rescue and emergency medical services. Time is of the utmost importance in the event of an emergency and every second counts. For example, fires double in size every minute. Fires that start out small can easily grow to engulf entire buildings. Serious medical conditions like a heart attack, stroke, or traumatic injury require immediate attention by medical personnel. The Oak Creek Fire Department provides not only fire suppression, but also Paramedic level emergency medical care. With three stations strategically located throughout the city, the Fire Department is only minutes

Did you know?

A firefighter's turnout gear weighs approximately 50 pounds. That includes the pants, coat, helmet, utility belt, protective hood and boots.

Firefighters then wear self con-

tained breathing apparatus (SCBA) that weighs an additional 25 pounds. Each firefighter also carries various tools that add even more weight.

WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

• With the warm weather comes more ac-

tivities outside. There are more car windows down and gatherings at residences. Please be courteous of your neighbors with regard to loud noise and music levels. The Oak Creek

Police Department responds to complaints at all times of the day, but the main hours of enforcement for loud noise/music (per City Ordinance) is between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. The Noise Ordinance also designates that lawn care equipment cannot be operated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

- Rummage sale, garage sale, advertising or other such signs cannot be placed on streets, sidewalks or other public right-of-ways, nor can they be attached to public utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be removed by police personnel.
- City Ordinance prohibits the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks, except paper caps, snakes and sparklers. However, keep in mind that sparklers can get as

SUMMERTIME HOME SECURITY

The Oak Creek Police Department would like to remind homeowners of a few simple tips to protect your home during this ever-popular "vacation" time of year:

• Residents can request a "vacation watch" of their home by the Oak Creek Police Department. Prior to leaving for vacation, contact the Department at 762-8200 (press "0" for Dispatch) and provide the dispatcher with information (i.e., your departure/return date, whether lights will be left on and when, if vehicles will be left in the driveway, any designated keyholders, etc.). Our Police Aides will conduct periodic checks of your home

periodic checks of your home while you are gone.
• Do not allow daily deliveries of

mail, newspapers, or flyers to build up while you are away.

Arrange for a friend or neighbor

to pick up these items or stop your mail at the post office.

- Give your house a lived-in appearance. Put automatic timers on several lights, a radio, and a television. Set the timers so that the lights and appliances will turn on and off at random times.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period of time.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuables, including a description of the items, date of purchase, original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home. Etch personal identification codes on your valuables with an engraving tool. You can also make a photographic or video record of items in your home.

CONCERNED PARENTS PROGRAM

Did you know that you are responsible and can be held civilly liable for any underage person that



is at your residence consuming alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs—even if you are on vacation and unaware of the party? Police officers are concerned for the safety of all of our residents, and it is often better to confront an underage drinking party before something of a serious nature occurs, such as a car accident.

With the Concerned Parents Program, residents fill out a consent form and leave a key to their residence with the Police Department which will be held until their return. The signed consent form gives officers permission to enter their home during their absence, upon receipt of a complaint from a citizen or neighbor, in order to investigate suspected illegal activity such as underage drinking or drug use. An underage person cannot deny police officers' entry into your residence once you have given this consent. To register for this program, stop at the Oak Creek Police Department during normal business hours.

Attract Butterflies to Your Yard

Would you like to attract colorful butterflies and even hummingbirds to your yard? You can attract them with a beautiful, and functional, garden of a type

known as a rain garden. Rain gardens use a porous soil with flowering or decorative grass plantings to catch, and then absorb, rainwater. This



allows more rain to soak into the soil, helping to replenish our groundwater and minimize surface runoff. Rain gardens may also be useful in areas of sump pump discharge, or particularly wet areas of lawn.

Many beautiful varieties of flowering plants used in traditional gardens can be used in rain gardens. Colorful purple coneflowers attract butterflies, and red cardinal flower can attract hummingbirds. Other attractive plants include wild bergamot and various types of ferns and decorative reeds and grasses.

