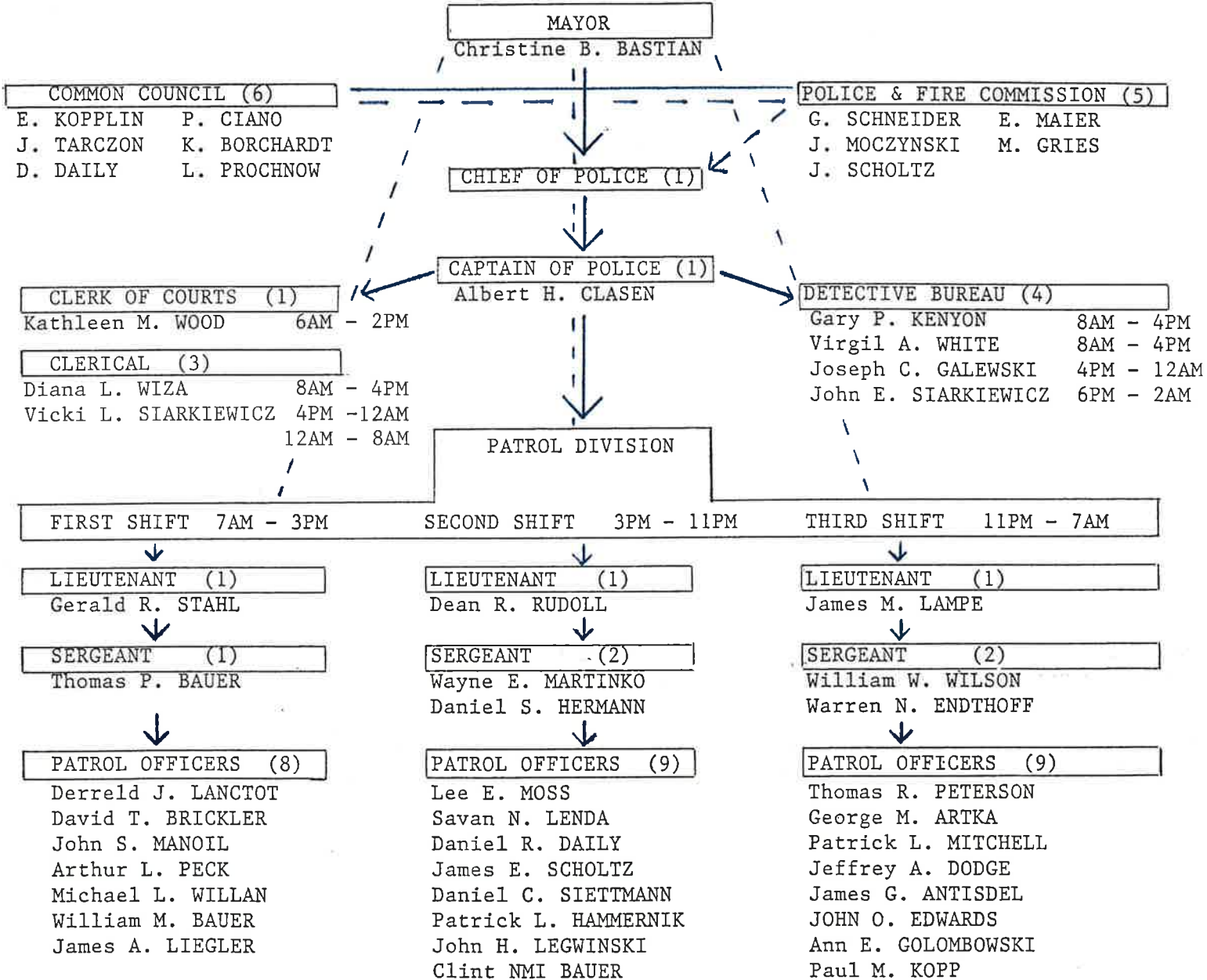

CRIME PREVENTION UNIT

Crime Prevention is a science that can be defined as the anticipation, the recognition, and the appraisal of a crime risk and the initiation of action to reduce or remove the risk.

The goal of the Crime Prevention Unit is to open a line of communications between the Police Department and the citizens of Oak Creek. This in turn will increase their awareness of personal safety to assist them in making their homes, personal property and neighborhoods a safer place to live.

The Oak Creek Police Department currently has four members assigned to the Crime Prevention Unit, one sergeant and three patrol officers. The Crime Prevention Unit has a annual budget of one thousand dollars. The budget provides for crime prevention pamphlets, drug awareness materials, crime prevention/drug awareness video tapes, and displays. Included in the displays are such things as locks, windows, lighting, etc., which are updated when safer or improved items are marketed.

