Recommendation: That the Council adopt Ordinance No. 2670, approving a conditional use permit for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons at 7350 S. 6th Street.

Background: At the December 11, 2012 meeting the Plan Commission recommended Common Council approval of a conditional use permit that would allow WPC-Technologies to store liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons on the property at 7350 S. 6th Street. At the January 8, 2013 Plan Commission meeting, the Commission recommended adoption of the conditions and restrictions as part of the conditional use permit after a public hearing.

WPC Technologies, Inc. is in the process of renovating the building at 7350 S. 6th Street in preparation for relocating their headquarters from the City of Milwaukee. WPC Technologies is a manufacturer of various coating products including rust and stain inhibitors and coating additives. More information on the company can be found at www.waynepigment.com. Their manufacturing process requires the use of large quantities of chemicals that will be stored in an outdoor tank farm east of their building. The zoning ordinance allows for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons as a conditional use in the M-1, Manufacturing zoning district.

The applicant has submitted a detailed letter outlining the nature of their business and a list of the chemicals (and quantity) that will be stored in the tank farm area. They also have provided site plans and elevation drawings of the tank area. Two of the tanks will be 27 feet high but will not be visible from S. 6th Street due to their location behind the building. The tank farm will be designed to contain any spills and will have all of the required safety measures. The tanks will be refilled by both rail and truck deliveries. The applicant will need to work with the Fire Department to ensure compliance with all fire codes.

Fiscal Impact: The issuance of this conditional use permit will allow for the reuse of a vacant industrial site, with the resulting increase in jobs and tax base.

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AN ORDINANCE TO APPROVE A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR THE PROPERTY AT 7350 S. 6th STREET FOR THE STORAGE OF INFLAMMABLE GAS AND LIQUIDS IN EXCESS OF 5,000 GALLONS

(1st Aldermanic District)

WHEREAS, WPC-Technologies Inc. has applied for a Conditional Use Permit that would allow for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons at $7350 \text{ S. } 6^{\text{th}}$ Street; and

WHEREAS, this property is more precisely described as follows:

A redivision of Parcel 1 of Certified Survey Map No. 5229, being a part of the SW ¼ of the NE ¼ of Section 8, Township 5 North, Range 22 East, in the City of Oak Creek, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin.

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission reviewed the request and recommended that the Conditional Use Permit be approved; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council held a public hearing on said request on January 15, 2013 at which time all interested parties appeared and were heard; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission had recommended that the application for a Conditional Use Permit be approved and authorized subject, however, to the imposition of certain conditions and restrictions upon the construction, location and operation of this Conditional Use and which conditions and restrictions are incorporated by reference into the Conditional Use Permit; and

WHEREAS, following said public hearing and upon recommendation of approval of the Plan Commission, the Common Council is of the opinion that the best interests of the City would be served if the Conditional Use Permit was approved and authorized for the lands hereinabove described, subject, however, to the imposition of certain conditions and restrictions on the design, construction, location and operation of the Conditional Use.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Common Council of the City of Oak Creek does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1: To promote the general welfare, public safety and general planning within the City of Oak Creek, the Building Commissioner is hereby authorized to grant a Conditional Use Permit for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons at 7350 S. 6th Street, which shall include the aforementioned conditions and restrictions.

<u>SECTION</u> 2: The Conditional Use is subject to the aforementioned conditions and restrictions on the design, location, construction and operation of the Conditional Use for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons.

<u>SECTION</u> 3: All ordinances or parts of ordinances and Zoning District Maps made a part of Chapter 17 of the Municipal Code of the City of Oak Creek in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

<u>SECTION</u> 4: The several sections of this ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section shall be declared, by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

1. LEGAL DESCRIPTION

A redivision of Parcel 1 of Certified Survey Map No. 5229, being a part of the SW ¼ of the NE ¼ of Section 8, Township 5 North, Range 22 East, in the City of Oak Creek, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin.