Before planning a rain garden, please check first with the Engineering department. In some areas of the City, home-

owners are required to connect the sump pump drain directly to the storm sewer. In other areas, the homeowners are required to connect their downspouts, as well as their sump pumps, directly to the storm sewer. A homeowner should not eliminate

these connections to install a rain garden. However, those homes without direct connections might want to consider a rain garden.

Find more information about rain gardens and other ways to green up your yard at www.rootpikewin.org. Grants for installation of a rain garden may be available, as well as other resources for home owners and home owner associations. They also conduct "Greener Yards, Cleaner Waters" workshops which focus on a variety of actions home owners can take in their yards to improve the quality of water in our lakes and streams. Please visit their website for more information.

Want to save money on yard care?

One way to save money is to reduce the amount of fertilizer used. Mulching your grass clippings in place can provide many nutrients and replenish the soil on which your lawn grows. Replenishing nutrients in the soil in this way can greatly reduce the amount of additional fertilizer you need to apply to keep your lawn looking good.

In addition to cost savings, reducing fertilizer application can also help reduce the amount of green algae in the lakes and streams nearby. If you haven't already, this summer may be a good time to reevaluate your lawn care routine, and see if you can reduce chemical fertilizer applications. Affordable home soil test kits are available at most local garden centers for less than the cost of a bag of fertilizer. These test kits can give you information on the amount of nitrogen already in your lawn soil, and usually include recommendations on how much fertilizer is necessary based on your test results. Spring Clean-Up Begins May 15

The Street Department will conduct spring clean up beginning on Monday, May 15. There is **NO CHARGE** for this pick-up (except for freon appliances). Items that will be picked up are as follows:

- •Yard Waste excluding leaves, grass and branches
- Appliances (Freon appliancesrefrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, air conditioners & water coolers, require a \$15 pre-payment for pick-up).
- Construction Materials NOT resulting from a contractor
- Metal
- Mattresses
- Televisions
- · Carpeting/Rugs
- Furniture
- Wood

Items that will not be picked up are:

- Paints
- Tires
- Batteries
- Leaves
- Hazardous Material Branches
- Grass Clippings
- Fluorescent Tubes

Residents are required to have their items at the curb or roadside by 6:45 a.m. on Monday, May 15th in order to be guaranteed a pick up. Once we pass through your neighborhood, we will not return for additional no charge pick-ups until the fall clean-up on November 15th. See Special Pick-Up section for information on how to make arrangements for a prepaid special pick-up for other times of the year or if you should miss the Spring Clean-Up date.

Special Pick Ups

In addition to the fall & spring clean-ups that are provided at NO CHARGE, the City of Oak Creek provides special pick-ups for residents for a fee of \$25 for the following:

- Appliances (\$15 additional fee will be charged for freon appliances i.e. refrigerators, freezers, dehumidfiers, air conditioners & water coolers)
- Furniture
- Mattresses
- Carpeting/Padding Televisions
- · Metals of any kind

Special pick-ups are done on Friday mornings **ONLY**. Items for pick up must be at the road by 6:45 a.m. on the scheduled Friday. Residents requesting special pick-ups must prepay the fees due by noon, the Thursday prior, in order to be put on that Friday's pick up schedule.

Please note that special pick ups will not be

done for the following items:

- Branches
- Yard Waste
- Recyclables
- Tires
- Contractor generated materials
- · Hazardous Waste · Concrete

Branch Pick-Up Dates

Branches will be picked up beginning on the following dates:



June 1st August 1st October 1st

To guarantee that your branches are picked up, you must have them at the roadside BY the dates listed above, but no earlier than 2 weeks prior. Once we pass through your neighborhood, we will not be back until the next date listed.

Branches are to be stacked neatly with the cut ends facing the road. Roots should be separate from the brush pile. The Street Department WILL NOT pickup brush that is the result of a contractor doing work on your property. It is their responsibility to dispose of the brush properly.

Branches may also be brought to the recycling yard, any time of the year, at 720 W. Puetz Road.

Mulch

Generally, from mid-April through mid-November, mulch is often available for free pick-up at the recycling yard. Residents may call the Street Department at 570-5682 to check availability and/or to be put on a list to have mulch delivered to their homes for a fee of \$25 per load (3-4 vards).