During 1989 the Crime Prevention Unit gave numerous crime prevention talks/presentations to a variety of civic groups throughout the city. The Unit assisted in setting up Neighborhood Watch Programs as requested. The Unit also did periodic security surveys for banks and savings and loans. These security surveys are also available to all city businesses and residences. When it becomes apparent through reports and statistics that there is a pattern of increase in crime by location, type of business, etc., the Crime Prevention Unit will make contact with these people to alert them of the increase. The unit will then offer suggestions on how to better target harden their properties and assist in the apprehension of criminals.

It should also be noted that during 1989 the Crime Prevention Unit all with various other Units of the Oak Creek Police Department were awarded first place for their displays at the Oak Creek Business Fair.

OAK CREEK POLICE AUXILIARY

The Oak Creek Auxiliary Police Unit was established circa 1969, as part of the Oak Creek Police Department Civil Defense Unit. It is comprised of city volunteers and the only cost attributed to the unit is for uniforms.

The Oak Creek Auxiliaries meet the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00PM. The meetings normally are for discussion of coming events and staffing of these events by the unit members.

The impact of Auxiliary/Citizen participation generates a team relationship between citizens and police, whose benefits cannot be purchased through the budgetary process. The areas of impact outlined below should be very evident.

During the past year, the unit has provided services at the following functions: Municipal Court, High School sporting events, 4th of July Parade and Program, Lions Festival and Oak Creek Community Rummage & Auction. In addition to this, they provided traffic control for the Triathlon and were active at the Chamber of Commerce Business Fair.

The Unit, from its inception, has provided excellent assistance to the Police Department and has become a well organized unit, donating over 2,000 hours a year for community service. The hours donated represent approximately one patrolman's wages for a year.

BUREAU OF IDENTIFICATION

The Bureau of Identification is responsible for the processing of all fingerprint cards generated by the Oak Creek Police Department, as well as the overall maintenance of the fingerprint files.

During 1989 the Bureau of Identification files increased in size by 1,226 subjects, increasing the overall number of fingerprint cards on file with the Bureau of Identification to 11,487.

Of the 1,226 new entries 1,032 of them are of individuals arrested by the Oak Creek Police Department for various offenses ranging from minor ordinance, traffic and statute violations to serious felony offenses.

In addition 194 fingerprint cards were processed by the Bureau of Identification for non-criminal reasons, which include City licensing, record checks and personal identification.

The Bureau of Identification is also responsible for providing personal identification fingerprinting programs. These programs, which are provided free of charge, are primarily targeted at young children. The children are fingerprinted on a personal identification fingerprint card, which is then retained by the child's parents. Through this program, which began in 1982, the Bureau of Identification has been able to fingerprint hundreds of children.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Oak Creek Police Department, Drug Enforcement Unit consists of a Captain, a Detective, three Sergeants and five Patrol Officers. All of the officers are assigned their regular duties as well as Drug Enforcement.

In 1988, the Drug Enforcement Unit accounted for eight felony arrests for Delivery of Controlled Substance, eighteen State arrests for Possession of Controlled Substance and one hundred City arrests for Possession of Controlled Substance.

In 1989 the Drug Enforcement Unit accounted for five Felony Arrests of Delivery of Controlled Substance, nineteen State cases for Possession of Controlled Substance and one hundred sixty one City arrests for Possession on Controlled Substance.

In addition to the arrests made, numerous informants were developed and in turn cooperated with other Law Enforcement Agencies (Milwaukee County Sheriffs Department, Waukesha County Sheriffs Department, Racine Sheriffs Department) which enabled those agencies to make narcotic arrests and enabled the Oak Creek Police Department to participate in Federal Forfeiture Sharing in 1989.

Also in 1989, the Drug Enforcement Unit received seventy reports of Possession on Controlled Substance, twenty nine reports of Sale or Delivery of Controlled Substance, and thirty eight reports of other drug activity.

So far, in the first quarter of 1990, the Drug Enforcement Unit has accounted for six felony arrests for Delivery of Controlled Substance, which have led to future Federal Forfeiture Sharing and Seizures.

In addition to the aforementioned duties, the Oak Creek Police Department Drug Enforcement Unit has been actively involved in training the Drug Enforcement Units for other departments, such as the South Milwaukee Police Department and the Milwaukee Road railroad Police.

OAK CREEK POLICE EXPLORER POST 864

The Oak Creek Police Explorer Post is a division of the Boy Scouts of America and is chartered by the Oak Creek Police Department. Explorer Posts are established to introduce young people to a certain career, which they may want to pursue as an adult. Post 864 currently has a membership of thirty (30) boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 21.

During the course of the year the Explorers are instructed by members of the Oak Creek Police Department on topics such as crime scene investigation, fingerprinting, traffic stops and handgun shooting competition. The Explorers also have on occasion invited guest speakers from other law enforcement agencies.

The Explorers attend a three day seminar for law enforcement Explorers at the State Patrol Training Academy located at Fort McCoy. This proves to be very educational and is very well received by members of the Post.