2. REQUIRED PLANS, EASEMENTS, AGREEMENTS AND PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS

- A. The site and building containing this conditional use shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with the site plan illustrated in Exhibit A.
- B. All plans for new buildings, additions, or exterior remodeling shall be submitted to the Plan Commission for their review and approval prior to the issuance of a building permit.
- C. For any new buildings or structures and additions, site grading and drainage, stormwater management and erosion control plans shall be submitted to the City Engineer for approval, if required. The City Engineer's approval must be received prior to the issuance of any building permits.
- D. Plans and specifications for any necessary public improvements within developed areas (e.g. sanitary sewer, water main, storm sewer, etc.) shall be subject to approval by the City Engineer.
- E. If required by the City of Oak Creek, public easements for telephone, electric power, sanitary sewer, storm sewer and water main shall be granted. Said easements shall be maintained free and clear of any buildings, structures, trees or accessory outdoor appurtenances. Shrubbery type plantings shall be permitted; provided there is access to each of the aforementioned systems and their appurtenances.
- F. All new electric, telephone and cable TV service wires or cable shall be installed underground within the boundaries of this property.
- G. For each stage of development, detailed landscaping plans showing location, types and initial plant sizes of all evergreens, deciduous trees and shrubs, and other landscape features such as statuary, art forms, water fountains, retaining walls, etc., shall be submitted to the Plan Commission for approval prior to the issuance of a building permit.

3. PARKING AND ACCESS

Parking requirements for this project shall be provided in accordance with Section 17.0403 of the Municipal Code.

4. LIGHTING

All plans for new outdoor lighting shall be reviewed and approved by the Electrical Inspector in accordance with Section 17.0808 of the Municipal Code.

5. LANDSCAPING

- A. Screening of Trash. Trash receptacles shall not be located within the front or street yard, and shall be screened from casual view by means of screening that is compatible with the main building/structure and landscaping.
- B. Screening of new Ground Mounted Mechanical Equipment. Ground mounted mechanical equipment shall not be located within the front or street yard, and shall be screened from casual view by means of screening that is compatible with the main building/structure and landscaping.
- C. Screening of new Roof Mounted Mechanical Equipment Roof mounted mechanical equipment shall be screened from casual view.

6. ARCHITECTURAL STANDARDS

The site and building containing this conditional use shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with the site and building plans dated 09-29-1989 and approved by the City of Oak Creek Plan Commission on 10-20-1989.

8. MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION

- A. The number, size, location and screening of appropriate solid waste collection units shall be subject to approval of the Plan Commission as part of the required site plan(s). Solid waste collection and recycling shall be the responsibility of the owner.
- B. Removal of snow from off-street parking areas, walks and access drives shall be the responsibility of the owners.
- C. The storage and containment of inflammable gas and liquids shall meet all building and fire codes.

9. SIGNS

All signs shall conform to the provisions of Sec. 17.0706 of the Municipal Code and the Master Sign Program for this property approved by the Plan Commission on 9-26-2006.

10. PERMITTED USES

- A. All permitted uses in the M-1, Manufacturing District
- B. Storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons.
- C. Usual and customary accessory uses to the above listed permitted uses.

11. TIME OF COMPLIANCE

The operator of the conditional use shall commence operations in accordance with these conditions and restrictions for the conditional use within twenty-four (24) months from the date of adoption of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of a conditional use permit. This conditional use approval shall expire within twenty-four (24) months after the date of adoption of the ordinance if an occupancy permit has not been issued for this use. The applicant shall re-apply for a conditional use approval, prior to recommencing work or construction.

12. OTHER REGULATIONS

Compliance with all other applicable City, State and Federal regulations not heretofore stated or referenced, is mandatory.