Basketball Standards

There has been an ongoing problem with residents placing basketball standards in the right-of-way (Terrace Area). This area is defined as that area between the curb and the sidewalk, and where no sidewalk exists, that area between the street pavement and the right-of-way/property line.

Section 6.25 Terrace Areas, Section (d) of the Municipal Code states: "No structures or fixtures shall be placed in the terrace area. Examples of prohibited items would be basketball backstops, statuary, flagpoles and other objects. The exception to this

subsection is the installation of a mailbox as specified by the U.S. Postal Service."

Impacts of Emerald Ash Borer on the Urban Tree Canopy-2012 Trees in 2012

When we think of the urban tree canopy it helps to picture an aerial view of the City that includes all trees and green spaces collectively. Google Earth or Bing maps can provide such views online. A longterm goal of City Forestry is to grow the green canopy cover which is the percent of green space vs. un-shaded areas such as asphalt, concrete, roofs, etc.

Street tree planting is our best strategy to turn un-shaded areas into green space. It's pretty simple: as the tree crowns grow and widen, they expand to shade roadways. Try to envision the City of Milwaukee without their big, beautiful canopy of street and boulevard trees. Anyone flying into Milwaukee in the summertime cannot help but notice the tree canopy.

An urban tree canopy is a functioning system of its own, busy in multiple ways making positive contributions to the space it occupies - and beyond what we generally think of. Some of the major contributions of the local urban canopy are:

- 1. Storm water management absorbs and cleans water and helps reduce flooding
- 2. Maintain real estate values trees add to property value & enrich the community
- 3. Save heating, cooling and related costs
- 4. Promotes wellbeing and a positive human psychology (an article unto itself)
- 5. Provides bird and other wildlife habitat

Further out, the local urban forest contributes to benefits of the regional forest canopy which in turn contributes benefits nationally and internationally. These impacts include:

- 1. Decreased heat islands directly and indirectly moderating temperatures
- 2. Carbon sequestering
- 3. Climate change buffering

These kinds of benefits are enjoyed locally yet are far reaching. Read about the Polar Bear Forest at:

http://dnr.wi.gov/forestry/polarbear/Links.htm (how planting trees in the lower states can impact the habitat of the polar bear in the Arctic).

On average, urban tree canopies in the Midwest



are composed of 20 percent ash trees! Oak Creek's street tree ash total is finally under 1,000 trees (just below ten percent of the total street tree population). As an urban-to-rural community with many

wet woodlots, the largest canopy losses for Oak Creek will be the wet, rural woodlands.

Success is often measured in the sum of many parts. Wise investors realize that incoming pennies add up to real dollars. Saving water household-by-household makes an enormous impact on water consumption. Planting trees, tree-by-tree and lot-by-lot, really does make a difference, even internationally.

The emerald ash borer (EAB) infestation has begun to explode around the City of Oak Creek and we have a major challenge ahead of us. We have already lost a full USGS Section (or full square mile) of ash trees to EAB and we need to work together to re-grow lost tree canopy.

We have set an ambitious goal for us to work on – together: to plant more than 2,012 trees in 2012. City Forestry will lead the way by planting more than 600 street trees (new and replacement) this year. Call or email City Forestry and we will map your new trees in our inventory system. We will publish the numbers (and the map, if possible) in next spring's Acorn issue. Any residence or business is welcome to participate; renters, owners, landscapers; anyone planting trees in Oak Creek.

You might start by attending our spring planting workshop where we will demonstrate proper tree selection and planting and give out a free seedling.

Fair Housing if Your Right

Seeking housing is never an easy task. For many Milwaukee County residents, illegal discrimination makes finding & keeping housing much more difficult than it should be. Housing discrimination is common, yet most people remain unaware of its prevalence. Equal housing opportunity – the idea that all people should have equal access to all the housing they can afford – is still an elusive dream for our community.

