FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR

City government is a unique business to operate because of our diverse public services. We do not just offer one "product", rather, we have services relating to public safety, public health, elections and records, water and sewer services, engineering, code enforcement, public works, and the list goes on. Our internal business services, such as Finance, HR, IT, and Buildings & Facility Maintenance serve as backbone support to the services staff deliver. One critical policy document impacting every City Department is the annual operating and capital improvement budget (CIP). Department leaders have been busy putting the 2025 Budget together for most of the summer, and through a series of public meetings in September and October, the Common Council will ultimately adopt our 2025 budget. Although everyone is not a "numbers" person, it's important that City financial information is available to you as the Council moves through budget season.

Please note the following dates in our 2025 budget creation calendar:

- September 12 the BoPWACA reviews and recommends the CIP to Council (watch the meeting here: 16:01)
- September 26 the proposed 2025 Budget will be distributed to the Common Council (link to the executive 2025 draft Budget: here)
- October 1 staff presents proposed 2025 Budget to the Common Council;
- October 4 staff and Common Council holds a day-long budget workshop;
- November 19 public hearing, Common Council votes on the 2025 Budget.

A huge thanks to all staff that helped to put together our budget todate, and thanks to the Finance Department for coordinating and creating our award-winning budget document each year!!

COUNCIL AWARDS CHAPEL HILLS PARK REHAB PROJECT

Chapel Hills Park is home to tennis and basketball courts used by residents for over 20 years. In order to provide maintenance to the well-loved amenity, Council awarded the rehabilitation project to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder, Parking Lot Maintenance, Inc. at an estimated cost of \$223,983.60. The project will include general improvements, two acrylic backboards for the basket ball hoops, and the addition of two new pickleball courts.

NEXUSACO IMPLEMENTATION

At the July 16 Council meeting, Deputy City
Administrator/Finance Officer Max Gagin presented a
cost containment strategy for the City's Health
Insurance Fund, NexusACO. Operating under the
same provider network, the UMR product offers
minimal disruption for employees and savings benefits
for the City. Council authorized the City Administrator
to implement the program by January 1, 2025. More