13. REVOCATION

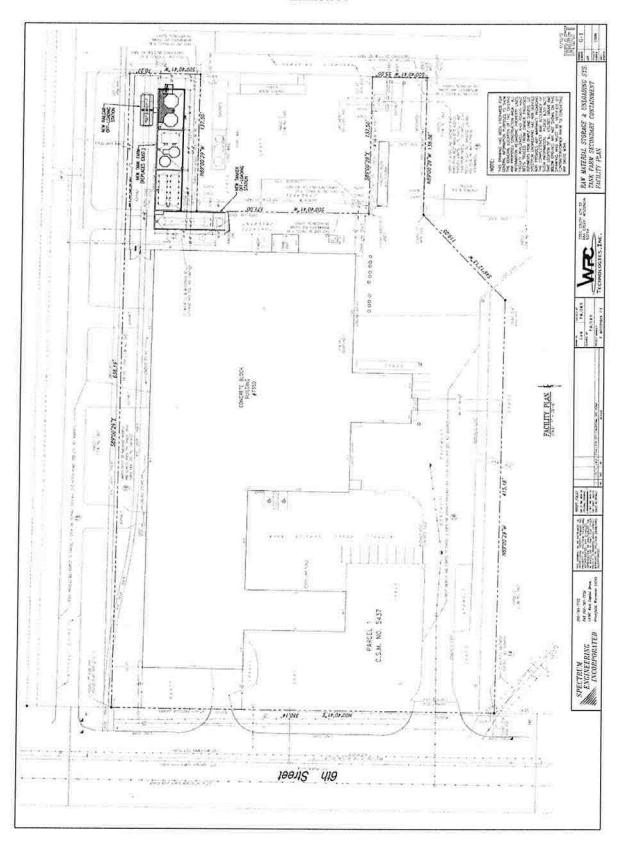

The zoning ordinance allows for the storage of inflammable gas and liquids in excess of 5,000 gallons as a conditional use in the M-1, Manufacturing zoning district.

The applicant has submitted a detailed letter outlining the nature of their business and a list of the chemicals and quantity that will be stored in the tank farm area. Two of the tanks will be 27 feet high but will not be visible from S. 6th Street due to their location behind the building. The tank farm will be designed to contain any spills and will have all of the required safety measures. The tanks will be refilled by both rail and truck deliveries.

Alderman Bukiewicz commented this would be an asset for the City and a quality company and he supports the request.

Commissioner Chandler questioned if there were similar uses or quantities within the City. Mr. Fortin confirmed there was similar storage within the City but not of this quantity.

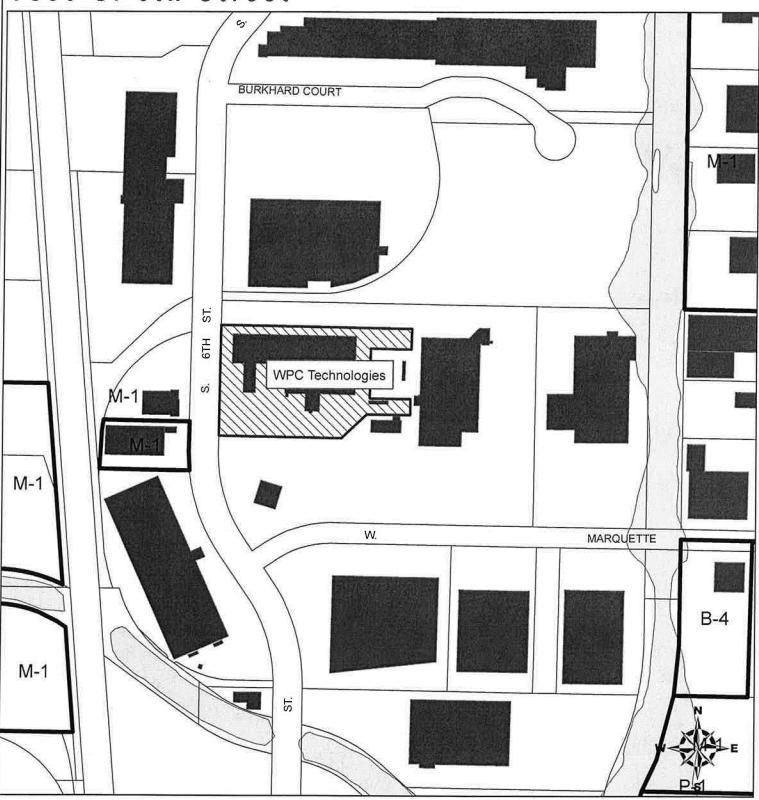
Commissioner Dickmann commented containment was a key issue and it looks as if that is being done by WPC.