The Explorers are involved in many activities during the course of the year. These activities range from civic celebrations to working a fair or festival for which the post is compensated. This is necessary because the Post is self supporting and receives no money from the Oak Creek Police Department. Money is spent on uniforms, equipment, education and recreation.

This is a breakdown of activities conducted by the Explorer post during 1989. Only 4 events were money generating activities.

PHOTOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT

The Photography Department consists of the following equipment:

35 mm Cameras

During 1989 the Photography Department developed and printed 2351 crime scene photos, including accident scenes; 1222 mug shot photos and 225 Polaroid photos, to include keeping a file on each. The Photography Department also generated approximately \$700 worth of revenue for the City by reprinting photos for insurance companies and other outside agencies. All black and white photos are done "in house" and all color photos are developed and printed at Family Photo 6508 S. 27th St. Oak Creek, Wi..

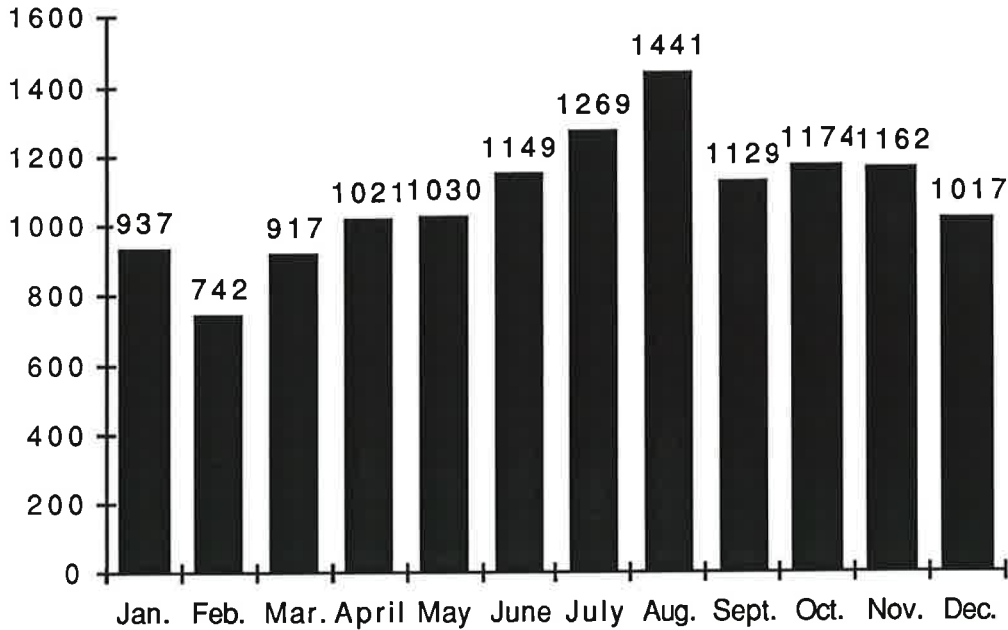
All of the cameras, with the exception of the video camera, can be operated by all of the officers and they receive training on the operation of those cameras. Most of the training is conducted by officers at the department, however during 1989 six officers received training from the FBI concerning Police Photography.

The Department is looking into the use of surveillance cameras for the cellblock and with the revamping of the dispatch area, the entryway to the Police Department. We hope to have these cameras in place in the early part of 1990. The video camera is in need of a useful light for night photography and a better telephoto lens for surveillance use. We are still looking at prices to convert the black and white lab over to color and are looking into a mini lab and the other assorted equipment needed. The new mug shot system is in place and continually being upgraded.