Fair housing laws make it illegal for housing providers (landlords, real estate agents, apartment managers, etc.) to discriminate based on any of the following categories:

- * Race
- * Sex
- * Color
- * National origin/Ancestry
 - * Age
- * Disability
- * Religion
- * Family status (household composition, including presence of children)
- * Sexual orientation
- * Marital status * Lawful source of income

Housing discrimination appears in many different forms. Sometimes housing providers discriminate overtly by making statements to applicants such as "we only rent to working people," "no kids allowed," or "we don't rent to single moms."

Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council

In this day and age, however, housing discrimination is often subtle & difficult to detect. Sometimes people leave an interaction with a housing provider not knowing that they were treated differently than other people because of their race, because they have kids or because they have a disability.

The following are some possible "red flags" that may indicate illegal discrimination:

- * You called about an apartment for rent. You were told that it has been rented, but you continue to see that apartment advertised in the newspaper or with a "for rent" sign.
- * You ask to make an appointment to see an apartment, & the landlord tells you that you must bring your entire family along
- * A landlord or apartment manager gives you confusing or contradictory information.
- * You are told of extremely long waiting lists.
- * You are told that you don't meet a housing provider's eligibility criteria, but the provider won't tell you what the eligibility requirements are.
- * A landlord, rental manager, or real estate agent doesn't return your phone calls.
- * Your lease is non-renewed for no apparent reason.

* Your landlord refuses to allow you to make modifications to your apartment to make it physically accessible for you.

If you're concerned that you may have experienced a violation of fair housing law, there are ways to address the problem. Victims of housing discrimination have the right to pursue complaints in public administrative agencies, such as the Wisconsin Equal Rights Division. People with housing discrimination complaints may also file lawsuits in state or federal court.

If you have any questions regarding housing discrimination, fair housing laws and what your options may be for pursuing a complaint of housing discrimination, call the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council at 278-

services, including:

- * Counseling for persons alleging housing discrimination
- * Investigations on behalf of victims of housing discrimination



* Assistance in filing fair housing complaints with an administrative agency or in a court of law

In addition, the Fair Housing Council provides educational presentations to neighborhood groups, civic and religious organizations, social service agencies, community centers and other groups that are interested in learning more about fair housing law and housing discrimination. responses varied when asked what services and programs were priorities. Few residents supported complete elimination of services, preferring other alternatives such as reductions in service, user fees, or consolidating services with neighboring communities.

FOR RECYCLING CART REPAIRS



Recycling Yard Information

Any residence that receives an individual property tax bill and has City pickup of garbage may use the recycling yard. Occupants of condos or trailer parks that



have private garbage pickup may use the recycling yard for disposal of yard waste ONLY with the exception of grass clippings, which are not accepted.

The recycling yard hours are:

Tuesdays, Fridays & Saturdays 8 am to 3 pm

In addition to the regular hours, the yard is open:

Tuesday evenings ONLY until 8 p.m.

starting the first Tuesday in April through the last Tuesday in September.

NO items may exceed 4' in length except for branches, furniture, appliances & metals.

NO contractor vehicles will be allowed in to the yard.

The yard does **NOT** accept shingles, roofing materials, grass, gas, medical or hazardous waste, paints or vehicle salvage.

All freon appliances (refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, air conditioners & water coolers) brought to the recycling yard will be charged a \$15 per unit fee. Doors need to be removed from refrigerators & freezers.

Tires brought to the recycling yard should be free of rims. A fee of \$3 per tire will be charged.

Fall Elections

The Fall Partisan Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, August 14, 2012, and the Fall General and Presidential Election will be held Tuesday, November 6, 2012.

PLEASE REGISTER EARLY TO VOTE!

Due to the expected large voter turnout at these elections, those residents not currently registered are encouraged to register early to vote. A qualified elector must be at least 18 years of age, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the City for at least 28 days prior to registering to vote. You must present a form of ID showing proof of residence. A Wisconsin driver's license or Wisconsin ID is preferred.