WPC Technologies Conditional Use Permit 7350 S. 6th Street





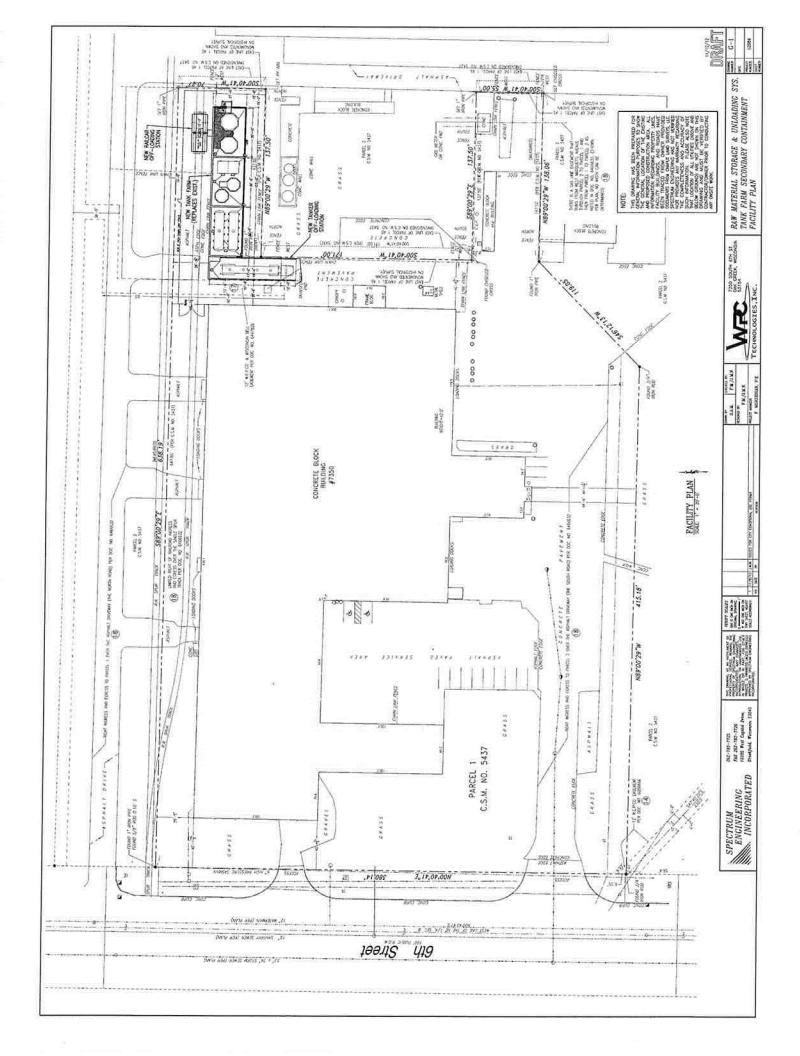

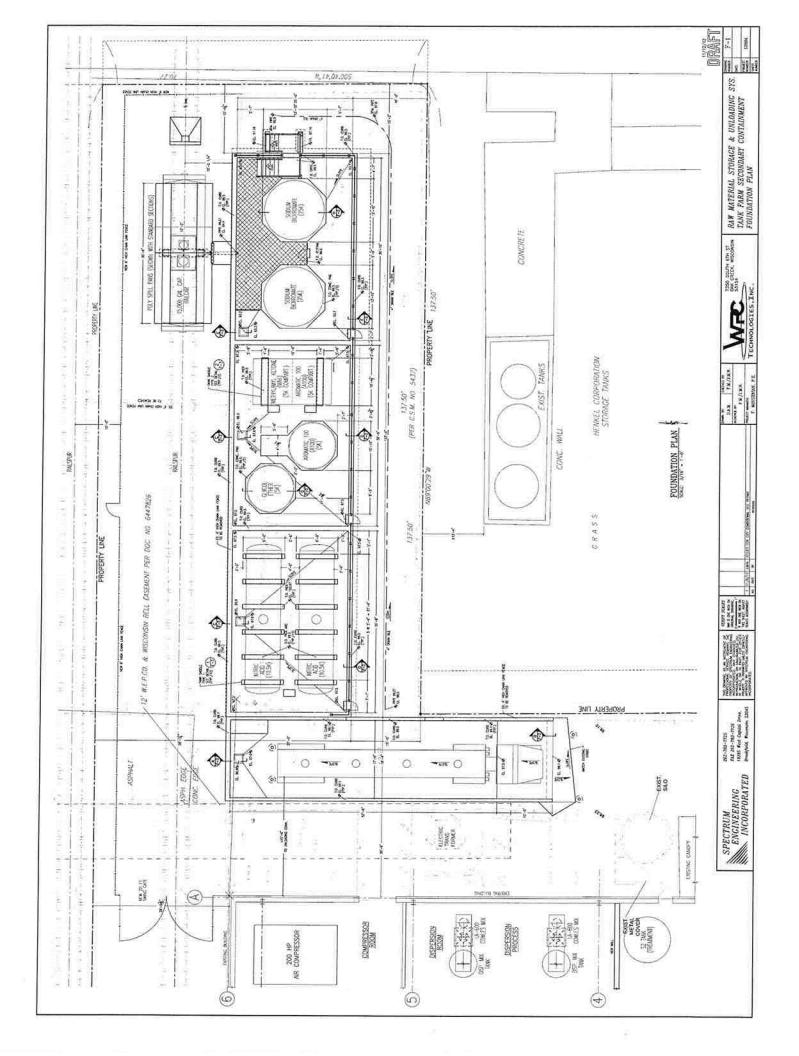

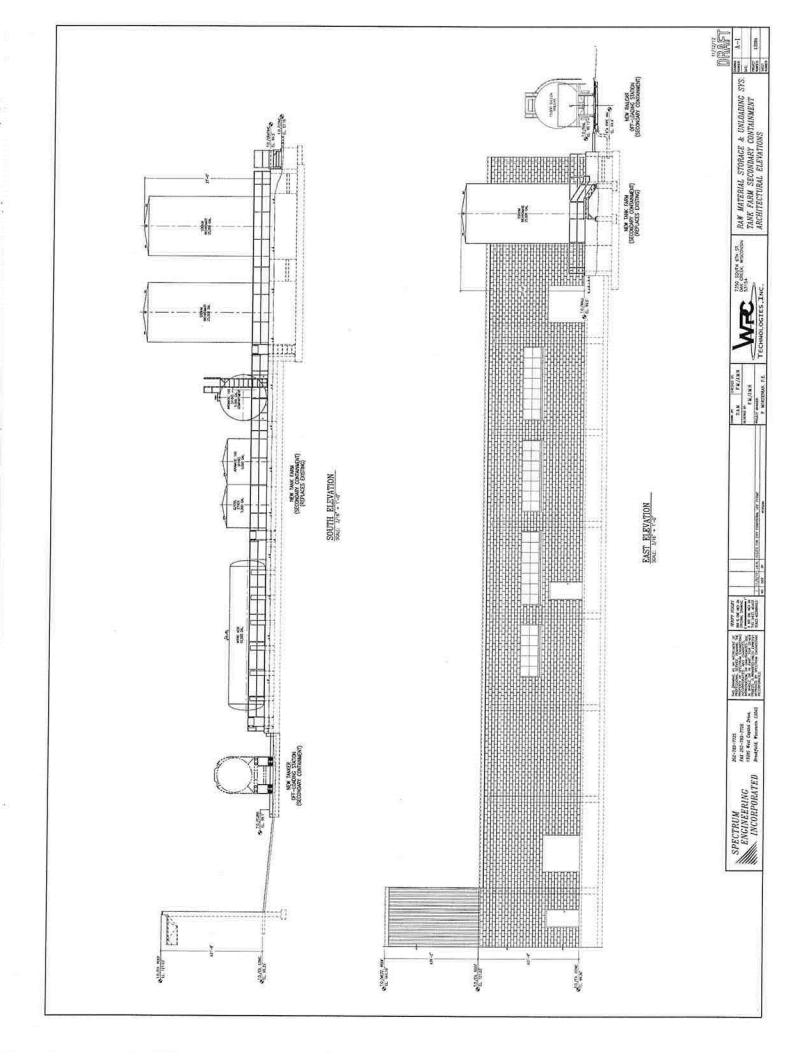


Existing Street Pattern

Recommendation: That the Council adopt Ordinance No. 2671, which would amend the official map for the Southwest ¼ of Section 6.

Background: The City is requesting an amendment to the officially mapped street pattern for lands north of Rawson Avenue between S. 20th Street & S. 27th Street. There are a few reasons for the changes. The first is that the current official map for the area does not take into account wetlands and natural areas, meaning that they could not be constructed in the areas shown. Another issue is that several of the parcels to the north are owned by Menards for use as a natural area, and could not be developed in accordance with the planned street network.

The proposal is to create an officially mapped street linking Rawson Avenue to the signalized intersection of S. 27th Street and W. Riverwood Boulevard. It is anticipated this road could also serve parcels north of Riverwood Boulevard, such as the Value Cinema, Melrose Restaurant, and Menards, via cross-access agreements. The proposal would also eliminate the rest of the officially mapped street pattern because of the wetlands and natural area issues discussed above. The officially mapped cul-de-sac at the west end of W. Cedar Street would remain. Should a property owner wish to develop the lands off of S. 20th Street in the future, staff would work with them to come up with an appropriate street pattern that meets their needs.