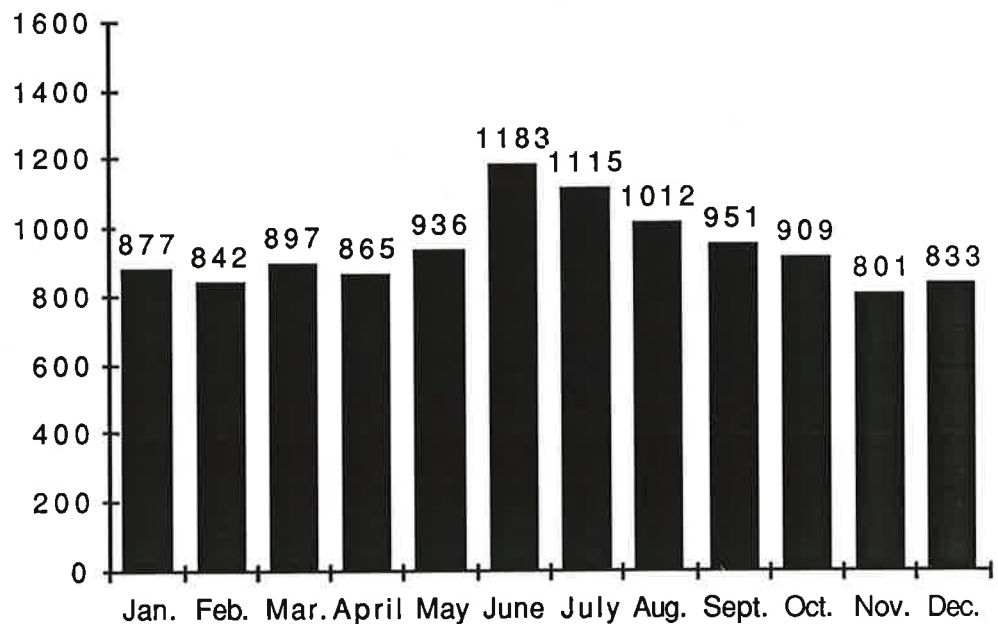

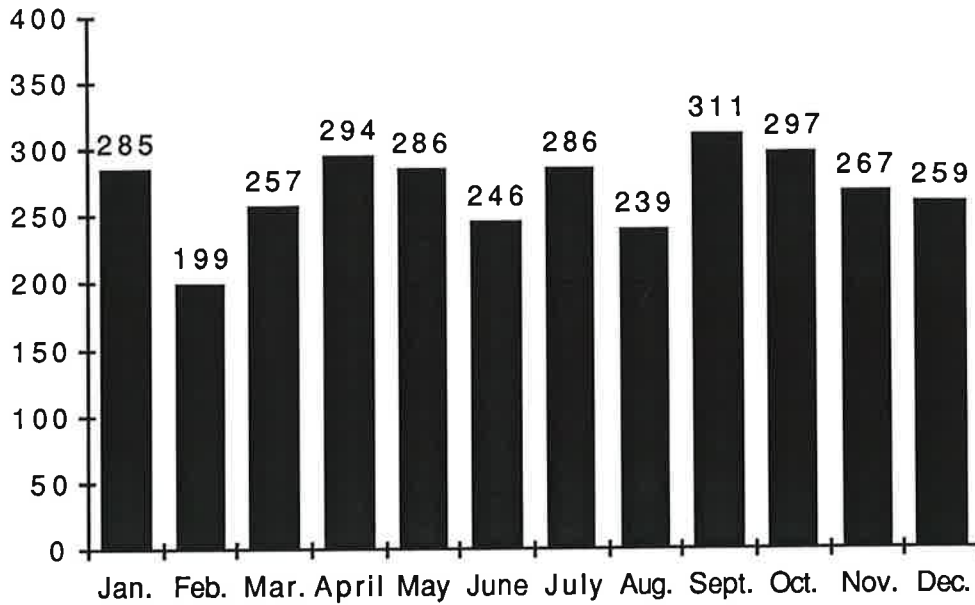

ARRESTS

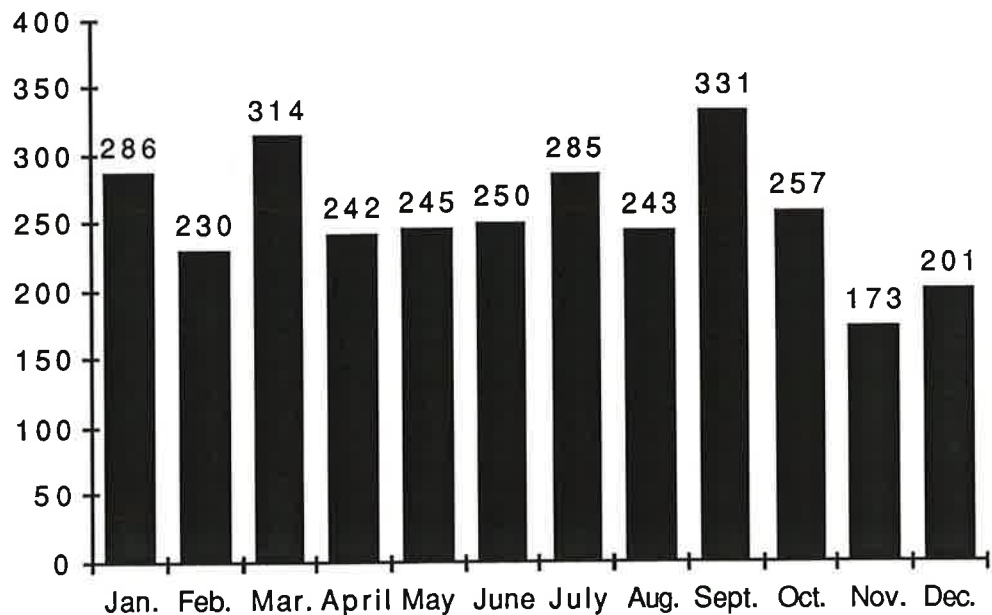
1989