OFFICIAL NOTICE CITY OF OAK CREEK **Noxious Weed Ordinance**

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT:

- In addition to the weeds mentioned to be noxious under s. 66.0407(b), Wisconsin (a) Statutes, the following weeds are also declared to be noxious weeds within the boundaries of the City of Oak Creek: Bull Thistle, Wild Carrot, Sour Dock, Wild Mustard, Chickory, Poison Oak, Poison Ivy, Sow Thistle, Burdock.
- Except as provided in sub. (c), all weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which (b) have buildings on more than 50% of the lots in the subdivision, in multi-family apartments and complexes, planned developments and mobile home districts shall be cut to and maintained at a height not to exceed six (6) inches. All weeds and grass in platted subdivisions which have buildings on 50% or less of the lots or which are not located in platted subdivisions and all weeds and grasses in business and manufacturing zoning districts shall be cut to a height not to exceed one foot (12 inches).
 - The City may cause all weeds, grass and brush to be cut and removed, in accordance with this subsection and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property owner pursuant to Section 66.0627 Wis. Stats.
- The provisions for destruction of noxious weeds and cutting of all weeds and (c) grass as provided above shall not apply to areas which are designated by the Common Council as nature centers or wildlife preserves.

FINE PRINT: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Is She/He Old Enough?

For all programs, age requirements will be as of the date of the first class, unless otherwise specified. Please do not request to have your child put in a class he/she does not belong in. All age requirements are set to benefit the children and make instruction more consistent for the program leader.

In some instances, the requirements have been set for the child's safety.

How old are you?

How Much Is It?

Fees and charges are assessed according to the cost of the program. The Department does not want to exclude children who are unable to pay fees due to financial hardship. Resident families unable to pay all or part of the fees should contact the office.

Need To Transfer?

Transfers will be made at no charge.

Need A Refund?

Refunds will be made upon request up until 1/3 of the scheduled classes have been held (i.e. 3 classes of a 10 week session) except as noted in individual class descriptions. You may expect your refund check 2 to 4 weeks after your request is received.

A \$3 service fee will be charged on each refund initiated by the participant.

Open House

You are welcome to discuss your child's progress after each class and attend the open house held during the final class session.

Makeups?

Classes missed for individual absences (i.e. illness, vacations, etc.) are not "made up" nor may participants attend classes other than the one they are registered for.

Activities cancelled by the Department will be rescheduled, if possible. If a class is unable to be rescheduled, no refunds will be issued.

Can I Watch?

In an effort to avoid distractions and interruptions in instruction, for your child to have recreation time with his/her peers, and for adults to have time in an adult-only atmosphere, relatives, friends and/or other children are not permitted in classrooms or the pool during instruction.

Have A Concern?

If a class does not meet your expectations, please contact the Oak Creek Recreation Department at **768-6515** to discuss your concerns.

Do You Have Insurance?

Insurance coverage for program participants is not provided by the Department or by the School District for Department sponsored activities.

Am I A Resident?

The resident fee applies to any person whose primary residence is within the Oak Creek city limits at the time of registration and children in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District.

NEW Current proof of residency is required only at your first registration. Proof of school attendance is required each school year. See page 42 for details.

What If?

My child wants to be on the same team or in a class with a friend or sibling.

Siblings who meet the requirements for the same class section or sports league will be placed together unless otherwise requested in writing by the parent or guardian. All other requests for unrelated children to be placed together:

- ♦ are not guaranteed
- will be for a maximum of 3 persons
- ◆ may result in the entire group being placed on the waiting list
- must be in writing and signed by parents/guardians of both children
- ♦ if you register online, you must link siblings on WebTrac I want to register with my adult friend:
- ◆ If one person is placed on the wait list, the entire group will be placed on the wait list
- ◆ If one person is a non-resident, the entire group will be processed during non-resident registration (if space is available)

Note: All "Buddy Link" Requests:

◆ If you request a buddy link and "the buddy" does not register by lottery deadline, you will be wait listed for the class.

Proof of Date of Birth

- ◆ Proof of date of birth for all children is required at their first registration.
- ◆ If the child's name does not match the parent who is presenting proof of residency, proof of residency in the child's name will be required at their first registration.