When considering a proposal to amend the Official Map, the Council should consider the impact on the ability to logically develop adjacent properties in accordance with the existing official map. Nearby property owners may have an interest in maintaining certain aspects of an official map if it provides them the future opportunity to subdivide their property in a cost effective manner. If a person is proposing to remove this opportunity, or to alter it, they need to demonstrate that any adverse effects on the property owners involved would be offset by the benefit to the neighborhood. In other words, a property owner should not be able to amend the official map to maximize the development potential of his or her property at the detriment of surrounding properties. The proposed amendment does not negatively impact the ability of the affected property owners to develop their property.

The Plan Commission has reviewed this request and has recommended that the Common Council amend the official map as proposed.

Fiscal Impact: Under the terms of a proposed agreement with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the City would be responsible for acquiring the right of way for these local roads. WisDOT has indicated that they would participate financially in the construction cost, since this local road furthers the access management goals of the State for 27th Street.

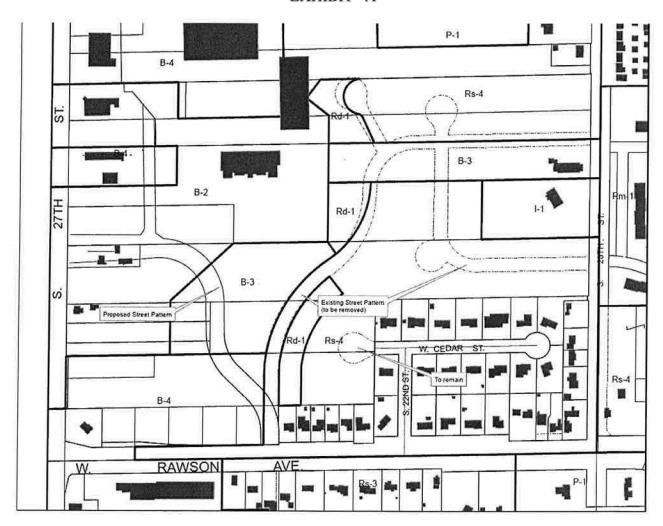

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Alderman Bukiewicz moved that the Plan Commission approve the use of the unit at 8625 S. Market Place as a wedding chapel, subject to all building and fire codes being met.

Commissioner Siepert seconds. Roll call, all voted aye. The motion to approve carries.

Official Map Amendment – Southwest ¼ of Section 6 Lands north of Rawson Avenue between S. 20th Street and S. 27th Street

Mr. Fortin explained to the Commission the City was requesting an amendment to the officially mapped street pattern for lands north of Rawson Avenue between S. 20th Street & S. 27th Street. There are a few reasons for the changes. The first reason is that the current official map for the area does not take into account wetlands and natural areas, meaning that they could not be constructed in the areas shown. Another issue is that several of the parcels to the north are owned by Menards for use as a natural area.

The proposal is to create an officially mapped street linking Rawson Avenue to the signalized intersection of S. 27th Street and W. Riverwood Boulevard. It is anticipated this road could serve parcels north of Riverwood Boulevard, such as the Budget Cinema, Melrose Restaurant, and Menards, via cross-access agreements. The proposal would also eliminate the rest of the officially mapped street pattern because of the wetlands and natural area issues discussed. The officially mapped cul-de-sac at the west end of the W. Cedar Street would remain.

Commissioner Dickmann explained when the original pattern was set up they did not take wetlands into account. He pointed out the proposed street pattern affects some existing homes.

Commissioner Johnston explained this was part of the DOT looking at 27th Street and their process of trying to clean up 27th Street. This project would be completed at the same time they are doing 27th Street, potentially in 2015. They are looking at eliminating driveways along 27th Street and that is how they would be accommodating the cross access road. The DOT would be willing to do some funding and also a design for the work. Mayor Scaffidi commented they have kicked around some pretty high percentages of cost pick-up for this road layout. The roadway makes a lot of sense for the taxpayers.

Commissioner Johnston questioned if this proposal would get approved would they then be looking to change some of the zonings in the area. Mr. Fortin explained the district was affected by the regional retail overlay zoning and some of the B-3 might potentially need to be rezoned. It would depend on how the area gets developed.

Alderman Bukiewicz questioned if off of Rawson Avenue the proposed road needed to be so tight to the existing residential home. Commissioner Johnston stated it could be buffered off and this was just a concept layout of the roads. Nothing is finalized and detailed work has not been done at this time. It currently lines up with the existing median opening on Rawson Avenue. If it could be shifted over is something they could look into.

Commissioner Dickmann moved that the Commission recommends to the Common Council that the Official Map amendment for the southwest ¼ of Section 6 is approved as proposed, after a public hearing.

Alderman Michalski seconds.

Mr. Ed Lisowski, 6988 S. 27th Street, questioned why this was being proposed at this time. Commissioner Johnston explained staff and the DOT are working on 27th Street improvements and as part of that they would be eliminating access points along 27th Street. This is a way for them to gain access to 27th Street and Rawson Avenue and eliminate conflicts at the intersection and conflicts at the access points to the properties. Mr. Lisowski questioned when this would take effect. Commissioner Johnston explained this was just a concept plan and nothing was designed at this point.

Mr. Fortin explained what the official map was and how it worked for future development.

Roll call, all voted aye. The motion to approve carries.

Land Donation Request 796 E. Forest Hill Avenue Tax Key No.: 815-9992

Mr. Fortin explained to the Commission the owner of the property at 796 E. Forest Hill Avenue has indicated they are interested in donating the property to the City of Oak Creek. The parcel is currently undevelopable because it does not have any frontage on a public street. However there is an officially mapped extension of S. Shepard Avenue on the west side of the property. Half of that officially mapped street is on this property and the other half is on the property to the west, so if someone were to develop it, it would take cooperation of both property owners to get the necessary right-of-way. The Oak Leaf bike trail is located just to the east.

Mayor Scaffidi questioned what the downside would be of accepting the donation. Mr. Fortin explained it would be another piece of land that the City would have to maintain. It is adjacent to the bike path but the elevation change is significant that it could not be used for much of anything to benefit the bike path. Mayor Scaffidi commented it could be used as a buffer to the neighborhood from another neighborhood.

Commissioner Dickmann questioned if it could be used as a part of the bike path with a bench. Mr. Fortin again explained the grade change would prohibit use of the land from the bike path.

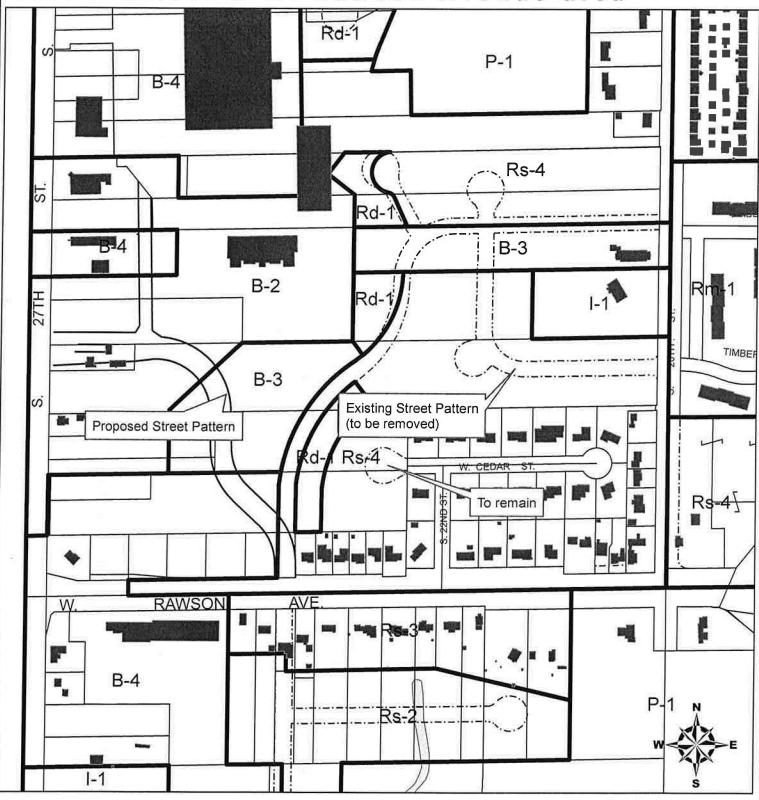
Alderman Bukiewicz stated a positive would be if they ever needed to widen the road they would have the right-of-way.

That the Common Council hear a short presentation on the potential 2013 wasp release for the control of emerald ash borer (EAB), discuss possible pros and cons and, vote in support or denial of said wasp release.

Background:

Bill McNee, Plant Pest and Disease Specialist with the Wisconsin DNR, will give a 10 to 15 minute presentation regarding EAB-specific wasp control and the potential for a 2013 wasp release in Oak Creek.

It is anticipated that three wasp species will help to slow the buildup of EAB and delay tree mortality, thus giving southeast Wisconsin communities and landowners more time to spread out financial costs and removal/replanting efforts. Over the long term, it is possible that the wasps could help to keep EAB populations low enough so that at least a few ash trees could stay alive. The wasps are less than ½" long and do not sting people or animals. Like the gypsy moth wasp, people will not notice that they are present.

Fiscal Impact:

Wasp release would have no direct fiscal impact on the City of Oak Creek because the insects would be provided by the US Department of Agriculture and DNR staff would do the actual field work. These wasps may benefit Oak Creek by slowing EAB impacts, saving future costs associated with ash tree removal and, reduce other impacts such as flooding.

RESOLUTION ACKNOWLEDGING AND FILING THE 2013 CALENDAR YEAR SALARY GRADE PLAN AND BENEFITS FOR LIBRARY PERSONNEL

WHEREAS, pursuant to S. 43.58(4), Wisconsin Statutes, the Library Board is authorized and empowered to set and fix the compensation to be paid to the personnel of the Public Library; and

WHEREAS, those affected full-time employees pursuant to this section shall receive the fringe benefits set forth in the current Personnel Manual; and

WHEREAS, the Library Board, in addressing retiree benefits for full-time employees who are eligible for retirement, has authorized those eligible full-time employees to receive the benefits set forth in the current Personnel Manual; and

WHEREAS, a health insurance premium co-payment of fifteen percent (15%) of the cost of the health insurance premium for a single and family medical plan, respectively will be paid by full-time Library employees. Full-time Library employees and their spouses who participate in a health risk assessment (HRA) program, or an annual physical exam and completion of the HRA certification, shall contribute ten percent (10%) of the premium for a single and family plan, respectively; and

WHEREAS, the Library Board has also transmitted to the Common Council a salary grade plan for Library Personnel effective January 1, 2013, which provides as follows:

Recommendation: That the Common Council considers a motion to enter into a contract with Alfred Benesch & Company for design services on the bridges located on S. Nicholson Road (B-40-0018), W. Marguette Avenue (P-40-0557) and S. 6th Street (P-40-0558). (Project Nos. 12017, 12018 & 12019) (1st & 3rd Aldermanic Districts)

Background: On November 7, 2012, the Common Council passed a motion to enter into contract negotiations with Alfred Benesch & Company for design services for the replacement of bridges located on S. Nicholson Road (B-40-0018), W. Marquette Avenue (P-40-0557) and S. 6th Street (P-40-0558).

The preliminary cost estimate for replacement of the three bridges is \$1,000,000 not including real estate acquisitions. Real estate acquisitions will only include temporary easements on four parcels owned by Milwaukee County Parks.

Through the negotiations Engineering staff and Alfred Benesch developed and agreed upon a scope of services for the project design; one that will preserve opportunities to obtain future state/federal funding. Once the scope of services was agreed upon. negotiations began for the associated design costs.

The following is a summary of the not-to-exceed cost.

- 1) Total Contract: \$184,459,87
 - a. Alfred Benesch cost \$155,970.13 (1,702 hours) (\$91.64 per hour)
 - Subconsultant costs \$28,489.74
 - 1. Himalayan (Geotechnical & Phase 1 HAZMAT) \$19,239.74
 - 2. Single Source (Real Estate for 4 Parcels) \$6,100.00
 - 3. TRC (Lead Paint & Asbestos Inspection) \$3.150.00

Alfred Benesch was selected as the top choice from several firms submitting qualification proposals for the design. Based on the negotiation process, the Engineering Department recommends entering into the not-to-exceed contract for \$184,459.87.

Fiscal Impact: There is approximately \$140,000 remaining from what was budgeted in 2012 for design of the bridges. The remaining funding would come from the bridge maintenance CIP fund (Project No. 11016).
